

IDEA CORNER!

Members are encouraged to tell us about short cuts, different ways of doing things or just things that worked for them.

Ernie Wells made a drawing of his dry washer addition using a Belt instead of Riffles. As you can see from the drawing he made, rather than use any kind of riffles in your shice box, install a continuous belt.

You can either get the type with indentations or a pattern on the outer surface or you can do as I am doing. Sew plastic astro-turf to the belt so that the turf becomes the working surface. In the event you use the turf, remember most of it is directional and point the knap toward the direction of the waterflow (against it) You can run your hand over the turf to find the direction.

You use a thin flexible belt and turn it very slowly against the flow (or uphill), toward the feed end. As it turns over the pulley, wash off all the concentrates into a container. This way, your riffles never blind (you have no riffles) and you will recover many, many times the amount of gold with little effort and never have to work to try and clean up a sluice box.

For very small operations, just put a hand crank on the pulley. For small commercial operations, you can use the 12-volt electric motor and gear with the slow speed drum or pulley drive from a wrecked camp trailer with the fold up canvas top. You can power this with an alternator or auto generator attached to the engine which runs your shaker or trommel.

Larger operations can use a drive that matches their load need. That is how it works. You can use your favorite method for final clean up on the concentrates.

Eldorado Canyon

Francis X. Aubrey, a trader, found gold nuggets on the banks of the Colorado River in 1852. Because he and his men were beset by illness, lack of food and Indians he did not pursue the search for gold, but by 1861, Eldorado Canyon was the site of a rich discovery of silver ore.

This helped to trigger the Colorado River Gold and Silver Rush of 1862.

The first and best claims in Eldorado Canyon were made by John Moss, who located, among other mines, the Techatticup, an 8-foot wide vein yielding \$70.00 a ton and up. Over \$1.7 million in gold would be taken from this mine.

In 1880, the Gila, a steamboat, under the command of Jack Mellon, left Eldorado Canyon with a half a ton of silver bullion and 300 ounces of gold on board. When the Gila approached Cottonwood Island, it was hailed by a man in some distress. After taking the "starving" man aboard, the Captain and crew found themselves at the wrong end of a rifle.

Piracy on the Colorado River was in full swing. After exchanging his threadbare clothing for a passenger's fancy outfit, the pirate took the gold and as much silver bullion as the steamboat skiff would carry and headed for shore.

The theft was reported at Hardyville (near today's Bullhead City, AZ) and a posse took chase.

The pirate in dude's clothing was seen traveling light, and it was speculated that he had buried the silver near Crescent Springs, where he had shot his horse because it had broken it's leg.

A man who was digging a well recovered a Silver Bar after the turn of the century. This led to further searching but no more silver has been reported found

(story from the High Grader newsletter in 1986).



FINDING GOLD IN A STREAM

The last time that I looked, I could not find any streams in the desert. Our claims in Nevada and in Arizona do not have any rivers or streams. We do have members in other States and our membership does tends to travel from time to time.

The best places to find placer gold are in areas that have been mined in the past.

Good places to look for Gold are in streams, ravines, and higher bench and terrace gravels. It is then simply a matter of visiting the area of your choice to try your hand at panning, sluicing or dredging for gold.

Gold is usually deposited at the bottom of rivers, streams and dry ravines. However, gold can be found closer to the surface.

An extended period of rain or a fast snowmelt will stir up a stream's sand and gravel and move the gold around. When it gets right down to it, gold can be found almost anywhere in a stream.

The best places to look for gold are:

- 1. Gravel bars on the inside bend of a river or stream.
- Gravel bars where a stream levels out and slows down below a steeper part.
- Any newly formed gravel bar following a heavy runoff.
- "Streaks" of gravel that stand above and bellow the bottom of stream channels.
- On the downstream side of large boulders in the stream.
- In gravel bars and potholes below areas where the bottom of the stream has been scoured down to bedrock.
- In cracks and below ridges in bedrock at the bottom of rivers and streams.
- Below rapids and waterfalls.
- In cracks in bedrock above the waterline, along the edge of the stream.
- 10. In sand and gravel on the downstream side of boulders just above the water level.

