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The President's Message - September 2019

THE ELEPHANT IN THE ROOM

In the August 2, 2019 Wall Street Journal there was an article on the front page – "Middle-Class Debt Swamps Families" and the subtitle "Cars, colleges and housing have become more costly, but wages for many have barely budged". It affects people both inside and outside the church.

The number that I was drawn to concerned student debt, which totaled about \$1.5 trillion last year, exceeding all other forms of consumer debt except mortgages. Tuition has gone up significantly at public and private colleges in the past 20 years - as of June 2018, *Forbes* reported that the average student debt was \$38,390. Our church workers are no exception to this.

The January LCMS *Reporter* published a recent survey that shows one of every two church workers in our synod experiences stress from financial concerns. Those concerns, in large part, come from significant education debt coupled with increasing living expenses associated with our workers' traditionally growing families.

It is not surprising that many of our church workers met each other at one of our Concordias, got married and both finished college with debt. Add the cost of seminary on top of that, and we have a problem.

On the LCMS worker wellness website, one author put it this way: "No one ever got into the ministry looking for the big bucks. It's true. But when we pulled out of the seminary parking lot and into the parsonage garage, I thought that with a regular paycheck and some savings in the bank, it might at least get a little easier. Truth: money is a struggle for all people, all the time."

Talking about money is difficult. It is very personal. What's more, having financial problems is often perceived as a weakness, both in and outside the church. It's the elephant in the room, and all too often, our hesitancy to discuss it leads to financial crises that harm our workers and ministries.

To that end, the North Wisconsin District (NWD) has established the Professional Church Worker Debt Relief Fund for our called workers. This is in direct response to a resolution passed at our 2018 District convention, namely "That Professional Church Workers of the North Wisconsin District and congregations and/or entities that they serve be encouraged to engage in open and loving conversation regarding these issues...and that congregations be further encouraged to become aware of and utilize whatever resources may be available in order to alleviate this problem." (Resolution 18-06)

Simply put, the goal is to render financial assistance to our needlest workers through a designated fund that addresses the issue head-on. To build it, we need your prayers and gifts.

May I encourage you to do the following? First, read Bill Jordan's article in this issue that explains a bit more about the Fund. Second, pray about it and see where the Lord leads you. It was the Apostle Paul who wrote the Corinthians encouraging them to help the saints in Jerusalem with an offering just as the Macedonians had contributed. He said, "But as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in all earnestness, and in our love for you—see that you excel in this act of grace also (2 Corinthians 8:7). I hope you prayerfully consider and will "excel".

We each have very real physical, emotional, spiritual, relational, financial, intellectual, and vocational needs. At any given moment, one of these needs might require more attention than another.



If you are a member reading this, consider how you might offer care to your pastor and other workers. What needs might your church workers have that go unmet because of limited resources of time, money, energy, or earthly consequences like embarrassment or shame?

In recent years, I have had the opportunity to have in-depth interactions — in person, on the telephone, and by email — with workers and asking, "What are the most pressing needs of LCMS pastors?"

Five needs emerged as the highest priorities.

- 1. Pastors need safe places and people with whom they can be transparent, express problems and needs, and find help and encouragement to carry on.
- 2. Pastors need a faithful, disciplined personal life of prayer and devotion.
- 3. Pastors need to lead by team-building, equipping, and mobilizing.
- 4. Pastors need help in reaching our postmodern, post-churched culture with the gospel.
- 5. Pastors need a healthy marriage, family, balance, and boundaries.



Managing God's Money

NWD Church Worker Debt Relief

President Lueck's article makes a great case for the formation of a church worker debt relief fund in our district. My purpose here is to flesh that out a bit, and provide next steps should you feel led to partner with us in building it.

In brief, our goal is to build a dedicated fund balance, invest it, and award multiple debt relief grants annually from interest earned. The larger the fund balance, the more grants will be available for yearly distribution. Much has yet to be worked out by way of amounts and eligibility - but we envision information being made available on our website each year, with submitted applications being reviewed by a committee that considers each case based on financial need and available funding.

We would also ask the awardees' employers to provide a matching gift, therefore maximizing the financial impact and sending a strong message of loving and tangible support from the worker's home congregation.

Our success in this mission depends largely on contributions from NWD congregations and their individual members. At our NWD Adult Gathering on October 1 (please see our website for details), we'll be providing attendees with specifics on how to give to the fund. 



Counselor Corner

THE PEACE FORMULA

It is the desire of every pastor. It is the goal of Christ for His church.

We are talking about peace in the pews...and throughout the church. Unity and peace—these are attainable goals within Christ's church.

The apostle Paul offers a formula for such success in his letter to the Colossian church—

"Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness and patience, bearing with one another, forgiving each other, as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body." (3:12-15)

One body united in peace. This is a Christ-centered peace that transcended human design. It is forged and sustained in holy love.

Such love places a priority on Christ-centered forgiveness. This is unconditional forgiveness tied to the same form of love. One could define ""for-give"" as—"For" you I "give" full love, as Christ also gives to me and you."

Here a human analogy can be applied. Doctors estimate that 70% of illness is tied to stress. In the church, 70% of conflict and division is tied to a lack of love. Forgiveness is side-lined. Personal agendas dominate over Christ's. Stress is present instead of peace. Stress--the great "dis-ease" within the church.

Pastors are impacted by the stress. They are one peacemaker among so many. Their impact can be lost amidst the critical minority and silent majority.

A pastor's heart can be hardened by the "dark" emotions of fear, frustration, guilt and loneliness. God's "light" emotions of joy and love can be over-shadowed.

What can be lost in the midst of the restlessness is resiliency. The "bounce" is deflated. What is lost is a vibrant ministry. Ministers can also be lost through burnout when the stress is unresolved.

So we reflect again on Paul's inspired formula for peace. Let it be a strategy for success—for the vibrancy of the church....and the pastor.

Check the Mirror, Pastor — After Five Years, Your Church Looks Like You."

This was the headline of an article that caused me to stop and reflect. If it's true that after five years the congregation I serve will look a lot like me, is that a good thing or a bad thing?

If congregations begin to reflect their pastor over time, it might lead the pastor to think about what he should do to shape his congregation. The pastor will be tempted to think about how he can and should shape it: How can I make my congregation enthusiastic for evangelism? How can I make my congregation take the Word of God seriously and want to study it? How can I shape my congregation to make an impact in our community?

But if those are the first questions the pastor asks, his focus is in the wrong place. When I first read that headline and the accompanying article, the reality that my congregation would reflect me as a pastor felt like a heavy burden to bear. Do I really want my congregation to look like ... me? To paraphrase St. Paul, Do I really want my congregation to look like the chief of sinners?


And yet, St. Paul also wrote in 1 Cor. 11:1, "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ." How can Paul claim to be the chief of sinners and yet say, "be imitators of me"? How can a pastor do the same?

In short, Paul wasn't seeking to have the focus on him, but on Christ. He understood that the example he set would impact how those to whom he was ministering would see Christ. By speaking of himself as the chief of sinners and as the least of the apostles, Paul modeled the reality of the need for Christ and His forgiveness.

Pastors follow Paul's example not when they seek to hold themselves up as the perfect example to be imitated, but when they show the congregation that they too are sinners in need of Jesus. By spending time in God's Word on a daily basis, devoting time to prayer, forgiving and seeking forgiveness quickly, valuing and hungering for the Lord's Supper, and being honest about their weaknesses, pastors model the very things they want to see in the flock they serve.

There's much more to discuss concerning this topic, but I think it starts with pastors echoing the words of John the Baptist: "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30).
