Bible Study



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Called to be Church

Il wanted to share a bit this month about an important sermon series that we will be working through for September and October. This series is titled "Called to be Church," and will examine a number of stories from the book

of Acts. This sermon series will be drawing on the work of Anthony Robinson and Robert Wall in their book Called to be Church: The Book of Acts for a New Day.

I've chosen this book, and this sermon series, because it is important for us to take time to really sit down and think and talk about what it means for us to be the church in this day and age. What does it mean for us to be the church here in Wabash, Indiana? What does it mean for us to be the church, here, in the United States in the 21st Century?

Robinson and Wall share at one point this observation: "The consistent witness of Scripture, however, is that God's intention is to form a people, a community, a visible body...The focus is God's ekklesia, God's community taking form in the world, which even provides a new world and a new vision for those who share in it." The book of Acts is a testimony of the beginnings of the shared journey of faith of those who follow after Jesus, who become his disciples, who are Christians living and working and praying together. It's about their shared journey, and speaks to our continuing shared journey of faith.

While the core of the church remains our commitment to a shared journey together seeking after Jesus, how we do this will not look the same as it did 10, or 20, or 50, or 100 years ago. The world around is has changed, and how we walk together has changed. And so, taking time to really dive deep into the book that explores how this whole phenomenon of church got started is a wonderful beginning place.

In preparation for this sermon series, I'd like to invite all of us to spend time going back and reading through the whole book of Acts. While we will be listening and hearing stories from it through the next two months, we will not have a chance in worship to look at the entire book.

Acts is an interesting book that we too often only pull out for a few special days in the life of the church, like Pentecost, or to look at the story of Saul's conversion into Paul. Take the time to read through it, and you will be able to see more of the connections between this important yet easily overlooked book of the New Testament.

I hope and pray that this sermon series will help us to look deeply at what it means to be church, here and now, and to inspire us to journey together in a deeper, more faithful manner.



I am always glad to be able to sit and talk with folks in a relaxed setting like that, where we can be enjoying the beautiful scenery around us and the lovely conversation that occurs in such places. I know I felt the presence of God in that place, knowing that as Jesus shared in the Gospel of Matthew, where two or three are gathered in his name, he is there.

We had a wonderful meal with everyone, and I enjoyed getting a chance to get out in the lake for a bit towards the end of the afternoon. I was also thankful for the wonderful weather we had that day, with just about the perfect temperature for a summer day out at a lake.

All in all, this was a wonderful time that I feel was a great boon to our congregation. There was a very good turn out for this event, and I hope that those who were unable to attend this year will be able to join with us next year. I look forward to being able to have many such gatherings in the future years as we continue on our journeys together. The double Brethren Disaster Ministries project in Lumberton, North Carolina has split. One unit will remain working in North and South Carolina. The new site is Jacksonville, FL. Our district is supposed to provide fifteen volunteers for the Florida site September 8-14. I presently have one volunteer and another with interest. Will you join them?

I don't understand the difficulty in recruiting volunteers. I realize FEMA and church disaster response agencies are being overwhelmed by the number and size of the disasters hitting our hemisphere. Yet we are buffered from the immensity of the problem. Other continents are facing much more dire consequences. Our natural response is to shy away from involvement because we have no answers or ability to make much difference. We are too busy to go now.

I have found in my efforts with BDM and Christian Peacemaker Teams that even taking one small step in response to problems opens new avenues of possibility and is a reliance on the ways God enters the equation in miraculous ways.

You are needed. Could you invite a co-worker, neighbor or friend to join you in Jacksonville? Is it time for a working retreat with your congregation? Contact me within three weeks or I will need to turn those spaces over to another district.

We are also on for the week of December 1-7 when we need seven volunteers, again in Jacksonville. That Florida site is in response to Hurricane Irma and we will be working in four counties, staying at a converted camp grounds with good facilities.

