### **Aviation and Aerospace Communities in Kansas**

Surrounding the ceremonies there were some fascinating, and encouraging, interactions which suggest excellent opportunities for the aviation and aerospace communities in Kansas, as well as youth projects and STEM education. The pieces are (in no particular order--this is a growing network, not a ladder):

- (1) Atchison Chamber of Commerce ("Chamber"),
- (2) Atchison Amelia Earhart Foundation ("Foundation"),
- (3) Amelia Earhart Airport ("AE Airport"),
- (4) The International Forest of Friendship ("Forest"),
- (5) Amelia Earhart Birthplace Museum ("AE Birthplace Museum"),
- (6) the Cosmosphere in Hutchinson ("Cosmosphere"), and
- (7) NE Kansas Chapter 99s (NE Kansas 99s).

This year's theme at the Forest of "Flying, Forests and the Future" (emphasizing contributions by young people) is reflected in honorees Barrington Irving and his Flying Classroom (which focuses on STEM education), and LT La'Shanda Holmes, USCG. These discussions are the beginning of a conversation. I hope they will stimulate introductions and follow-on engagements.

These components tie together in several ways:

- A revitalized AE Airport, with the AE Airport Museum in place, contributing to growth in the community and the local economy, supported in its development by the Foundation and the Chamber.
- The Forest integrated into the Atchison community, and contributing to its prosperity, based around the Chamber, the AE Birthplace Museum, and other local activities.
- Aviation and forestry integrated into the Forest's management structure, including the 99s at the National level, the NE Kansas 99s, members of the AE Birthplace Museum and the Airport, and foresters such as Clinton McNemee and Doug Grimm on the Forest's Committee, as well as a close relationship with the Kansas State Foresters.
- STEM education addressed in ways that link aviation and aerospace to partners such as the Cosmosphere's space camps and other educational activities, the Airport's ties with the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA), Barrington Irving's Flying Classroom, La'Shanda Holmes' inspirational stories for young people, local STEM activities around Atchison, and many more.
- International activities (through the Forest's core theme of "World Friendship Through Flight"), such as ties to The Ninety-Nines, Atchison's efforts to build sister city relationships with Derry, Ireland, etc.

These tie in directly to our efforts to get the Forest under a stable, sustainable, locally based management structure that's part of the vibrant network of aviation, aerospace, and forestry communities in Kansas.

### **Muriel and Upcoming Events at the AE Airport**

We were excited to be able to see Muriel, the last remaining 1935 Lockheed Electra L-10E aircraft in the world – the same model aircraft Amelia flew on her final, fateful flight around the world. Muriel now resides in a private hangar at the AE Airport, even as the vision of the Atchison Amelia Earhart Foundation is to develop an aviation museum within the AE Airport to showcase Muriel while creating an educational and visitor experience that honors the accomplishments of Amelia Earhart. The **Amelia Earhart Airport Museum** will encourage young minds to achieve the seemingly impossible while serving as an economic development initiative that will enhance the vibrant culture, commerce and entertainment Atchison currently offers.

The Foundation adopted Muriel from Grace McGuire who had spent decades refurbishing the aircraft in preparation for recreating Amelia's flight. When Grace realized she would not be able to undertake her

quest, she agreed to let the Atchison Amelia Earhart Foundation adopt her beloved plane. After weeks of meticulously dismantling and preparing the plane for her overland adventure, a cavalcade of escorts guided Muriel during her 18-day, 1,500-mile journey home from her hangar in El Cajon, California to Atchison, Kansas in 2016.

The airport, along with much of Atchison, will stage a “Total Solar Eclipse Party” on August 21<sup>st</sup>.

September 23 will see the “Girls in Aviation Day” and the Annual Vintage Fly-in at the AE Airport. We hope that the Forest will become more closely associated with these events in the future.

### **Plans for 2018 (Security and Solace through Flight) and Beyond**

We are looking forward to next year’s induction ceremonies, which will be on **Sep 21-22, 2018 (Fri-Sat)**. **PLEASE NOTE THE NEW DATE**. Originally we had planned to move the ceremonies to early June to deconflict with the Air Race Classic, but an even more exciting opportunity has come up. The AE airport will have a girls fly-in on the morning of Sat, Sep 22, so we can have the cocktail party on Friday evening, attend the fly-in Sat morning, have the keynote speech at lunch, do the Forest induction ceremonies about 2:00, provide time to see Atchison, and have dinner and a hangar dance at the airport in the evening. This also will let us see construction progress on the AE Airport Museum. The focus for 2018 will be on “Security and Solace through Flight,” with an emphasis on military aviators, organizations like Angel Flight, flying doctors. As always, we welcome any nominees who have contributed, or are contributing to all aspects of aviation and aerospace.

Other upcoming themes include:

**2019:** “Discovery through Flight” – Honoring those who have “pushed the envelope” in all aspects of aviation and aerospace.

**2020:** “Flying and Forests” – Linking aviation and aerospace with the Earth’s green spaces.

**2021:** “World Friendship through Flight” – International partnerships and the promotion of peace through aviation and aerospace.

**2022:** “Flying, Forests and the Future” —emphasizing contributions by young people.
