Human Trafficking Panel By Kyle W. McDonnell

On April 30th, 2015, the national chapter of OSSNHS held a panel discussion human on trafficking in collaboration with the Homeland Security Student Association at St. John's University. The discussion was moderated by Homeland Security program director and former DHS employee Dr. Keith Cozine, Ph.D., and featured experts from various agencies and organizations who have front-line experience combating this prescient issue. The panelists shared their own personal experiences with the horrors of human trafficking, as well as the efforts that they have undertaken as part of the law enforcement and nonfor profit communities to stymie the rise of human trafficking across the United States.

Speaking about the prevalence of human trafficking in New York City, Sgt. Gregory Graves, of the NYPD's Vice unit explained that as fast as his unit can infiltrate and incapacitate a human trafficking operation, another one pops up in its place. He went on to explain that fear of law enforcement, due to questionable immigration statuses in the communities where the human trafficking is most prevalent, prevents law enforcement the from garnering kind community support that is necessary to excoriate human trafficking from the areas in New York City that are the hardest hit by it. However, Sgt. Graves remains optimistic that through a combination of public education about the dangers and prevalence of human trafficking, as

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well and letting the people in immigrant communities know that their status in the United States will not be jeopardized if they speak up about it to law enforcement, can be vital to combat this insidious menace. He also explained that it is not the job of the police to try to penalize victims of human trafficking who are forced to work in the sex industry by arresting and in incarcerating them. In lieu of going to jail for a crime that someone else is forcing them to commit, the police often work with the courts to find remedial solutions in the form of programs that help victims of human trafficking working in the sex industry get counseling and support so that they do not have to return to that life.

Another issue that was raised during the discussion was security of our nation's borders, more specifically how smugglers human traffickers are exploiting weaknesses at our borders to move their human cargo unprecedented rate. Special Agent Anthony Scandiffio, of Immigration Customs, and Supervisory Special Agent Anthony Bivona, of the FBI, explained that the lack of man power and resources to patrol the entirety of the length of our nation's borders is precisely what traffickers exploit when moving human beings freely across our borders from the north and south, without fear of being discovered. They explained that traffickers are using new and sophisticated methods to bring their human cargo into the country, even going as far as to

exploit our visa system by providing false or misleading ones to victims as a ploy to get them into the country without having to smuggle them in using clandestine means.

Emily Waters, of Lifeway Network, spoke about the efforts that her organization does to give victims of human trafficking a second lease on life. They try to provide victims with housing and education opportunities, as well as counseling to help mitigate the trauma that they suffer after the years of abuse at the hands of their traffickers. They also provide the victims with pathways to gain legal citizenship, so that they are not forced to return to where they came, where they stand a significant chance of becoming victims of human trafficking again. Ms. Waters explained that it is the mission of her organization to show victims of human trafficking that there is a better life out there for them if they are willing to take a chance and break free of their tormentors, which is often a difficult and potentially dangerous proposition.

The students who were in attendance for the panel discussion were amazed by how prevalent human trafficking was in their own city, and they were equally shocked that this was not getting the kind of coverage in the media that it rightfully deserves. Many students were keen to know how they could personally get involved with preventing and helping people from becoming victims of human trafficking, which was why students set up a table with material on how they could get involved on the Blue Campaign they are heading on campus. It was a very informative and transformative experience for them, and it helped foster and encourage a conversation on an issue that is often overlooked in the milieu of Homeland Security by other issues that get more time in the spotlight.

Honor Society Memorial By Gregory Folkins

It is with great sadness that I inform you about the death of my friend, mentor, and fellow member of the Order of the Sword and Shield.

Benjamin David Moreno was killed in a motorcycle accident on Altamont Pass Road in Mountain House, California east of San Francisco. He was 33. His dedication to protecting the Homeland was evident in all his endeavors. He was medically retired from the Air Force with the rank of First Lieutenant.

While in the Air Force he was a combat air controller. In 2008, he joined the Federal Protective Service as an Inspector. The Federal Protective Service (FPS) is the premier provider of physical and protective security and law enforcement services at U.S. federal government facilities.

FPS plays a leading role in the protection of our nation's critical infrastructure, with lead responsibility for ensuring a safe and secure working environment for federal workers and visitors in approximately 9,000 federal facilities nationwide.

In early 2014, Ben was promoted to Area Commander where he was responsible for conducting comprehensive security assessment vulnerabilities facilities, at developing and implementing protective countermeasures, based on the latest risk management tools and providing uniformed technology, police response and investigative follow-up, providing critical security

services and logistical support at high-profile public events, coordinating vital emergency services and disaster response during and after natural disasters, and engaging federal facility tenants crime prevention seminars, facility security surveys, and intelligence-gathering operations in the Oakland and San Jose areas.

Ben avid was an professional and he expected all around him, including himself, to constantly strive to be better. He recently received a double Master of Science from Henley-Putnam University in Intelligence Management and Terrorism and Counterterrorism Studies with a GPA of 3.841, thus earning induction into the Honor Society.

He loved books, horrible jokes, and video games. He was a swordfighter and martial artist most of his life. He touched countless lives and we are all poorer for his loss. He is survived by Risa, his wife of twelve years, and his two year old daughter Miranda.
