


Preparing the Way for the Lord

Like other personages, the Pope's official visit is announced ahead of time. The purpose is to give people more time to prepare for the visit and make themselves ready for it. For instance, the visit of Pope Benedict XVI during World Youth Day in Sydney back in 2008. It took the Dioceses in Australia more than two years in preparation for the visit. We also make necessary preparations when we invite an important guest or even a friend coming over for dinner, such as cleaning and decorating our home, buying drinks, cooking a nice meal, and so on. Such preparation is needed to make the visit go well and for our guest or friend to feel at home, and not disappointed by a lukewarm reception.

The readings of the Second Sunday of Advent tell us exactly the same thing. The Gospel of Luke reveals to us that John the Baptist is Christ's precursor and his role is to announce Christ's coming and get people ready to welcome Christ. John the Baptist plays a central role in the Advent liturgy. Advent, for us, is a season in which we recall the first coming of Jesus and make ourselves ready to welcome his spiritual coming this Christmas. Moreover, we also look forward to his second coming at the end of the world. John the Baptist helps us to consider not only what we should do to welcome Jesus but also to have a clear understanding of why we should prepare to welcome him.

What should we do to welcome Jesus? Quoting Prophet Isaiah, John the Baptist instructs to "prepare the way of the Lord" by filling in valleys, levelling hills, straightening crooked roads, and smoothing out rough paths. This is one of the most beautiful advice for Advent. This is an invitation to examine our lives on a regular basis, especially during the Advent Season. We need to take some time to get away from our busy life. We need to examine our hearts to see if selfishness, laziness and self-indulgence have blocked from building a good relationship with God and with other people. We need to fill in some spiritual potholes and clear away some unwanted debris, so that God's graces may flow unhindered into our hearts. Our heart is God's way to come into and transform our lives. But it is up to us to do the necessary repairs to allow that to happen. One of the best ways of repairing God's way into our life is through the Sacrament of reconciliation.

How to take our preparation seriously? The answer is simple: why do we need Jesus? Isaiah writes: "all mankind shall see the salvation of God." This reminds us of our fallen state and that we live in a fallen world. We are sinners living in the darkness of sin. Our dire need is salvation as we long to be with God. As Saint Augustine said: "My heart is restless until I rest in you." We believe that Jesus Christ alone has power to elevate us from disgrace into amazing grace. He is our Saviour who gives meaning and fulfilment to



our life. Hence, Advent season and Christmas celebration without Jesus would be meaningless. We don't need them. Probably we don't need Christian faith as well. But the fact is that we do. We believe that only Jesus alone can restore our fallen human nature and world. In fact, He continues to come into our lives with His saving grace, like He did at His first coming over two thousand years ago. He never wants us to be parted from God. His only desire is to see us rest in God's loving care, the fullness of life that we long for. But He won't force His way in as He respects our freedom. That's why we need to collaborate with Him by preparing our hearts to welcome Him which enables His grace to transform our lives.

#53 UPDATE: GENERAL LITURGICAL GUIDELINES COVID-19 Implications for the Catholic Archdiocese of Melb Information Updated: 18 November 2021, 5:00pm

As of 11.59pm Thursday 18 November 2021, the following measures will be applied to Masses at Sacred Heart Parish:

Face masks are still required to be worn at all Masses here at Sacred Heart. This is to ensure all are kept safe especially our aged parishioners and children under 12 years of age who are currently unvaccinated.

All regular weekday and weekend Masses will have no capacity limits or density limits for those who are **fully** vaccinated. To be eligible to attend Mass you must have your vaccination record loaded in your Service Victoria App, or those without a smartphone please bring your printed vaccination certificate with you to Mass.

An additional Mass on Sundays for 50 parishioners (including clergy) who are **not fully vaccinated** will be provided at 12:00pm (Midday).

PLEASE NOTE: at all Masses face masks are still required and you must check-in.

Please do not attend Mass if you are feeling unwell, have tested positive or are waiting for a Covid test result. Thank you.
