World Day of Migrants and Refugees

This Sunday we celebrate the 107th World Day of Migrants and Refugees to honour their courage and strength to flee their homes because of war, ethnic violence, religious persecution, political issues, and climate change or to seek for a better life. Facing the reality of migrants and refugees, the question that comes to our mind is: How do we respond to this issue?

Reflecting on today's Gospel, Jesus, in his conversation with John, reveals to us the importance of showing generosity to people in need. There is a much deeper truth that Jesus wants us to know that God is a generous Father. He loves and cares for all of us. Hence, our response to the issue of migrants and refugees is to show them God's generosity.

According to Pope Francis, one of the ways to make God's generosity more visible to migrants and refugees is to work 'Towards an ever wider "We." The Pope's way is not without reason. He says, "we are all in the same boat and called to work together so that there will be no more walls that separate us, no longer others, but only a single "we", encompassing all of humanity." Isn't it amazing to know that no matter who you are and what you are, we live in the same planet? We are interrelated and interdependent.

Pope Francis goes on to say: "...we find many migrants and refugees, displaced persons and victims of trafficking, to whom the Lord wants his love to be manifested and his salvation preached." It means that these less fortunate brothers and sisters of ours are also part of our life. They deserve our love and care too.

What does it mean 'Towards an ever wider "We" for you? For me, it is an acceptance of a reality that regardless our ethnic background, gender, faith, language, nationality, all of us belong to the same family, that is, human family. We are children of the generous God. Unlike John in the Gospel who was very much in the "I" mindset, we are expected to have and develop the "We" mindset. We accept one another, including migrants and refugees, as brothers and sisters. We are also expected to extent God's generosity to migrants and refugees as they encounter many hardships, worries, fears, loneliness, and so on. We need to care for them by welcoming, protecting, promoting and integrating.

Moreover, we are encouraged to give material and financial support to migrants and refugees. Settling down in a hosting country, migrants and refugees need a lot of assistance such as food, clothes, medicines, shelter, money, etc. In the spirit of wider "We" let us share our resources with them generously.

Last but not least, helping migrants and refugees requires a close and good collaboration of all individuals and institutions or organizations involved. Such collaborations will be living signs of Pope Francis' dream of "Toward an ever wider We." The wider "We" makes us humble to admit the reality that we are all migrants in this world. Therefore, we need to support one another, helping one another, and care for one another. No one should be excluded or left out in the cold. Let us work together to create a better world, a world that fills with peace and harmony which reflects the reign of God's Kingdom.

Victoria's Roadmap out of lockdown

As you would be aware, the Premier announced a proposed Victorian Roadmap on 19 September outlining a slow and staggered re-opening. When 80% of people aged 16 years and over are fully vaccinated (expected around 5 November) churches can have up to 150 fully vaccinated people indoors

STOP PRESS: From Archbishop Comensoli

There remains many unanswered questions regarding the proposed Victorian Roadmap. Media have expressed interest in the implications for places of worship, and the Archbishop has provided a quote for The Age (below), which we wanted to share with you.

"Spiritual wellbeing is as important as psychological and physical wellbeing.

Lockdown has affected Victorians deeply, no less for the thousands of people of faith who have not been able to attend worship or receive the sacraments of the Church. We have been very flexible throughout this pandemic, but are urging Government and health authorities to make clear what the end goal is after we hit 80% full vaccination status.

It would be a tragedy if two classes of citizens, the vaccinated and the unvaccinated, were to emerge and be entrenched as we look towards a COVID-normal goal. In our faith tradition, all the available vaccines in Australia are permissible to receive, and our clergy and people are strongly encouraged to be vaccinated. We believe we can achieve ways that allow both vaccinated and unvaccinated people to worship in-person safely, and are working with other faith leaders to bring those proposals to the table."

The Archbishop will offer a more detailed message when there is a clearer understanding of the pathways forward, and following further negotiations with authorities.

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Migrants and Refugees Sunday

The 107th World Day of Migrants and Refugees 2021 will be celebrated on September 26th – Migrants and Refugees Sunday. In his Message, Towards an Ever Wider "We" for this year's World Day of Migrants and Refugees, Pope Francis turned to his encyclical Fratelli Tutti to express once again his concerns and hopes during this time of the COVID19 pandemic: "Once this health crisis passes, our worst response would be to plunge even more deeply into feverish consumerism and new forms of egotistic self-preservation. God willing, after all this, we will think no longer in terms of 'them' and 'those', but only 'us' (no. 35)". For this reason, the Pope said he has devoted his Message to the theme, Towards An Ever Wider "We", in order to "indicate a clear horizon for our common journey in this world."




LAUDATO SI: ON CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME
