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PASTOR'S MESSAGE...

"I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith is proclaimed throughout the world..." (Romans 1:8)

"I thank my God always for you...for in every way you have been enriched in him..."

(1 Corinthians 1:4)

"...I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers..."

(Ephesians 2:16)

"We always give thanks to God for all of you..." (1 Thessalonians 1:2)

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, and give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18)

Happy Thanksgiving during this month of November—and actually, for always!

As you can see from these examples from just a few of the letters of Paul the Apostle—he was quite generous, prolific, profuse, and also very genuine, in freely expressing his thanks for the faith and friendship he knew. To be such an affirming person might have been Paul's nature—but without doubt it certainly was a spiritual gift that had come alive in him as a direct result of his living in Jesus Christ.

Our own country's recognition of Thanksgiving, dates back to such events as: the story of the 1620s feast of gratitude by Pilgrims and their Native American neighbors; President George Washington's first proclamation of Thanks as Nation in 1789; to President Abraham Lincoln in 1863 setting aside the last Thursday of November as a national Day of Thanksgiving. Then after seventy-five years of Presidents following Lincoln's precedent, in 1941, Congress permanently established the fourth Thursday of each November as a national holiday.

Not unique only to the United States, similarly a national holiday giving thanks is celebrated as well in Canada, some of the Caribbean Islands, and Liberia—as a day of expressing thanks for the blessing of the harvest and of the preceding year. Similarly named festival holidays occur in Germany and Japan.

But expressions of thanks, of gratitude, of appreciation and affirmation—go back much farther...likely all the way to the creation of humanity. And dare I say, even back to *infinity*—to the very heart of God. It certainly does not take a national declaration of any kind to turn us lose expressing our thanks—anytime, anywhere, to anyone!

So...on this celebration of *thanksgiving*—DO celebrate The Day festively—and especially taking time to personally thank those with whom you share your lives—and also thanking our Creator God for all of the blessings of life you enjoy—of live, and liberty, and well-being.

But also—don't stop! Let's pledge ourselves to express our own genuine personal gratitude to at least one other human being (and maybe more), at least every single day of the coming year! In person (the very best way) - or by phone—or written—or by digital means. It's all good! How positive that would be—both for the recipient, and also for each of us who express thanks! How affirming—how invigorating—how healthy! And...it's all totally free! It doesn't take much time. We all have energy for it. We all have the skills, talents and abilities to do it! Just imagine a world where words-of-thanks are being offered every single day, everywhere!

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ST. ANDREW'S DAY CELEBRATION



We are planning our third annual St. Andrew's Day celebration. The feast day of Saint Andrew, patron saint of Scotland, is a national holiday in Scotland where Scots culture is celebrated with traditional food, music and dance.

Once a year, with a special Sunday worship service, many Presbyterian churches observe St. Andrew's Day as a means of celebrating their Scottish roots. This year we are celebrating November 12th.

Following a form of worship ceremony that dates back to 1564, various traditions are observed, most notably the "Kirkin' of the Tartan" - Kirk being the Scottish word for church. Kirkin' is a "symbol of freedom" that dates back to the defeat of Scottish highlanders by the British in 1746. English penal laws banned all thing Scottish, including wearing clan plaids, speaking and singing in their native Gaelic tongue and the playing of bagpipes. Although unlawful kirkin' was punishable by death, Scots would sneak a bit of their tartan under their clothing on St. Andrew's Day and when the minister said a certain phrase, they would clutch their cloth and silently say a blessing in Gaelic.

Nowadays members, guest, and visitors are invited to present pieces of their heritage/tartan for blessing during the service. The blessing is open to everyone, whether of Scots heritage or other.

Music will be Celtic in flavor. Our service will include traditional Celtic flute and guitar, Highland bagpipes, Celtic hymns and a hymn in Gaelic.

In keeping with the spirit of the occasion, all are encouraged to wear plaid and bring a fabric of your heritage for the special "Kirkin' of the Tartan" blessing.

Once again our GROW gardening program wants to thank First Presbyterian Church for allowing us to use your facilities for our beginning and end-of-the season activities. PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT...



