SOMETHING NEW IN YOUR LIFE

Isaiah 43:16-21; Psalm 126: 1-6; Phil. 3:8-14; John 8:1-11

"For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son that whoever believes in Him may not be lost, but may have eternal life. God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world; instead, through Him the world might be saved" (John 3:16-17).

You and I may have made some wrong choices due to bad judgments! At times we feel as though Satan will not set us free no matter how hard we try - we are weighed down by our past mistakes - crushed by the guilt of our sins. The life of a Christian is a constant challenge. Sometimes it might seem depressing and hopeless, but a true Christian must always remain optimistic.

The context of today's first reading is about the optimism that existed among the Israelites even though they were held captive in Babylon. There were times they felt frustrated, but were hopeful that God would deliver them from bondage. They dreamed about the past – remembering the "good old days" when they were in a land flowing with "milk and honey." They dreaded the extension of their captivity in Babylon - they longed for the day that God, in His kindness, would take pity on them and deliver them. In today's reading, the Lord God, through Prophet Isaiah, uplifted their spirit, "Remember not the events of the past, the things of long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new!" Sometimes, it may absolutely be our own fault that our life is in a mess, but we ought to be optimistic. Whatever might have happened or befell you in the past, you must always look to the future with optimism. As far as the past is concerned, you must believe in a merciful God who is always willing to forgive a penitent sinner.

As it was in the gospel of last Sunday, the Pharisees in today's gospel are finding a way to trap Jesus. Hence, they brought before Him a certain woman they alleged was caught committing adultery, thus, according to the Law of Moses, she should be stoned to death (Deut. 22:21, Ezek. 16:38-40). Jesus knew they were malicious. Like the elders who accused Susanna of adultery (Daniel 13), the Pharisees were more interested in the "letter of the law" than in the "spirit of the law." They never cared about mercy but justice. They cared about the law not the person. Jesus knew that "God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world; instead, through Him the world might have life." He cares about the sinner not the sin. He was able to balance the law with mercy. Thus, He asked her, "Has no one condemned you?" She was terrified and must have felt unworthy and dejected. Jesus looked at her with love and compassion. At that instance she summoned courage and muttered: "No one sir." Like the father in the parable of the "prodigal son," Jesus must have hugged her and said to her: "Neither do I condemn you." His unqualified concern for the woman (a sinner) liberated her and helped in turning her life toward a God who is full of love and mercy. Instantly, she was set free from the bondage of sin and the grip of Satan, hence He said to her: "Go, and from now on do not sin anymore."

Firstly, the compassion of Jesus towards the woman teaches us that like St. Paul, you and I must forget what "lies behind but straining forward for what lies ahead..." We must embrace God's love who is kind enough to forgive our sins and exhorts us to "Go, and from now on do not sin any more. Secondly, as Christians we must be imitators of Christ and learn not to pass judgment and condemnation on others, but to show mercy to all.

HABEMUS PAPAM! – WE HAVE A POPE!!

It was March 13, 2013 at about 1:45 p.m. (6:45 p.m. – Rome Time)! The white smoke started oozing out of the chimney in the Sistine Chapel, followed by the ringing of the giant bell about ten minutes later, indicating the election of a new Pope. About one hour later, the window of the Papal balcony opened and a senior cardinal, Jean-Louis Tauran stepped forward to announce that he has good news for us: "HABEMUS PAPAM! (WE HAVE A POPE!)" It is indeed good news for us all who, after 'wandering around' like 'sheep without a shepherd' for thirteen days after the resignation of Pope Benedict XVI, have finally got a chief shepherd, the first Jesuit Pope!

He is Jorge Mario Bergoglio. He is 76 years old, born on December 17, 1936 in Buenos Aires, Argentina to Italian parents, Mario José Bergoglio, a railway worker and Regina María Sívori, a housewife. He is one of five children. Jorge entered the Society of Jesus on March 11, 1958 and was ordained a priest on December 13, 1969. He was installed the Archbishop of Buenos Aires on February 28, 1998. On February 21, 2001, Archbishop Jorge Bergoglio was created a Cardinal by Pope John Paul II. He is the 266th Pontiff in the history of the Church. He is the first Pontiff from Latin America. He has chosen the name: Francis! As the new Pope said, "I choose the name Francis, in honor of Saint Francis of Assisi."

We pray for our new Pope that he may have the wisdom and courage "to bring Christ to all so that all people may come to Christ".