Keep in mind the need for volunteers with Children's Disaster Services, money gifts to support travel for our district volunteers, the ongoing need for volunteers for two week stints in Puerto Rico and disaster cleanup kits for projects everywhere.

Sparking joy and saying, "Thank you, next"

As I write this, I am in the midst of writing position descriptions, learning more fully the ins and outs of our volunteer insurance policy, and responding to our BVS partners with organizational position statements. And then I looked at this issue's topic, finding joy. I couldn't help but chuckle.



In my nearly seven years of working for Brethren Volunteer Service, I have not very often struggled to find joy in my work. The BVS office in Elgin is a pretty fun place to be! However, I must be honest, in this time of transition with no BVS director after Dan McFadden's resignation, to then being called to fill the position myself, creating joy has sometimes had to be a more intentional part of my work.

This winter, I hopped on the bandwagon of watching Marie Kondo "spark joy" for so many by helping them to purge and organize their belongings. There was one part of the process that I was admittedly skeptical of at first, but learned to appreciate when I put it into practice myself. When the homeowners decided that something was no longer sparking joy for them, before they put it in the "toss" pile, Marie had them thank that item out loud for serving them.

While I can't toss out the tasks that I do every day that don't spark joy for me, I can be intentional about finding the joy in those tasks—how they serve our volunteers and our program. It has also been important for me as I've settled into the role of director of BVS to think about the history of BVS and how it has served us, and moving forward, learning how to thank those pieces that no longer serve us and usher in new programming that sparks joy for the next generation of BVSers.

Joy may have to be intentionally found at times. But allowing our work and calling to spark joy while also letting go of and thanking the seasons in life that have served us but are no longer needed is a delicate but important balance. What would the world look like if we all followed a calling that sparked joy in us? Despite our challenges, our ministries and missions continue. The Mission and Ministry Board, with the help and support of districts, congregations, and members, is working to fan the positive sparks that are emerging.

- One hand towel measuring approximately 15"x 28" to 16"x 32"
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
- One finger nail or toe nail clipper removed from the package
- One bath size bar of soap in the wrapper
- One toothbrush in the package
- Ten standard size Band-aids

All items need to fit inside a one-gallon plastic zipper closure bag. Remove the excess air from the bag and seal before boxing. Do not add any extra items or toothpaste. A tube of extended expiration date toothpaste will be added to each Hygiene Kit just prior to its journey.

It is with broken hearts that we write to tell you of our plans to close the shop for good on September 28, 2019. While this may come as a shock to some of you, others know this has been a long time coming. The climate in which One World Handcrafts is operating today is very different from the one which welcomed our opening twenty-seven years ago.

Our staff, volunteers, and board have worked diligently to sustain One World's mission of Fair Trade in our unique community. We overcame the odds for as long as possible. We have encouraged memberships and donations, employed problem-solving skills to stretch our pennies, written grant proposals funded through The Community Foundation of Wabash County, hosted Main View Benefit dinners, and participated in Beacon "Project Spotlight" awards. Di Wion has brought much creative energy to bear as manager. Even so, it has not been enough.

As you probably know from your own personal budgets, expenses continue to rise while revenues stay stagnant and even, at times, decrease. When combined with the tighter budget of most shoppers, a demand to order on-line, and a push to give fewer material gifts, it becomes impossible to continue carrying out our Fair Trade mission in the shop.

We are so grateful to the many, many loyal shoppers and community partners who have helped to live out our cause. Without you, we know this mission would not have lasted this long. Thank you for sharing your memberships and donations, choosing to purchase here, bringing your out-of-town relatives and friends to the shop, eating at our benefit dinners, voting for our wins on Beacon "Project Spotlight," volunteering, and partnering with this mission in many other ways. If there is any silver lining we see right now, it is how many wonderful people we get to thank for being on this journey with us.

Our plan is to begin a "going-out-of-business sale" on Tuesday, August 1, and end it on Saturday, September 28, 2019.