The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) was formed by congregational vote on September 10th, 2017. The PNC is comprised of Session members, Matt Engel, Ella Gutzke (Vice Chair), Dale Hoerauf, Bill Jensen, Diann Johnson, John Richter, and Jim Skaret (Chair). Members at large are: Gladys Cairns, Mallory Henriksen, Allen Hoberg, Dave Nix and Bob Tonolli. The PNC has organized into 4 sub-committees similar to the way the former Search Committee was organized with Communications, Interview and Negotiations, Technical Data, and Hosting Sub-committees. The PNC meets every Monday evening at 6:30 p.m. to conduct business that to date has included the review and evaluation of candidates Personal Information Forms (PIF's) and preparations for the interview of prospective candidates. To date (thru 10/23) we have reviewed and evaluated 73 PIF's. We have begun the interview process for five (5) of those candidates. Two (2) interviews were conducted on 10/23 and the others are being arranged for the week of 10/30. The interviews are conducted by Skype. We are hopeful that after completing these 5 interviews we will be able to begin a greater dialogue with at least one of those candidates, check references and perform background checks, and make arrangements to bring at least one of them to Bismarck to get better acquainted and to preach at a neutral pulpit.

The transition from a Search Committee to a Pastor Nominating Committee went smoothly and has exposed the committee to many more prospective candidates as a Pastor Nominating Committee that were available as a Search Committee. We are confident the Holy Spirit is moving us in the right direction and we are hopeful we will be able to identify the person that will best fill our needs in the near future. We thank all for their continued prayers and support.

NURSES NOTES...



Greetings to you all!

November reminds all of us of giving thanks. I give thanks to First Presbyterian Church, Pastor David and the pastoral staff as well as the congregation for their support and guidance in the Nurse Ministry opportunity. I have met some extraspecial people in this new journey. This has been such an inspiring adventure.

I also want to thank you all for your prayers and support during my medical emergency. I do believe your prayers and support have provided the healing needed to my recovery. Thank You!

November has arrived and soon we will be celebrating our last month of the year. How fast time flies. Happy Thanksgiving Everyone!!

Two of our national recognized diseases in November are Diabetes and Alzheimer's. Therefore I thought I would share some facts for each of these.

Diabetes:

Criteria for testing for Diabetes or Pre-Diabetes

- 1. Testing should be considered in all adults who are overweight with a Body Mass Index (BMI) of 25 or more or 23 in Asian Americans and have additional risk factors:
 - * Physical inactivity
 - * First-degree relative with diabetes
 - * High-risk race/ethnicity (e.g., African American, Latino, Native American, Asian American, Pacific Islander)
 - * Women who delivered a baby weighing > 9lbs or were diagnosed with Gestational Diabetes Mellitus
 - * Hypertension (>140/90 mmHg or on therapy for hypertension)
 - * HDL cholesterol lever <35 mg/dL and/or a triglyceride lever >250 mg/dL
 - * Women with polycystic ovary syndrome (this is an imbalance of a woman's hormonal levels causing irregular menstrual cycles, difficulty conceiving, ovarian cysts or enlarged ovaries)
 - * A1C of greater than or equal to 5.7%, Impaired Glucose Tolerance, or Impaired Fasting Glucose on previous testing.
 - * Other clinical conditions associated with insulin resistance e.g., severe obesity, acanthosis nigricans (these are dark patched of skin with thick velvety textures)
 - * History of Cardiovascular Disease
- 2) Testing is recommended for those over the age of 45, particularly those who are overweight or obese.
- 3) If results are normal, testing should be repeated at a minimum of 3-year intervals, with consideration of more frequent testing depending on initial results (e.g., those with pre-diabetes should be tested yearly) and risk status.

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NURSES NOTES...



Alzheimer's:

What should I do if I notice changes in my loved one's symptoms?

Noticing a change in your love one's symptoms may mean their Alzheimer's has progressed. It's important to make an appointment with the doctor as soon as possible. That way, the doctor can make an informed decision about whether it's time to adjust your loved one's treatment for moderate Alzheimer's disease.

