


Work-Based Welfare Reform Led to a:

- Halt in the Rapid Decline in Two Parent Families
- Halt in the Rise of the Non-Marital Birth Rate
- Two Thirds Drop in the Teen Birth and Abortion Rates

Percent of Children on Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) or Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF)




Welfare Reform Halted the Rapid Decline in Married Two Parent Families

(Births per 1000 Non-married Women aged 15 to 44)





Pregnancy, Birth and Abortion Rates for Teen and Young Adult Women




Pregnancy, Birth and abortion Rates per 1000 Women aged 15 to 19

Main Points on Abortion


- Most abortion occurs to non-married women.
- Work-based Welfare Reform did not lead to an increase in abortion. After reform, the nonmarital abortion rate declined steadily.
- The pregnancy, birth, and abortion rates among teens, in particular, declined dramatically and in unison.

Abortion Rate for Married and Non-Married Women Ortions Per 1000 Women Aged 15 to 44)




The False Trade Off

The conventional view is that there is a trade off between abortions and non-marital births. An increase in abortion will lead a drop in non-marital births.

Historical data show there is no trade off; abortions and non-marital births tend to rise and fall in unison.
