HE EMPTIED HIMSELF FOR US!

Lk. 19:28-40; Is. 50:4-7; Ps. 22:8-9, 17-20, 23-24; Phil. 2:6-11; Lk. 22:14-23:56

"Christ Jesus, though He was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, He emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave...becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross."

Today is Palm Sunday - a day when the universal Church gathers to celebrate the triumphant entry of Christ into Jerusalem to accomplish the Paschal Mystery of his suffering, death and resurrection. This day is otherwise called Passion Sunday, because the theme of Christ's suffering, crucifixion and death begins with the reading of the passion narrative. Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week, which is the heart of the Church year. The word holy is used to describe this week because it highlights the week as unique and most holy in the yearly cycle of Christian Calendar.

When we began this Lenten journey on Ash Wednesday, Prophet Joel exhorted us "To return to (the Lord) with your whole heart, with fasting, and weeping, and mourning; Rend your hearts, not your garments, and return to the Lord, your God." During this season of Lent, you and I have been "fasting, weeping and mourning" while waiting for the glory of the Lord. We have been preparing ourselves as we anticipate the Easter mysteries. The Passion narratives which we hear today and Good Friday and culminates in the proclamation of the resurrection of our Lord, is an invitation for us to engage and to contemplate on the unqualified love of God for us. Jesus Christ, even though He was God emptied Himself and suffered a shameful death on the cross, so that, by His wounds you and I might be saved.

Unlike few other liturgies, Holy Week liturgy engages us, a worshipping community, in bodily movement. We solemnly process on Passion Sunday with blessed palms - the people of God and their priests gather together with their bishop (archbishop) to bless the sacred oils - parishioners gather with their parish priests to celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday when, as imitators of Christ's simplicity and humility, they stooped down to wash the feet of the faithful - on Good Friday, we all move silently and reverently to kiss the Cross - on Easter Vigil we all gather together to light the fire and the Paschal candle, and thus process joyously with lighted candles into the Church where the *Exsultet* is proclaimed and ultimately we commemorate Christ's triumph over death at Easter. All these liturgical acts culminate in our proclamation of the faith and the renewal of our baptismal promises on Easter Sunday. We are a people on the move through history, caught up body and spirit in the unfolding drama of the cross and resurrection.

The "drama of the cross and resurrection" invites us to imitate Christ in His selfless love for humanity. Our love for our fellow brothers and sisters must be a love that goes beyond lip service - a love that frees us from pretenses and help us to die to ourselves and live for others. Thus, the Lord Jesus says, "This is my commandment: Love one another as I have loved you. There is no greater love than this, to give one's life for one's friend" (John 15:13). On Good Friday, we celebrate the manifestation of Christ's love for us when He delivered Himself to "evil men" to be crucified in order to take away our sins. Therefore, the Passion of Christ, which we commemorate on Good Friday, is a story of true love – a love that is always present despite appearances to the contrary. In the Passion, faced with His imminent crucifixion and death, Jesus said: "Now my soul is in distress...Father, save me from this hour...But, I have come because of this hour...Father, glorify Your Name!" The Passion itself might be a disheartening story - a sad one, indeed, but it is a story of our liberation. "Unless the grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains a single grain; but if it dies, it produces much fruit" (John 12:24). This is the paradox of our Christian faith; Christ had to die so that we might have life. We are also called to die to self if we must bear fruit for others to benefit. Unlike Judas, we must not kill the Jesus Who lives in us - unlike Pilate, we must not shy away from speaking the truth - unlike Peter, we must always stand up for our Christian belief. Do not take sides with the majority, the powerful and/or the influential members of the society to persecute Jesus in the voiceless, the poor and the simplest of men.
