The Virginia POA Act, Sec 55-513, permits the Board of Directors, or their designated committee to:

Suspend Privileges.

Impose fines not to exceed \$50.00, or \$10.00 per day for offenses of a continuing nature, not to exceed 90 days.

Members are entitled to a proper hearing prior to fines and suspensions being implemented.

BRPOA Board of Directors Meeting July 11, 2020

Approval of Agenda: Motion by Rick Gray, seconded by Ken White to approve amended agenda with inclusion of new business item #5, Financial Investment Resolution. Motion approved unanimously.

Approval of Minutes: Motion by Ken White, seconded by Hal Davis to approve the minutes from June 06, 2020 with change of date in header and spelling of Jonathan Tustin's name. Motion approved unanimously.

Revision - Inoperable Vehicles, (Second Reading): Motion by Bill Earhart, seconded by Hal Davis to accept the second reading of Inoperable Vehicle Policy as follows:

Section III

Policies, Rules, and Regulations

C. Member Property Maintenance:

2.Inoperable and Inoperative Motor Vehicles and/or Other Conveyances: A legally inoperable motor vehicle is a motor vehicle that is not legally operable on public roadways and includes a motor vehicle that is required to display but does not display a current inspection sticker or a license plate with current decals. An inoperative motor vehicle is a vehicle which is not in operating condition.

- a. No legally inoperable or inoperative motor vehicle that is visible by someone standing at ground level from outside the property on which the vehicle is parked shall be parked on any lot in the Subdivision.
- b. No legally inoperable or inoperative motor vehicle shall be parked on any street or common property in the subdivision.

Louisa County Inoperative Vehicle Ordinance stipulates that it shall be unlawful to store inoperative vehicles on any property zoned agricultural, residential or commercial-unless such vehicle is within a fully enclosed building or shelter or otherwise shielded or screened from public view, (shielded or screened from public view is defined as not-visible by someone standing at ground level from outside the property on which the vehicle is located). No more than three inoperative vehicles which are not within an enclosed building or structure may be stored on property otherwise or screened from-view, i.e. the public right of way. An inoperative vehicle is defined as not in operating condition including not having necessary valid licensing, inspection, and county stickers-to operate on roads. Inoperative vehicles shall not be permitted to be parked on any street or any lot in the subdivision that is not within a fully enclosed building or structure or otherwise shielded or screen from public view as defined above:

c. The usage of a vehicle car cover will not satisfy the intent of this Policy.

Motion approved unanimously.

Addition to Safety and Security Policy: Motion by Bill Earhart, seconded by Hal Davis to approve first reading of addition to Safety and Security Policy with corrections of spelling.

G. Safety & Security:

<u>4. Identification:</u> The General Manager, the General Manger's staff and contractual Security Employees are hereby authorized to request any person who is on Common Area, including streets, for identification. As a condition for using the Association's

Common Area, including streets, all Members, Non Member Occupants, Non Members, guests, and others shall provide identification when requested. Acceptable forms of identification shall include Driver's Permits, Passports, Military ID's and other types of identification that are issued by Federal, State, or Local Government. A person who is a member, Non Member Occupant, Non Member or Guest shall be provided with the opportunity to obtain an acceptable form of identification or obtain verification of the person's name and status from a member or Non Member Occupant who has an acceptable form of identification. If a person refuses or fails to comply, the above designated Association Representatives may request the person to leave the common area.

Motion passed unanimously.

2020 Asphalt Rehabilitation Program: Motion by Hal Davis, seconded by Ken White to approve 2020 Asphalt Rehabilitation program as presented to include Basketball court resurfacing – at a cost not to exceed \$105,065.00. Motion passed unanimously.

2019 Audit of Financial Records: Motion by Bill Earhart, seconded by Ken White to accept the Audit of 2019 Financial Records as reported by Robinson, Farmer and Cox of Charlottesville, VA. Motion passed unanimously.

Disposition of Pavilion: Motion by Hal Davis, seconded by Ken White to approve not replacing pavilion roof and allow usage moving forward to be first come first serve. Motion passed unanimously.

Financial Investment Resolution: Motion by Bill Earhart, seconded by Hal Davis to adopt resolution to have President, Treasurer and Secretary sign off to transfer certificates of deposits from BB&T to Infinex Investments, Inc. Motion passed Unanimously.

