JUNE SPEAKER



Bill Gladson was elected State Attorney for the Fifth Judicial Circuit in November of 2020. He is a former law enforcement officer and career prosecutor with over 20 years of trial experience. As State Attorney, Bill leads a team of over 250 employees who serve the citizens of Citrus, Hernando, Lake, Marion, and Sum-

ter Counties, an area encompassing more than 1.2 million people.

A life-long Floridian, Bill graduated from the University of Florida in 1994 with a bachelor's degree in criminology and received his Juris Doctor from St. Thomas University School of Law in Miami in 1997. During his career at the State Attorney's Office, Bill has prosecuted all types of crimes, from misdemeanors, to capital murder cases. In 2005, Bill was promoted to supervisor of Lake County, and later served as supervisor of Sumter, Hernando and Marion Counties. In 2018, Bill was appointed to the position of Executive Director, where he oversaw a budget of nearly 20 million dollars and was responsible for the overall fiscal management of the Fifth Judicial Circuit State Attorney's Office.

Bill is a graduate of the National District Attorney's Association Career Prosecutor School in Charleston, SC, as well as the Florida Department of Law Enforcement's Senior Leadership Academy in Tallahassee. He is the former President of the Florida Criminal Justice Executive Institute Association and served two terms on the Florida Bar's Fifth Circuit Grievance Committee. Bill is currently on the Board at the College of Central Florida Foundation, where he serves on the Executive Committee.

HISTORY OF THE ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS

History of the Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and the Clean Water Act. The history of the USACE can be traced back to June 16, 1775, when

the Continental Congress organized an Army with a Chief Engineer and two assistants. In 1794, Congress organized a Corps of Artillerists and Engineers, but it was not until 1802 that it reestablished a separate Corps of Engineers. At the same time, Congress established a new military academy at West Point, New York. Until 1866, the superintendent of the academy was always an Engineer Officer. During the first half of the 19th century, West Point was the principal and for a while, the only engineering school in the country.

From the beginning, many politicians wanted the Corps to contribute to both military construction and works "of a civil nature." Throughout the 19th century, the Corps supervised the construction of coastal fortifications and mapped much of the American West with the Corps of Topographical Engineers. The Corps of Engineers also constructed lighthouses, helped develop jetties and piers for harbors, and carefully mapped the navigation channels. The Corps' canal-building efforts continued in the 20th century. After the federal government purchased the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal in 1919, the Corps' Wilmington, Delaware District directed a reconstruction effort to deepen the channel to 12 feet and add (Continued on page 10)

several bridges. Traffic soon increased, and as an immediate result, demands were made to enlarge it. Today, the Corps retains responsibility for this canal and the entire intracoastal waterway of which it is a part. The Jacksonville District services the State of Florida, the Territory of Puerto Rico and the Territory of the US Virgin Islands. The District is led by a Colonel and a Senior Civilian responsible for a \$550 M annual operating budget and a workforce of approximately 900 civilian employees.

Section 404 of the Clean Water Act requires authorization from the Secretary of the Army, acting through the Corps of Engineers, for the discharge of dredged or fill material into all waters of the United States, including wetlands.

Discharges of fill material generally include: placement of fill that is necessary for the construction of any structure, or impoundment requiring rock, sand, dirt, for its construction; site-development fills for recreational, industrial, commercial, residential, and other uses; causeways or road fills; dams and dikes; artificial islands; property protection or reclamation such as riprap, seawalls, breakwaters, and revetments; and any other work involving the discharge of fill or (Continued on page 15)

dredged material. A Corps permit is required whether the work is permanent or temporary. Examples of temporary discharges include dewatering of dredged material prior to final disposal, and temporary fills for access roadways, cofferdams, storage and work areas

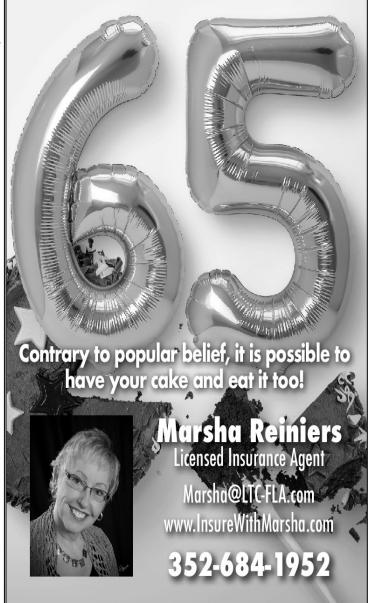

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HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS

June 1st starts Hurricane Season.

Here are some tips to prepare you:

- •Know where to go. If you are ordered to evacu- •Make a family emergency communication plan. ate, know the local hurricane evacuation route (s) to take and have a plan for where you can stay. Contact your local emergency management agency for more information.
- •Put together a disaster supply kit, including a flashlight, batteries, cash, first aid supplies, and copies of your critical information if you need to evacuate
- •If you are not in an area that is advised to evacuate and you decide to stay in your home, plan for adequate supplies in case you lose power and water for several days and you are not able to leave due to flooding or blocked roads.
- •Many communities have text or email alerting systems for emergency notifications. To find out what alerts are available in your area, search the Internet with your town, city, or county name and the word "alerts."

Prepare your home:

Hurricane winds can cause trees and branches

to fall, so before hurricane season trim or remove damaged trees and limbs to keep you and your property safe.

- •Secure loose rain gutters and downspouts and within 36 hrs. clear any clogged areas or debris to prevent Steps to take: water damage to your property.
- •Reduce property damage by retrofitting to secure and reinforce the roof, windows and •Check-in with family and friends by texting or doors, including the garage doors.
- •Purchase a portable generator or install a gener- •Follow the hurricane timeline preparedness ator for use during power outages. Remember to keep generators and other alternate power/ heat sources outside, at least 20 feet away from windows and doors and protected from moisture; and NEVER try to power the house wiring by plugging a generator into a wall outlet.

Hurricane watch = conditions possible within the next 48 hrs.

Steps to take:

- •Review your evacuation route(s) & listen to local officials.
- •Review the items in your disaster supply kit; and add items to meet the household needs for

children, parents, individuals with disabilities or other access and functional needs or pets.

Hurricane warning = conditions are expected

- •Follow evacuation orders from local officials. if
- using social media.
- checklist, depending on when the storm is anticipated to hit and the impact that is projected for your location.





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To assemble your kit store items in airtight plastic bags and put your entire disaster supplies kit in one or two easy-to-carry containers such as plastic bins or a duffel bag.

A basic emergency supply kit could include the following recommended items:

Water (one gallon per person per day for several days, for drinking and sanitation)

Food (at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food)

- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert
- Flashlight
- First aid kit
- Extra batteries
- Whistle (to signal for help)
- Dust mask (to help filter contaminated air)
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape (to shelter in place)
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties (for personal sanitation)
- Wrench or pliers (to turn off utilities)
- Manual can opener (for food)
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery

Consider adding the following items to your emergency supply kit based on your individual needs:

Masks (for everyone ages 2 and above), soap, hand sanitizer, disinfecting wipes to disinfect surfaces Prescription medications

- Non-prescription medications such as pain relievers, anti-diarrhea medication, antacids or laxatives
- Prescription eyeglasses and contact lens solution
- Infant formula, bottles, diapers, wipes and diaper rash cream
- Pet food and extra water for your pet
- Cash or traveler's checks
- Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records saved electronically or in a waterproof, portable container
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person
- Complete change of clothing appropriate for your climate and sturdy shoes
- Fire extinguisher
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates, paper towels and plastic utensils
- Paper and pencil
- Books, games, puzzles or other activities for children
