Mark 3:20-35



"Jesus came home with his disciples. Again the crowd gathered, making it impossible for them even to eat. When his relatives heard of this they set out to seize him, for they said, "He is out of his mind." The scribes who had come from Jerusalem said, "He is possessed by Beelzebul," and "By the prince of demons he drives out demons." Summoning them, he began to speak to them in parables. "How can Satan drive out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand. And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand; that is the end of him. But no one can enter a strong man's house to plunder his property unless he first ties up the strong man. Then he can plunder the house. Amen, I say to you, all sins and all blasphemies that people utter will be forgiven them. But whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit will never have forgiveness, but is guilty of an everlasting sin." For they had said, "He has an unclean spirit." His mother and his brothers arrived. Standing outside they sent word to him and called him. A crowd seated around him told him, "Your mother and your brothers and your sisters are outside asking for you." But he said to them in reply, "Who are my mother and my brothers?" And looking around at those seated in the circle he said, "Here are my mother and my brothers. For whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."

Pastor's Study **Desk Notes**



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

10th Sunday Ordinary Year B

"United we Stand, Divided we Fall". The Kentucky flag and state seal declare this motto. It depicts two men, one in frontiersman buckskin and one in formal statesman dress, clasping hands in a gesture of friendship and cooperation (some people say the two men are Daniel Boone and Henry Clay, but others dispute that-but hey, where's the spirit?) But regardless, our motto has its foundation in today's gospel. Jesus returns to his home area in Galilee, and insults are hurled at him from inside and outside His circle. The scribes accuse Him of being possessed by Satan, and His own relatives accuse Him of being insane (3:21-22). Jesus will address both charges and his response shows Him basically 'shaking the dust from his feet' not getting hung-up on the detraction of others-just keep moving on-Mark 6:11), He first offers the proverb, "a house/kingdom divided against itself falls". The proverb means that a house or kingdom's unity is its identity. Once the house or kingdom is torn apart, you have nothing. It undoes itself. Maybe we've said such a thing, too, after we've witnessed someone's 'self-destructive' conduct, and then suggested to them, "You are cutting off your own feet", or "Your lashing out is only hurting yourself" (which means that their attack on another person afflicts themselves too).

In the case of the scribes accusing him of being able to cast out demons, because He is a demon Himself, Jesus' response is basically, "Then relax, I am doing your work for you, taking down Satan myself." In Matthew's gospel, after being insulted this way, Jesus further challenges the scribes to consider the thin ice they are reasoning on, when He tosses this question to them, "if I drive out demons by Beelzebul, by whom do your own people drive them out?" (Matt 12:27) The scribes expose their own insecurities and reveal their own bad intent when they attack the good of Jesus. Then addressing His own family's rejection of Him when they question His sanity, Jesus points out their own unwise and undiscerning confusion (like His suggestion elsewhere that 'a prophet is always rejected in his hometown' Mark 6:4). Jesus then clarifies the definition of family to be those who not only have the same name, but those who more importantly share a common purpose. With Jesus, that means 'knowing the Word and Will of the Father'. He says, "Who is my brother and mother, but whoever knows and performs the Will of God" (Mark 3:35). Of course, by some of his kinfolk attacking Him, they reveal themselves to not really be related to Him (they are imposing their own selfwillful purpose onto Him-cutting themselves off from Him). So with both the scribes and his own family, Jesus is pointing out that their own manipulative behavior sets them apart form Him-they are doing it to themselves.

Which brings up another troubling statement from Jesus in this gospel. 'Unforgivable Sin'-what is this sin against the Holy Spirit? We might ask, "Is anything unforgiveable?" Well, nothing is unforgivable if it is sincerely asked to be forgiven. The only unforgiveable sin is the one that is never asked to be forgiven. Jesus is talking about the greatest sin: prideful self-exaltation. If I am presumptively arrogant and project that I know better than God or even outright reject God, then such a destructive sin is not forgiven because I am ruling God out of it. If I think I am greater than God (my will is superior to His), then I have put myself out of His reach. A sin is not forgiven if it is never asked to be forgiven (if I don't admit it, or turn to God for forgiveness). So, the sin against the Holy Spirit is my lack of humility in turning to/submitting to God. Do I think that I 'save myself'? Then such pride condemns myself – refusing God's grace. The Catholic Catechism says in #1864 "There are no limits to the mercy of God, but anyone who deliberately refuses to accept his mercy by repenting, rejects the forgiveness of his sins and the salvation offered by the Holy Spirit". Paradoxical as it sounds, the only power greater than God's love, is our refusal of it. God endowed us with freedom of heart, and God honors our freedom lovingly. If we reject God's will/grace, then our condemnation is self-inflicted. That is what happens with the scribes and even some of Jesus' own family who condemn themselves when they turn against Jesus. Their self-exaltation (their attempt to force their own will upon God and others) creates the division within themselves that brings their own house down, their own ego-kingdom to crumble. The solution to avoid such condemnation is humility – being open to God's rule and design for each of us (acknowledging Him and following Him). Admitting our own ego's faults, and our need of God's direction is what keeps us from falling into such selfinflicted exile from God. God's Will, not ours, saves us from condemnation. Or as Jesus says in Mark 3:35 "Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother" (keeps the house/family together, or as Dante wrote, "In God's will is my peace"- *Paradise 3.85-87*) Peace, Fr Brian
