32nd Sunday Ordinary Year C Luke 20:27-38



"Some Sadducees, those who deny that there is a resurrection, came forward and put this question to Jesus, saying, "Teacher, Moses wrote for us, If someone's brother dies leaving a wife but no child, his brother must take the wife and raise up descendants for his brother. Now there were seven brothers: the first married a woman but died childless. Then the second and the third married her, and likewise all the seven died childless. Finally the woman also died. Now at the resurrection whose wife will that woman be? For all seven had been married to her." Jesus said to them, "The children of this age marry and remarry; but those who are deemed worthy to attain to the coming age and to the resurrection of the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. They can no longer die, for they are like angels; and they are the children of God because they are the ones who will rise. That the dead will rise even Moses made known in the passage about the bush, when he called out 'Lord, 'the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob; and he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive."

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

32nd Sunday Ordinary Year C Luke 20:27-38

The Sadducees challenge Jesus with a 'brain teaser' dilemma. Up front, in the spirit of full disclosure, we are told that the Sadducees do not believe in the resurrection of the dead. I have a good question for them: Why do they limit what God can do? Surely they know about the resurrection scene of dry bones from the prophet Ezekiel in 37:1-14? But, in fact, the Sadducees also did not believe that the prophets were inspired of God. The only written Word of God that they accepted was the Torah, the first five books of the Bible. So Ezekiel is not accepted divine testimony for them. But as we will see later on, Jesus tries to appeal to them even quoting their Torah to them (more on that in a moment). But we can expect that the Sadducees, as opponents to Jesus generally, may not be open to any of His teaching. We know Jesus will in another place call Himself, 'the resurrection and the life' (John 11:25). So perhaps the Sadducees were testy and difficult about anything Jesus taught. Since Jesus was a reformer who sought to 'breathe new life' into religion as it was currently being practiced, as with any group having selfish interests (economic/power/popular) in the status quo, they felt threatened by Jesus (other groups too like the Pharisees, Scribes, Lawyers, & Herodians attacked Jesus too).

Such shortsighted rejection of new information or different experiences that don't fit into our pre-made selfish molds of thought, leads us to miss out on 'life'. It prevents us from appreciating the 'extra', fuller understanding of the world around us and ahead of us. If we are open, Jesus tries to break through our 'closed minds' to reveal more to us. I like to point out that Jesus had been suggesting 'resurrection' to people throughout His earlier teaching, yet they seem to have been missing out on it. Referring to His impending death that would be undone on Easter morning when He rebound to life, He had said, "The Son of Man must suffer greatly and rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed but on the third day be raised" (Luke 9:22). Also in the Lazarus and Rich Man parable, Jesus suggests an after-life resurrection in which final justice is measured out to all. In that episode, Jesus does realistically note that people have to be open to accepting the concept of resurrection. He has Abraham in the story tell the closed-minded rich man, 'If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead" (Luke 16:31). Also, back when Jesus gave instructions to His followers about avoiding proud honors at banquets, He told His disciples to only invite the poor, the lame and strangers to dinner who can't repay. Because they can't repay, then divine recompense would be given them at "the resurrection of the righteous" (Luke 14:44). But perhaps the greatest of all signs of resurrection with Jesus, would be His actual miracle in Luke chapter 7, when He raises from the dead an only son of a widow at Nain (7:11-17). I've always thought that Jesus was especially moved like at no other time in His life, when he met this widow, He saw Himself, Later His own Blessed Mother would be sorrowfully taking her son (Jesus) to be buried, just like this widow. I imagine that sight pulled especially hard at Jesus' heart, leading Him to preview 'resurrection of the dead' to everyone, before His own later on! Luke tells us that that such a 'raising from the dead' miracle spread rapidly like no other sign of Jesus' had yet before (Luke 7:16-17). Perhaps such attention from everyone that was given to Jesus after that, infuriated the jealous and threatened Sadducees leading to their increased hostility to Him too.4

But Jesus does try to meet the Sadducees where they are at, by encouraging them to reread their own scriptures. In Luke 20:37-38, He quotes Exodus 3:2,6, 15-16, to them where God is named the 'God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob'. Jesus claims, "that the dead will rise even Moses made known in the passage about the bush, when he called 'Lord' the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob; and he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive". Jesus is saying that God is 'simultaneously intergenerational', that in God's mind all generations of people are present equally in His eternity. So, therefore, what God made alive once here on earth, God can make alive again! This highlights how the Sadducees were stuck and limiting themselves to 'earth-bound' concepts such as exclusive 'blood-kin' family and institutional marriage that serves on earth to hold estates together and pass on one's family name. Such institutions make sense on earth, but when considering the larger universal family of God in heaven, such small and exclusive arrangements stop making sense. What makes sense on earth, and for earth's purpose, is transcended in heaven (as we say comparing apples to oranges. It loses its necessity and sense (as good as it is here-in heaven, so much better is ahead). Paul later will describe how heaven is so much more than anything we experience or can expect from, here on earth. He wrote in 1 Corinthians 2:9 "Eye has not seen, ear has nor heard and it has not even entered the imagination of humans, what God has prepared for those who love him...." So with the Sadducees, they are stuck on earth by the 'this worldly' limits they are boxing God into with their own projections (& they're clinging to their own religious monopoly of control over God and other people). Jesus is telling them, "To get out of this world, you have to think 'out'-side of its limits!" Peace. Fr Brian
