Mark O. Pohl, 71, of Harbor Beach, formerly of Livonia, passed away Wednesday, March 15, 2000, in the Harbor Beach Community Hospital following a short illness. He was born on April 15, 1928 in Detroit, son of the late J. Norman and Florence (Leahy) Pohl. Mark was a veteran of World War II and the Korean War, serving in the U.S. Army's 82nd Airborne Division. He played baseball with the Chicago White Sox farm club. He and Carolyn Crossen were married April 21, 1956, in Detroit. He was a retired employee of the American Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp., retiring after 23 years with the firms.
