

This is not the first time Mark's Gospel introduces little children into a scene involving Jesus and his disciples. We cast our minds back to a couple of week's ago and the argument that took place amongst the followers of Jesus as to who is the greatest amongst them and who should hold the greatest power or authority.

Jesus in turn places the child before them and says, when they welcome the most vulnerable and weakest of our world, they welcome Jesus. Their minds should not be focused on such trivial things as power. You would think they have learnt their lesson and yet when the little children come forward today to be close to Jesus, or as the Gospel says, for Jesus to place his hands on them,' look at what happens. The disciples rebuke them! If ever there was a clearer example of how difficult Jesus had it with his disciples, then this is it. Have they not learnt anything? The kindness they are to show to these little ones is the gateway into the Kingdom of God. Do not hinder these children, for the Kingdom belongs to such as these.

REFLECT

ithin the Jewish tradition, a high rate of divorce existed despite the place marriage held in society. Marriage was the ideal, and therefore, during many discussions between rabbis, the hot topic of divorce usually came to the fore. It's indeed a topic of discussion for our own times, with various statistics from the United States and UK and Ireland indicating that the rate of divorce remains high. And the reasons for divorce are varied and it's impossible to pinpoint one single reason why so many marriages end, sometimes after a short time, sometimes after a couple have spent nearly a lifetime together. It's interesting to note in today's gospel, that very little has changed. It is often said that all divorce from other people, particularly in marriage, is sad. But constancy is difficult, and not all interpersonal relationships are able to fully reflect the ideal. Jesus is quick to point to the Jewish law on divorce and remarriage. And most of us are familiar with the Church rules on such matters. We continue to place the ideal of marriage at the heart of our church and our society. From a faith perspective, Jesus' vision of marriage is made in heaven where marriage is a sign of his union with the Church. We give thanks for the Sacrament of Marriage in our Church, and we pray for all couples preparing for their wedding day at this time.

DO

Make an attempt in the coming week to articulate what the Eucharist means to you. What happens during your short time at mass that brings you back again?

SAY

Lord Jesus Christ, nourish me with your body and blood so that I may become what I receive in showing your loving presence to the world.

LEARN

Spread love wherever you go. Let no one ever come to you without leaving happier.