Some examples of moderate stage Alzheimer's symptoms:

- * Difficulty managing personal finances (paying bills)
- * Difficulty with household tasks (laundry, making meals)
- * Problems with personal care (bathing, grooming, toileting)
- * Wandering or getting lost
- * Changes in sleep patterns
- * Feeling moody, withdrawn, or detached
- * Forgetfulness about one's own personal history
- * Being unable to recall their own address or phone number
- * Needing help choosing proper clothing for the season
- * Continuous repeating stories

Examples of severe stage Alzheimer's symptoms:

- * May not recognize oneself or family
- * May not communicate
- * Lack of control of bowel or bladder
- * Groaning, moaning, or grunting
- * Needing help with all activities of daily living

Presbytery of the Northern Plains: by Joanie Friend, Faith Community Nurse at Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church in Bethesda, Maryland

As our society continues to age, we hear more and more about the challenges of dementia. There are now about five million people living with Alzheimer's disease in the United Dates, and that number will grow. Alzheimer's is one of the most feared medical conditions, and there is still no cure. What starts as forgetfulness becomes increasing disability, disconnection, dependence and death.

Although we recognize the distress that Alzheimer's and other dementias can cause, we sometimes forget the family members, friends, and fellow church members who help carry the burdens of these diseases. Caregivers are far too weary, overwhelmed, and burdened by the physical, emotional, and spiritual demands of providing care to those who are forgetful and confused. Many also feel that no one truly understands the challenges they face. People with dementia are loved by God, and it is incumbent upon the church community to support both the individual and the caregivers.

Here are ways that churches can help:

- * Be positive about what people with dementia can do rather than what they cannot do.
- * Support people with dementia in making choices. Give them time to choose between coffee and tea at fellowship time, for example.
- * Listen to what people with dementia are saying. Listen attentively so they feel respected.
- * Pay attention to body language. Sometimes you can read what people are saying in their faces or with gestures.
- * Avoid correcting what people with dementia say. People with dementia often say things that are not accurate. Try to redirect or distract.
- * Assume people with dementia know what you are saying. Talking about or "over" a person can be hurtful.

Before the sun set on Thanksgiving Day, stores across our country opened their doors to shoppers seeking an early start on Black Friday specials. This "busiest shopping day of the year" is etched deeply into our culture and our economy. In the past decade, another retail phenomenon has developed in the days following Thanksgiving. The technological revolution and savvy marketers have given us Cyber Monday, which is filled with promotions aimed at online shoppers.

On the heels of these two commercial events, a third post-Thanksgiving tradition has emerged, and it is claiming the attention of more and more people, including Presbyterians. Giving Tuesday exists for one purpose: to celebrate and encourage giving.

The event, which is in its sixth year, was created by the 92nd Street Y, a cultural and community center in New York City, in partnership with the United Nations Foundation. It is billed as "a global day of giving fueled by the power of social media and collaboration."

By the time Giving Tuesday arrives, most of the Thanksgiving dinner leftovers have been eaten or thrown away, and the season's hymns of gratitude have been set aside for another year. However, Giving Tuesday's emphasis on generosity offers Christians an opportunity to hit the reset button and rediscover the joy of giving thanks.

On Giving Tuesday, we can express our thanks living through generous giving. Today, as you ponder the many wonderful possibilities for your giving, I hope you will consider supporting the work of your church. At the national level, you can give to the ministries of Presbyterian Mission through its Giving Tuesday page and to the work of other Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) agencies through the Presbyterian Foundation.

Poet Maya Angelou reminds us that gratitude should be the underpinning of our spiritual lives and that our communion with the Holy One should lead us to strive for a better world. In *Celebrations: Rituals of Peace and Prayer*, she writes: "Let gratitude be the pillow upon which you kneel to say your nightly prayer. And let faith be the bridge you build to overcome evil and welcome good."

This year's Giving Tuesday will be a wonderful opportunity to channel your generosity toward the elimination of suffering and the promotion of good. Your giving today will be a testament to your thanks living.

CLERK'S REPORT

Minutes from September 27th Session meeting and October 22nd Congregational meeting were approved.

