

"...satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday." Isaiah 58:10


When emergencies like natural disasters or conflict arise, many families must flee their homes, leaving their belongings behind. When they arrive in a refugee camp or other place of safety, they are scared, vulnerable and dirty from the travel. The simple items included in a Personal Care Kit allow them to wash away the dirt and sweat, with the fresh scent of soap and the softness of a towel as reminders of someone's care and concern for them in their plight.

Items may be brought to the church during the Lenten Season.

Each kit includes:

- One light-weight bath-size towel (20" X 40" to 52" X 27"), dark color recommended.
- Two or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping; no mini or hotel size bars.
- One adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging.
- One sturdy comb, (no picks or fine-toothed combs);
- One metal nail clippers (attached file optional)

If you wish to participate, but rather have someone else do the shopping, please place your donation in an envelope on the offering plate marked "Personal Care Kits."



A Brief Look At Some Summer Hill History By Harry Schwenk

Throughout the years of St. Paul's Lutheran Church history, the local newspapers have covered the important events in the life of the church. Detailed articles were published about the Confirmation Reunions in the 1930's, 1940's, and 1950's. The burning of the old church, the cornerstone laying, and the dedication of the new church were fully covered with articles and photos of these events. In addition to the local newspapers, the dedication of the new St. Paul's Lutheran Church was also featured in the August 9, 1961 issue of "The Lutheran." Two photos were included with the article. One photo was of Pastor Steigerwalt opening the front door of the church, with members of the congregation in the background. The other photo was titled "Inside New Summer Hill Church" with Pastor Steigerwalt standing at the altar and the choir and Building Committee members during the Processional to the front of the church.

Pottsville- Dedication of the new St. Paul's Church, Summer Hill (Auburn R.D.), was held June 25, with Pastor Clarence A. Steigerwalt, D.D., conducting the service.

The former Summer Hill building, used by Lutheran and Reformed congregations, was destroyed by fire on December 13, 1958. Since then, each group has built its own church.

St. Paul's dates back to 1767. The building demolished by fire was built in 1847. The new church and fellowship hall cost \$200,000. The structure is of contemporary split-level design of stone quarried in the Lehigh Valley. The nave seats 252.

The Rev. Luther F. Schlenker, Pennsylvania Ministerium official, delivered the dedicatory service. Assisting in the liturgy was The Rev. Craig J. Dorward, Jonestown.

Dedication of the church's new pipe organ was July 2nd, with Mrs. Craig Dorward, daughter of Pastor and Mrs. Steigerwalt, the guest organist.

SYNOD NEWS



Love for the Least

The Global Missions Team at the Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit, Emmaus, PA, led an advent appeal this past holiday season to support the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) at Arusha Lutheran Medical Center in Tanzania, which was established by ELCA medical missionary Dr. Mark Jacobson, and also had the opportunity to lead the church's worship services on their annual Global Missions Sunday, held this year on January 22, 2023, to share about this ministry with those in attendance.

When a baby is born prematurely in Tanzania, it is considered as good as dead. Premature babies there are often referred to as 'stillbirths.' This was not acceptable to the staff of Arusha Lutheran Medical Center. Fifteen years ago they began to offer neonatal intensive care, and pediatrician Dr. Steve Swanson joined the program in 2011. Initially they were only able to save 4% of the babies. Today they serve almost 400 babies annually, and the survival rate in 2022 was 92%.

The care at the Arusha Lutheran Medical Center NICU is the best in Tanzania, and in most of East Africa. No baby is turned away because of inability to pay or insurance status. The five doctors and 26 nurses who staff the NICU do not just care for the tiny infants, but for the parents as well. A hospital bed and meals are provided to every mother with a baby in the NICU and both parents are encouraged and coached on how to interact with their babies.

Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit raised \$3,785 from their Love for the Least appeal to be directed to the Arusha Lutheran Medical Center NICU in Tanzania, and 175 preemie knit or crochet hats were lovingly crafted for the NICU infants, which they hope to send to Tanzania. These hats can save lives by helping to keep the babies warm.


