recently led our church leadership retreat, speaking about the difference between the older and younger generations of Americans, how they view the world differently, and how their views on God shape how they view the

world. We had a fascinating time discovering areas where different generations come together and see how they can differ.

All generations, young and old, see the world as broken, understanding something fundamentally is wrong with the world. The Christian would say it is because of the sin in

our hearts, and its realities cause pain and suffering everywhere.

Where different generations show they are different is how they specifically view that hurt, brokenness, and suffering. Older generations consider it a breakdown of society, government, and corporate systems, seeing the decay in overall morality and generosity. Younger generations see injustice, mistreatment of marginalized people, and a lack of compassion for those silenced voices.

The Christian would see that and thank God for such a diverse heart and compassion for all those affected by sin and the need to feel the comfort and



compassion of Jesus. As Christians, we would see how the Holy Spirit stirs our hearts to see sin and injustice and desire to change it.

With the younger generations, we see signs of hope and signs of need. More youthful generations have an overwhelming desire to change the world

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and strongly believe they can positively impact it. Today, many Christian and non-Chirstian teenagers seek to change the world for the better.

The need for them is mentoring and guidance. While they seek to change the world and have a positive impression of Jesus, they do not have the biblical perspective of how to change the world. They are left to have television and the internet to guide and lead them in how to change the world, which has dangerous consequences if led down that path.

The big takeaway from these facts is that Christians of all generations need to channel their desire to change the world through God's word. We need to read the Bible regularly to understand how God views the world, its sin, and how God's great plans for the world's redemption unfolded and are still unfolding. We need to let the Bible

steer and guide us as we seek to serve and change the world.

"So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness." Colossians 2:6-7

May we as a church be rooted in Jesus, strengthened in the teachings of faith, and overflow with thankfulness. May that be the position of our hearts as we seek to serve others, mentor those younger than us, and change the world together.
