The first class was held on Thursday evening, May 9 at 7 p.m. in the Parish Center with Fr. Tenus as the instructor.

As expected, some attended to "brush up" on their Polish speaking skills, while others want to "remember" what it is was like growing up in a Polish family.

When asked why she came, Pearl (Martel) Czerlonka, who grew up with French Canadian parents, replied "Jim and I are very active in the parish and I thought it would be fun to learn to speak the language." "Although", she smiled, "even Cześć! Is hard for me to say."

Jack Szetela and his wife, Judy, who is not Polish, came because they love the church and enjoy socializing with other parishioners.

Others who attended the first class included Chris Kowalski, Christine Piec, Beverly Runowicz, and JoAnn Menzia, all with Polish backgrounds seeking to rekindle childhood memories.

Paula Jones, whose husband is not Polish, said, "I've been a Jones for a long time and I would like to remember a little of the Polish that I spoke as a child."

Joyce Normand, Louise Regan, and Phyllis Hunt all agreed that it should be fun to learn the proper pronunciation of words and phrases a long time forgotten.

The first class lesson lasted just over one hour and featured a very brief (7 lines) conversation (in Polish with English translation) between two class-mates (Agata and Andrzej) who meet on campus on their way to classes.

An authentic Polish Babka bread was baked by Agnieska Tenus, the pastor's wife who decorated it in a traditional way. The Babka was sampled by the children who agreed that it was, indeed, delicious.

Fr. Tenus spoke to the children about how Easter is being celebrated in Poland today.

A highlight of the class was the art of Pisanki, a wax resist technique for decorating Easter eggs in Poland which was

demonstrated by teacher Phyllis Hunt. Following the demonstration, the children had a great time doing their own version of Pisanki.

### Wesolego Alleluja—The Traditional Polish Easter Basket

- Butter (Maslo) In the shape of a lamb (Baranek Wielkanocny) reminds us of the goodness of Christ in all things
- Easter Bread (Babka) symbol of Jesus who is our Bread of Life symbolic of the Passion of Christ
- Eggs (Jajka) and Pisanki indicates new life, Resurrection
- Sausage (Kielbasa) indicates God's generosity and favor
- Ham (Szynka) symbol of great joy and abundance
- Salt (Sol) a necessary element "You are the salt of the earth."
- Cheese (Ser) shaped into a ball, symbol of moderation Candle to represent Christ, the Light of the World.