Water Conservation Tips with Big Impacts

We've all heard shut off the water while brushing your teeth or turn off the faucet while washing dishes. These tiny changes are effective and, believe it or not, the savings are significant. Imagine this: 90 glasses of water per day are saved by a single turning off the tap. That's a total of 27 billion glasses of water every day if everyone chipped in.

Check your pipes for leaks, not only do leaks damage your home, but they're a sneaky source of wasted water. Make sure when you are watering your lawns, they are landscaped for effective water usage. Make sure sprinklers are placed in a way which maximizes efficiency. Don't run you washing machine or dishwasher unless they're full.

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NO WAKE ZONES SPEED LAWS

Dept. of Game & Inland Fisheries

"No Wake" is defined as the slowest possible speed required to maintain steerage and headway. It shall be unlawful to operate any motorboat greater than no wake speed when within 50 feet or less of docks, piers, boathouses, boat ramps, and people in the water. This definition does not prohibit the pulling of a skier with a rope of less than 50 feet, nor a person accompanying the motorboat (wake surfing) provided the motorboat is propelled by an inboard motor.

SLACKEN SPEED: Operators shall reduce speed to avoid endangering persons or property by the effect of the motorboat's wake when approaching or passing vessels under way, lying to, or made fast to the shore; or when approaching or passing persons in the water or using water skis or surfboards.

SAFE SPEED: A safe speed is a speed less than the maximum at which the operator can take proper and effective action to avoid collision and stop within a distance appropriate to the prevailing circumstances and conditions. In establishing a safe operating speed the operator shall take into account; visibility, traffic density, ability to maneuver the vessel (stopping distance and turning ability), proximity of navigational hazards, draft of the vessel, limitations of radar equipment, and the state of wind, sea, and current.

2020 BOATING POLICIES AND SAFETY TIPS

Boating Season is here, and we hope everyone has a 2020 Fun but Safe experience. Blue Ridge Shores adopted the provisions of the **Virginia Boating Safety Education Requirement** for operation of a motorized boat on Lake Louisa. The Virginia Conservation Police Department has authority to enforce all provisions of State Requirements on Lake Louisa. Just a few reminders for everyone:

- Anyone operating a motorized boat in Virginia must possess a card indicating they have taken the Virginia Boater Safety Education Class or the State's Safety Class where the boat is registered.
- Operators must be at least 14 years old.
- Boats must be registered to a member or a non-member occupant who are members in good standing.
- All motorized boats must be registered through the office with current State Registration and Insurance Information in order to have and display a current Association Decal.
- All Non-Motorized Boats excluding a paddle board must be registered through the Association and display the appropriate decal.
- Jet Skis and jet powered boats are not permitted to be on the lake. <u>Jet powered boats registered</u> with the Association prior to August 13, 2011 are exempted from this rule.
- All motorized boat traffic must travel in a counter clockwise direction, unless they are fishing and under the power of a trolling motor.
- All boats that are non-motorized have the right of way.
- All fast moving boats are required to stay off the Shoreline by 100 feet.
- All boats pulling tubes, skis, aqua boards or any other object are required to have a spotter. These
 activities are limited from 9:00 AM until sunset.
- All boats are to have running lights or navigational lights after dusk or before dawn.
- The Association's Special Assistant to the GM is patrolling the Lake and will issue violations as appropriate and the member affected will be required to attend a Compliance Committee Hearing.
- Should you have questions, require clarification, or a copy of these rules please contact the office.

RULES OF THE BEACH

- Use of the beach and other facilities are for BRPOA
 Members, Nonmember Occupants, & Guests
- Swim at your own risk, no lifeguards on duty
- No diving from the seawall or marina
- No dogs or other pets on the beach
- No Alcoholic Beverages or Glass Containers Permitted
- Use of a grill beyond the chain and posts/parking area is not permitted
- Children under 12 MUST be accompanied by Parent or responsible person at least 16 years of age

- BEWARE: Many areas of the lake are more than 5 feet deep and are dangerous for children, nonswimmers, and poor swimmers.
- Swimming beyond the post areas is discouraged.
- Manager on duty may ask any person who acts in an unsafe manner or who violates the Regulations applicable to the beach and swimming areas to leave the area.
- No loud or offensive music will be tolerated.
- REGULATIONS ARE AVAILABLE IN THE ASSOCIATION AREA

General Manager's Report

Denny W. Kelly

We hope you are enjoying your summer in Blue Ridge Shores and look forward to serving the continuing needs of the membership during the remaining months of 2020.

