I saw rolling and tossing between Europe and America the billows of the Atlantic, and between Asia and America lay the Pacific.

"'Son of the Republic,' said the same mysterious voice as before, 'look and learn.' At that moment I beheld a dark, shadowy being, like an Angel, standing, or rather floating in mid-air, between Europe and America. Dipping water out of the ocean in the hollow of each hand, he sprinkled some upon America with his right hand, while with his left hand he cast some on Europe. Immediately a cloud raised from these countries, and joined in mid-ocean. For a while it remained stationary, and then moved slowly westward, until it enveloped America in its murky folds. A second time the angel dipped water from the ocean, and sprinkled it out as before. The dark cloud was then drawn back to the ocean, in whose heaving billows it sank from view.

THE RICH MAN AND LAZARUS

Luke 16: 19-31

Let us turn to Luke 16: 19-31, and read carefully the parable of the rich man and Lazarus. A parable is a fictitious narrative; an allegory from which a moral is drawn. The true meaning of a parable is not on the surface, but has a hidden meaning. Therefore it can not be taken literally. A doctrine can not be established simply on a parable, but the interpretation of a parable must correspond with the other teachings of the Bible.

Orthodoxy has told us that the rich man represented all wicked persons who at death go to eternal torment, and the beggar represented all good persons, who at death go to heaven. Let us, however, endeavor to forget the teachings and "traditions of men" and go back to our open Bibles and prayerfully seek to learn the lesson that Christ taught in this parable.

The parable does not say that the rich man was wicked. He was "rich," but it is not a sin to be rich. He "fared sumptuously" and was dressed "in purple and fine linen."

Purple was worn by persons of wealth and high official position, (Esther 8: 15) and especially by kings (Judges 8: 26). It was a sign of royalty, and was put on Christ by the Jews in mockery of His claim. (Mark 15: 17). "Purple and fine linen," were especially used by the Jews in the hangings of the tabernacle (Ex. 25: 4, 26: 1, 31, 36), and were also used in the garments of the Jewish high priest. Ex. 28: 5, 6, 15, 33. 39: 29. We see then, even the very clothing of the rich man, represented the Jewish people.

Neither does the parable say that Lazarus the beggar, was a good man, but that he "laid at the rich man's gate,"—"full of sores,"—"desiring to be fed with the crumbs"—and "the dogs came and licked his sores." Would it he possible to picture a more pitiful, wretched condition? Do you believe that Christ would represent His glorious Church, by this sick beggar in this God-forsaken, poverty-stricken state? Surely not. If a beggar of this terrible descrip-

tion lay at your gate, would you at once recognize him as one of God's elect, a child of the King? I am sure that David would not, for he said, "I have been young, and now am old; yet have I not seen the righteous forsaken, nor his seed begging bread." The beggar then can not represent God's chosen people but must represent the Gentile people, who up to this time, had not been given the promises and blessings of Abraham. Eph. 2: 11-13.

The beggar died and was carried, not to heaven, but "into Abraham's bosom." Now we know this was not a literal bosom, as Abraham had been dead many hundreds of years and long since returned to dust, but Lazarus (the Gentiles) were "carried into Abraham's bosom" spiritually, being made heirs to all God had promised to Abraham. Rom. 3: 29. Gal. 3: 7, 8, 9, 14, 28, 29. Col. 3: 11.

"The rich man also died, and was buried." An end came like death, and he ceased to exist in his former state. And in hell, he lifted up his eyes, being in torments, and seeth Abraham afar off, and Lazarus "in his bosom." (In the folds of his mantle. Emphatic Diaglott).

In the 24th verse the rich man calls for help, not to God, but to "Father Abraham" which makes it very plain then that he (the rich man) was a descendant, son of Abraham, representing the Jewish people, who were at that very time, looking to Abraham, saying, "Abraham is our father." (John 8: 39) and rejecting the promised Messiah, thus casting themselves into the "torments" that they are still in.

In the 25th verse, Abraham acknowledges the relationship, "Son remember that thou IN THY LIFETIME (the Jewish dispensation was now ended) received good things." How wonderfully God had blessed the Jews, His chosen people—"And likewise Lazarus evilthings." Up to this time, the Gentiles had been counted as dogs, (Mat. 15: 26, 27). Mark 7, 26-28). "Now he (Lazarus the Gentiles) is comforted." While Jesus was giving them this parable the Jews

"derided Him" (Verse 14) while the Gentiles, "publicans and sinners," drew near unto Him to hear Him (Luke 15: 1). The law and the prophets were until John, since that time the Kingdom of God is preached and every man (Jew and Gentile) presseth into it. Verse 16. Read also Rom. 11th Chapter.

Is there not still "a great gulf fixed" (verse 26) between the Jews and other nations, for though scettered "among all nations, like as corn is sifted in a sieve," (Amos 9: 9) yet the Jews are still a separate people.

The "five brethren" also had "Moses and the prophets" and Abraham said, "Let them hear them." Had they done so, they would not have crucified the Christ, and they did not believe though Christ "rose from the dead."

Now read the 15th Chapter of Luke, and in the description Christ gave of the "elder brother" in the parable of the prodigal son, you will see a very true picture of how the Jews felt toward Christ, and the "publicans and sinners" to whom He was giving the Gospel.