Larger nuggets of gold tend to remain near the bottom of a stream near or on bedrock.

They will become trapped in cracks and potholes or in areas where the flow of the stream slows quickly. However, there are a lot of exceptions. Thee are many conditions that may cause these larger nuggets of gold to be almost anywhere, including on top of the sand and gravel at the edge of a river or stream. Everything depends on the conditions that existed in the stream in the days, weeks, months or even years before your arrive.

New gold flakes and nuggets are eroded into streams each year after the spring runoff. If you've worked a profitable area one-year, it would e a good idea to check it again next year. You may be pleasantly surprised.

Look for gold in areas where the bedrock has been exposed or is not very deep. The character of the bedrock is also important. Smooth granite is a very poor place to look for gold because there will be very few cracks and crevices for the gold to be trapped.

Rough bedrock that has many ridges, crevices, and cracks, are the best spots.

Also include the downstream side of large rocks. Look around exposed tree roots, clumps of grasses, in mosses that grow on rocks that were submerged when the water level was higher. Look on the downstream side of logs that are stuck or buried in the sand and gravel

PLACER SAMPLING.

Is this a good place to look for Gold? Where do I start? Is there Gold in my back yard?

When placer sampling, a quicker way to sample material is at hand.
Carry a 5-gallon pail in your car along with a small shovel. A gallon or two of water carried in used milk cartons is great for emergencies or for testing placer samples.

Shovel about two or three shovels of dirt into a bucket. Add a sufficient amount of water, shake it up, swirl it around. The idea is to make slurry—soupy mix. Pour off some of the top materials onto the ground or into a pan. Look it over and discard. Keep this up until you are down to the bottom of your bucket.

Now add some water to the mix and then pour it into a gravity gold pan (any gold pan will do) Pan it out and you may get a surprise. You may have found some gold.

If you don't have your gold pan with you, bring the concentrate home. Be sure to mark the bucket where you found the concentrate. More than one person has panned out concentrates at home only to find that one of the buckets had gold in it and they had no idea where they had picked up the concentrate.

Every wash is a potential pocket for gold. Good Luck. May your bucket fill with gold. Dan Green

ARE YOU GETTING YOUR SHARE OF THE GOLD?

Why do some prospectors find Gold consistently every time they go out? What is it that gives them the winning edge?

You might think that the obvious answer is experience, the quality of the metal detector that they are using, a basic understanding of geology or perhaps just plain luck.

While I am sure that all of these things are important, I am inclined to believe that something else is at work here.

You can call it a sixth sense, a good nose for Gold, a natural ability to dowse for gold, as a dowser would seek water and find it.

All of this can be called the power of positive thinking. I think that we have a number of members in our club who have developed this talent.

They tune in their attitude and their mind toward finding gold AND THEN THEY MANAGE TO FIND IT.

Where does that leave the weekend prospector?

The guy who bought a metal detector and only goes out 'once in awhile!

The casino worker who cannot get out on the weekends with our regular outings? The guy who lives in a cityaway from the gold fields?

There are so many that cannot get out as often as they want to.

Well, there is always a lot to be thankful for if you take the time to look for it.

Read some of the available material on prospecting such as the Highgrader, The Gold Prospector Association monthly magazine. The International California Mining Journal, Treasure Magazine, etc. Watch some of the professional hunters on video, and/or watch some of the successful detector operators at work.

The first thing, notice that they are having fun. This is a fun hobby. They have the right mental attitude to succeed.

Personally, I carry a small piece of gold in a plastic case that is on a string. If I am hunting for awhile and not finding anything, I re-focus my attention and my detector by dropping the piece of gold on the ground. I retune my mind and machine by hearing the perfect sound of Gold. Real Gold! I am encouraged, refreshed and made more confident that the machine has not stopped working.

It is important to have patience while hunting for gold. It is a rare thing to have found gold on the first trip out.

Most of us have found gold by hard work, patience and by seeking the gold with a positive mental attitude. One or two trips per year does not get it.

Practice makes perfect. Patience and frequent attempts at developing your skill will produce results.