We appreciate the many members and guests that have been considerate of others during your visits to the beach this year and urge others to review the Rules of the Beach as posted and respectfully submitted. **They apply to everyone**. Ridge Utilities furnishes water for the bathrooms and outside faucets without charges, so please be considerate and do not let children play in the streams or leave them on once you have cleaned the sand off your feet.

The 2020 Asphalt Rehabilitation Program will start within the next month and will produce some traffic delays and we promise to minimize those to the best of our ability. You will be notified by mass email of those areas impacted as soon as the schedule with Barton & Barton is established.

I urge those that wish to sign up for a partial payment agreement in order to avoid higher monthly payments, should do that immediately. To date we have approved thirty-eight and five of those have paid in full. We have collected 91% of the 2019 revenue affiliated with assessments and rental fees by the end of June 2019. A MNIGS Hearing was conducted on July 13, 2019 where 41 Members were declared to be MNIGS. Our delinquency rate for 2018 was 2.0%.

Please check your 911 address for your property and be sure it is accurate and per the regulations. The 911 address as assigned by the County must be displayed in three-inch numbers, clearly visibly from the street. That address/number must be displayed on the side of the street that the house is located and be adjacent to the entryway/access to your house from the street. This is very crucial when seconds count in having emergency personnel responding to your needs.

The Association is currently using Admiral Security Services to monitor speeds on the Streets in the Community in order to curb vehicle speeds. We respectfully ask you to work with us on this program and report any issues you may have. Contrary to what some may think, you need to show ID if stopped.

Ridge Utilities is very pleased to announce that all wells are in excellent condition for water supply and all required testing to date has been completed with a 100% passing of those requirements. The 2019 Water Quality Report was distributed early and if you did not receive that, extra copies are in the office.

The Ridge Utilities Board of Directors approved a **\$54,032.00** project to refurbish the Redbud Water tank, which will start in September.

Lake waters have been tested routinely for E-Coli through the lab in Culpeper and the most recent one, July 20, 2020 continued to be very good. Water Quality Testing of the Lake normally occurs monthly from May through September. There is no indication to date of the algae bloom or sheen on the water.

Please remember when you are the lake enjoying boating to maintain a safe distance of 100 feet off the Shoreline and if you are pulling floats or tubes, need to have that spotter. Failure to do that could result in the Compliance Committee suspending your recreational privileges for a period of time. Please respect member's docks, boathouses, and seawalls by maintaining that distance away. Please contact the office with any witnessed violations and BRS decal numbers if possible.

When you take the dog for a walk, please clean up his mess in order to prevent others from having to clean that off their shoes or purchase new ones!

Should you witness any activity that appears unlawful contact the Sheriff's Department immediately and also make the office aware of the issue including tag numbers, type of vehicle, and if by chance you know the individual(s). Your identity will not be disclosed by them. If you experience an event that is not neighborhood friendly, please contact the Sheriff Office immediately. Their non-emergency # is 967-1234.

When you mow your lawn, don't dispose of grass clippings down a storm drain. Grass clippings degrade water quality. Leave them on your lawn or compost them.

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BLUE RIDGE SHORES POA RULES OF OPERATION FOR GOLF CARTS

- 1. Golf carts are limited to self-propelled vehicle that is designed to transport persons playing golf and their equipment on a golf course.
- 2. Must be registered with the Association and obtain an annual decal.
- 3. Must provide evidence of insurance at Virginia minimum and maintained in the golf cart at all times.
- 4. Must possess a valid state driver's license.
- 5. Must comply with all laws pertaining to the use and possession of alcoholic beverages.
- 6. Only the number of people the golf cart is designed to seat may ride in the golf cart. Passengers shall not be carried on the part of the golf cart designed to carry golf bags or other equipment.
- 7. Must be operated to the extreme right of the roadway and must yield to all vehicles and pedestrian traffic
- 8. Shall be operated only between sunrise and sunset, unless equipped with such lights as are required in Section 46.2-1010 (Virginia Code)
- 9. Shall not be operated during inclement weather, or when visibility is impaired by weather, smoke, fog or other conditions.
- 10. Shall display a slow-moving vehicle emblem in conformity with Section 46.2-1081 (Virginia Code)