We understand that the parable of the rich man and Lazarus, has no reference to the future state of the dead whatever, and is to me, not a blood-curdling picture of eternal torment as some have painted it, but a most marvelous and prophetic description of the closing of the Jewish dispensation and the budding in of the Gentiles, and what would happen to the Jews, who truly have been in "outer darkness," despised, hated and persecuted ever since the time when they said, "His blood be on us and our children."

Christ marvelled at the faith of the centurion and said, "I have not found so great faith, no, not in Israel—and I say unto you, that many shall come from the east and west (Gentiles) and shall sit down with Abraham, and Isaac, and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven. But the children of the kingdom (Jews) shall be cast out into outer darkness: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth." (Matt. 8: 10-12). This Scripture is literally being fulfilled in the "Wailing Place"

WHAT ABOUT THE FINNS?

Probably the average person in this country has a rather vague conception of the Finns and their country. Some one has well said that one thing which the political and military movements across the waters is doing is to make us study our geographies and it might be added—our histories. In recent months the brutal aggressions of Russia against tiny Finland has turned the flood-lights on that land of lakes, forests, and cold.

We have known it to be a land of the far North, a land of long, hard winters and low-lying areas. We have thought of the Finns as a fair-haired race, akin to the Russians, occupied with their herds and their fields or their fisheries along the extensive coast lines.

Now we have learned something more. It is a land of heroes, a land of faith, a land of industry and of honor. "Fight and Pray" is Finland's watchword.

The writer's interest in Finland dates back some years to the time when he became acquinted with the teachings of the sainted Charles F. Parham. He showed the Danes to be the present day representatives of the tribe of Dan. With them are to be included all other Scandinavian peoples. Others of the Lost Ten Tribes have as their descendants the Anglo-Saxon and Celtic races of the leading countries of the world.

Ancient Israel is still living. Not in the Jews alone, who form a very small and adulterated portion, but more especially and principally in the peopes of the Christian and democratic countries.

Once we asked an educated Norwegian lady what the difference as to the physical characteristics between the Norwegians and the Swedes were. Her reply was, "The Swedes are more like the Finns."

While it is true that the Eastern Finns consider themselves to be of Mongolian stock, it is equally true that the Western Finns are very closely related to the Swedes and so are Scandinavians. The basis of this resemblance lies in the historical fact of large Swedish settlements in Finland.

But we have an even greater evidence of the Finns being people of Israel in the statement that they are ninety-nine per cent Christian and of these more than ninety-five

per cent are said to be Lutherans. One prophet after another predicted the fall of the House of Israel because of her sins, foretold banishments but also that yet in her latter day, Israel would be saved. That then God's messengers would come to her with the Gospel of His ever blessed Son and would be accepted. These prophecies have been fulfilled in Finland.

The Christian and gospel peoples are the Israel peoples. True, they come far short of perfection, but compared with other peoples they far excel.

By her love of education, truth and liberty, by her democracy and by her faith Finland must be rated as a "pocket" of Israel in Europe. And by the same sign she must endure.

God said to Israel—"Thou art my battle axe and weapons of war; for with thee will I break in pieces the nations, and with thee will I destroy kingdoms." Jer. 50: 20.

Finland's heroic defense of her soil against overwhelming odds gave valiant proof of her sharing this with other Israel Peoples. Her recent pact with her godless foe leaves much to be desired, but it does assure her continued existence (a fulfillment of prophecy) and further it does make certain that the theatre of the war will move to the Balkans and the near East (Palestine) where presently we shall see God making mighty execution on all who hate Him with His battle axe and weapons of war. Praise His name.

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FORSAKING ALL FOR CHRIST

When we speak of forsaking something very dear to us, we sometimes think, it's much, I'll not give up this thing. I know it's not displeasing to God. Such foolish thoughts, when God is really trying to clean us up and make something out of us; yet we fight back and pretend we don't know His voice, and listen to the voice which we know is of the devil or our own conscience. I read an article one time which admonished young people to always listen to the smaller voice, because the will to do wrong seems to be so much the stronger.

FORSAKE-what a big word in one sense: yet just a seven letter word. On this word stands the true test of discipleship. We can't put love of father and mother; even the friendship of our dearest friends, should not keep us from being true soldiers of the cross. Oh, yes, we give excuses. "We can't do this or that because of something," but every man has to answer to God and when we stand before God it's not going to be "Did so and so let you do this?" but the question is "Did you do what I called you to do?" "Did you forsake father, mother, friends, if need be to follow me?" Jesus says, "Take up thy cross and follow me. Taking up our cross means an absolute surrender of our own desires and ambitions and a complete surrender to the will of God. If we know God has called us for a particular work and yet choose to leave Him out and choose a way for ourselves, no matter how satisfying it may seemwe have lost hold of eternal life; and after all that's the thing we are striving for, is it not? While on the other hand if we put to death our own desires and accept the whole plan of God-make a complete consecration-we shall find eternal life. Now that's not so much to give up, is it? Only our own plans for the plans of God, and His are so much wiser, we are making a wonderful trade, and we get the best end of the trade.

We remember at the testing time of Jesus; as He prayed in Gethsemane and went through such intense suffering for the world, how that the Bible says, "The disciples forsook Him and fled. (Mark 14: 50). Those whom

He had loved, lived with, called, and taught; nevertheless in the hour of trial they forsook Him, and then ran for fear of what man might do or say.
