

Desert Winds

BIRDATHON 2002

Once again, we have experienced Birdathon (some of us actually ate, breathed & lived it for a few days, as well) and it was GREAT! The weather was fine, the winds were light, the temperature was moderate and the BIRDS & COMARDERIE WERE EXCELLENT!

As of this early report date, the chapter's counters identified 152 different species of birds. Some of the excellent birds seen included.... An American Golden Plover (not readily seen in our region) observed by many, & the Mountain Plover seen by Craig Braginton, at the Ft. Bliss Ponds. There were beautiful Summer Tanagers and Vermilion Flycatchers found along the Rio Grande, SE of town around Esperanza. Blacknecked Stilts, American Avocets, Blue-winged Teal and Burrowing Owls of Rio Bosque Wetlands Park (a few hundred thousand mosquitoes tried to fly off with Bob Johnson, but we were able to pull him back into the van). There was a Painted Bunting lured into the open by John Sproul's group, around one of the "old" reservoir areas SE of town. Eurasian Collared Doves seen by Jim Paton in Fabens continue their expansion across the country. A Grosbeak Gathering was experienced by John Kiseda's group at one seed feeder at a lonely house, seemingly out in the middle of nowhere, SE of town. We stopped because someone thought they saw something blue, then we thought we saw a female Black-headed Grosbeak, then we actually had a good look at a female Rose-breasted Grosbeak, then we saw a male Blue Grosbeak, and finally observed the female Black-headed Grosbeak (this little spot also yielded us our only Cactus Wren of the day). The neotropical migrant morning that Bob Johnson & John Kiseda had at Hueco Tanks S.P. in the surprisingly cool early morning hours, yielded a nice variety [~ 15 species of passerines were seen, including Cassin's & Warbling Vireo, Green-tailed

Towhees, Yellow & MacGillvray's Warblers,

Northern Waterthrush, Northern Parula, and Western Tanager.

Our counters have raised at least \$4000, due to their hard work & the great generosity of their sponsors! Let me end this brief summary, by expressing a big THANK YOU, to everyone involved, for all of their donations of hard work and hard-earned dollars!

Without you, our local Chapter would not be able to be an important conservation and education based entity for our community, and our wildlife and wildplaces.



Thursday AM

This is the results of the migratory bird walks in Memorial Park. The walks were scheduled for 7:30 AM on Thursdays. A total of 8 consecwalks were held from April 11 thru May 30. A total of 3 people showed up which was an average of 0.375 persons per walk. We had an average of 19 species of birds during each hour and a half tour. The best birds seen were a Willow, Hammond's and Dusky Flycatchers. Also a Cassin's Vireo, Hepatic Tanager and Verdins feeding young.

I would like to continue to schedule Thursday morning walks starting in September, but must have people tell me they are interested in doing this. Check in the next RR (Aug/Sep) and you will find out what the reaction is. Bob "Wildbirder"



Insect Expo at the El Paso Zoo

Have you ever wondered why all bugs aren't true insects? Have you ever wondered about the extraordinary physical capabilities of some species of insects?

The Zoo has partnered with the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park of Las Cruces, New Mexico, to provide visitors with educational, interactive insect experiences. If you want to learn more about insects while having fun, come visit the El Paso Zoo the five Saturdays in June, from 10am to 2pm!

Ocelots Are Here

The zoo is now exhibiting an extremely rare in the United States, species of small, wild felid; ocelots! Come by and view these attractively marked, gorgeous predators and learn about how they go about "making a living".

There are only approximately 100 ocelots in the entire United States, and these are almost all located to a very restricted region in SE Texas. The US Fish & Wildlife Service has been working with this species for a number of years, and now ocelots are part of the American Zoo & Aquarium Association's Species Survival Plan [SSP] conservation programming.

Learn about why these beautiful cats are an endangered species and what is being done to try to aid the species in the wild and in zoos. Find out about how you can aid the species in the wild, by working with the El Paso Zoo, the Ocelot SSP and the Brazilian

Ocelot Consortium on cooperative conservation and education endeavors.


