First Reading: Amos 8:4-7

The Lord God spoke against those who buy the poor for money.

'Listen to this, you who trample on the needy and try to suppress the poor people of the country, you who say, 'When will New Moon be over so that we can sell our corn, and sabbath, so that we can market our wheat? Then by lowering the bushel, raising the shekel, by swindling and tampering with the scales, we can buy up the poor for money, and the needy for a pair of sandals, and get a price even for the sweepings of the wheat.' The Lord swears it by the pride of Jacob, 'Never will I forget a single thing you have done.

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 112:1-2,4-8 **R**/ Praise the Lord who lifts up the poor.

Second Reading: Timothy 2:1-8

Let prayers be offered to God for everyone; he wants all people to be saved.

My advice is that, first of all, there should be prayers offered for everyone – petitions, intercessions and thanksgiving – and especially for kings and others in authority, so that we may be able to live religious and reverent lives in peace and quiet. To do this is right, and will please God our saviour: he wants everyone to be saved and reach full knowledge of the truth. For there is only one God, and there is only one mediator between God and mankind, himself a man, Christ Jesus, who sacrificed himself as a ransom for them all. He is the evidence of this, sent at the appointed time, and I have been named a herald and apostle of it and – I am telling the truth and no lie – a teacher of the faith and the truth to the pagans. In every place, then, I want the men to lift their hands up reverently in prayer, with no anger or argument.

Alleluia, alleluia! Jesus Christ was rich but he became poor, to make you rich out of his poverty. Alleluia!

Gospel: Luke 16:1-13

You cannot be slaves both of God and of money.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There was a rich man and he had a steward who was denounced to him for being wasteful with his property. He called for the man and said, "What is this I hear about you? Draw me up an account of your stewardship because you are not to be my steward any longer." Then the steward said to himself, "Now that my master is taking the stewardship from me, what am I to do? Dig? I am not strong enough. Go begging? I should be too ashamed. Ah, I know what I will do to make sure that when I am dismissed from office there will be some to welcome me into their homes."

'Then he called his master's debtors one by one. To the first he said, "How much do you owe my master?" "One hundred measures of oil," was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond; sit down straight away and write fifty." To another he said, "And you, sir, how much do you owe?" "One hundred measures of wheat," was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond and write eighty."

'The master praised the dishonest steward for his astuteness. For the children of this world are more astute in dealing with their own kind than are the children of light.

'And so I tell you this: use money, tainted as it is, to win you friends, and thus make sure that when it fails you, they will welcome you into the tents of eternity. The man who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great; the man who is dishonest in little things will be dishonest in great. If then you cannot be trusted with money, that tainted thing, who will trust you with genuine riches? And if you cannot be trusted with what is not yours, who will give you what is your very own?

'No servant can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second, or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.'

Living As Children of the Light

Today, the readings point in different ways to issues of social justice. Christians are urged to look beyond ourselves and not neglect these issues. Corruption and self-interest has different forms these days than in the days of the prophet Amos, but still corrode community life. The inequitable sharing of the world's resources that horrifically disables the most vulnerable people and contributes even further to world tensions, is a matter of concern for all Christians.

The situation in the letter to Timothy, though different from ours has similarities. Christians then had no possibility of manipulating the levers of power of the Roman Empire just as the Church cannot manipulate the political processes of today. However, Christians still have great responsibility as citizens. We are bound to contribute to the common welfare, at whatever level we are involved and to have no part in any forms of corruption or abuse of the rights of others. We must support legitimate authority; bear good will towards our fellow citizens and work with them to make a just society. Our greatest contribution in living by our Christian values for the vitality of a human community comes from the values to which its citizens are committed.

In today's gospel, Luke brings home to his fellow Christians the responsibilities and dangers brought by this world's possessions. All will be well in this area of our social responsibility if we can look beyond the material things that are a necessary part of our lives. The Church is called not to be a competitor in the game of politics but to contribute to the wellbeing of the human community, by the witness and example it gives. Our lives, and the quality of our relationships as a Christian community, should demonstrate that living according to the ways of Christ is not a bondage, but a way of working towards a just world.


The parable of the unjust steward is tricky. Was the master praising the steward for making fraudulent changes to his debtors' promissory notes, or for forgoing claims for

the commissions? In either case the lesson is clear: those dedicated to worldly pursuits are often more wholehearted in their projects than believers are in promoting the ways of God. (Fr John Thornhill SM, The Emmaus Series)

During the year of mercy, when Pope Francis invited Christians to open our hearts and to show mercy, he was reminding us that like Jesus we are called to be human expressions of God's love in practical ways - not just in our small Christian communities, but by maintaining connections with our broader community, and speaking up for the excluded of our world.

"The mercy of God is not some beautiful idea but rather a concrete action.

There is no mercy without concreteness."



Catholic Week for the Environment (16th- 23rd September)

Pope Francis offers a vision of an interrelated world in which what we do well or badly in one of our relationships will affect all our other relationships. Our environment is not part of the world; it is our whole and only world. If we exploit and pollute the natural world, we shall also foul and put at risk our entire human world.

Many of us find it difficult to make care for the environment a personal priority because there seems to be such a large gap between anything we can do and the large realities of the environment - global warming, desertification, rising sea levels, the tension between the need for power and the threat to the environment posed by fossil fuels, and so on. But when we see the world as a network of relationships in which all is interconnected, we can work at seeking integrity in the relationships that shape our own lives.

From this perspective our commitment to address the big environmental issues of our day begins with the small details of our daily life.