Session approved the resignation of Carolyn Barks as Deacon. Her unexpired term will be filled by Donna Arneson.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Pastor Reiter and the Administrative and Personnel Committee are discussing his retirement date, tentatively February 1st, 2018.

Session will meet November 18th to discuss "What's Next?" topics regarding current and future issues in the life of the church.

The December Session meeting will be December 19th. Ordination/Installation of new church officers will be January 7th, 2018 and the Annual Congregation/Corporation Meeting will be January 28th, 2018.

Pastor Reiter will be in MN October 30th—November 3rd and November 20th—24th.

COMMITTEE REPORTS (from meeting and committee minutes)

Outreach: Gladys Cairns reported on a project called Higher Power Lunch, based on a similar program in Fargo. Session approved the committee's request to make an application for \$1,500 grant from Presbytery Women. This would be used to help with the planning and purchase of food. Business leaders would be invited to attend a once-a-month lunch hosted by FPC, possibly beginning in Spring 2018.

Session approved the committee's request to make application for a grant to help sponsor an Adult Mission Trip, working with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance.

Administrative and Personnel: The church office will be closed on December 22nd, and at noon on December 29th.

Business and Finance: Budgeted transfers into the General Fund were made from the Orr Family Fund and Merritt Reserve Fund.

Christian Education: Donations received for the church plates will be divided between CE and the Fine Arts Festival Committee. Nine youth participated in the Badlands Retreat. CE members have PAC children as prayer partners for this school year.

Property and Equipment: The committee is checking on caulking, repairs to brick plantar and sign.

Stewardship: Celebration Sunday is October 29th with lunch following the service.

Worship and Music: There is a potential candidate for organist/pianist that will be interviewed. Volunteers are needed to help decorate for Advent on December 2nd at 9:00 a.m.

Child Care Center Board: Changes to the CCC Operations Manual were approved by the Board and also approved by Session.

Board of Deacons: Parish Nurse, Wanona Goetz, has visited many members. Four hearing devices are programmed and available.

Pastor Nominating Committee: Interviews with potential candidates are scheduled.

OTHER BUSINESS

Presbytery Meeting: Jim Skaret reported on the meeting held at Hallock, MN October 6-7. Changes to the bylaws/policies state that delegates to Presbytery for a church of 300 or more members would be three instead of two commissioners. Any ordained Elder is eligible to attend, even if he/she is not currently on Session. Presbytery approved Jan Holzclaw of Minot to move to a Candidate for Ministry (Princeton Seminary) and approved Rev. Robert Blake for ordination as Pastor of FPC Moorhead. A Closing Commission was formed for the Minot FPC. With a deficit budget, a Presbytery Task Force will consider ways to reduce costs. Motion by Presbyterians for Earth Care to endorse the Presbytery of the Hudson River Overture to the 223rd General Assembly (2018) on directing the Board of Pensions and Presbyterian Church USA Foundation to divest from fossil fuel and actively invest in securities that focus on renewable energy was defeated on a close vote.

SELF DEFENSE FOR SENIORS RECOMMENDATIONS

General Tips to Remember:

- * Don't overload your arms with packages. Use a luggage cart, or make another trip.
- * Park and walk in well-lit areas.
- * Before leaving your car or a shop, observe your surroundings closely, especially if the area is unfamiliar, so you know where to go for safety.
- * Always have your keys in hand, one finger looped through a key ring, when walking to the car or door.
- * Walk with a purpose. Don't look at the ground; look around you.
- * Have a police whistle and a flashlight on your key chain.
- * Carry as little cash and credit cards as possible. Hold only what you're prepared to lose.
- * Don't slip a purse strap around your neck—the attacker could use the strap to harm you.
- * The majority of **cell phones for seniors** and some medical alarms have 911 connections—hit that at the first sign of trouble.
- * Visit the bank during the day, instead of stopping by ATM's at night. If you must visit an ATM, try a well-lit, drive-thru location.
- * Don't Open your door to a stranger. Look out a window or keyhole first, and, if necessary, speak through the door.
- * Women should put their jacket on over their purse so that the handbag is less exposed.
- * Slip cash and credit cards in a travel wallet, waist pack, or pocket.
- * Carry keys in a pocket, not in the purse.
