And Vicar Sena is now Pastor Sena, the Reverend Sena Norton! Yay! It was quite a day and she asked me to preach. I must have practiced that sermon a hundred times in my head. I rewrote it several times. I think it came out okay.

One vignette from that sermon I have carried with me for decades and I share that with you now. During my last year in seminary (1984) one of my professors told our class about a time when he was approached by a soon-to-be graduated, called, and ordained student, who was in high distress.

"Professor, how can anyone be a pastor? What with everything we have to deal with — stewardship, worship, evangelism, education, property, and community service. There's administration, financials and budgets, HR, not to mention death & dying. And what about the Altar Guild?"

The professor, who was known for reading others' minds and exhibiting a non-anxious presence, calmly looked up at the student, smiled kindly, and said, "I have always found that Word and Sacrament Ministry is a full-time job. Everything else follows afterward."

I have recalled that narrative every time I feel overwhelmed by what needs to be done, and done yesterday. Proclaiming the Word of the Gospel, God's love for us in Christ, and baptizing and communing beloved persons in sacred rituals of grace is a lot of work.

I have been listening to a lot of pastors' rants and raves lately – mostly not Lutheran or even mainline Protestant. Mainly white, male fundamentalist preachers with bushy beards who do not seem to like women, people of color or LGBTQ+ people. The rule-making, the discrimination, the hate – all in the name of a God who loved us so much he died for us – has been truly stunning. Wherever did they find THAT Jesus?

More than ever we need – all of us, really – we need to share God's love in Christ crucified and risen for all of us, for our creation, for the critters, for each other.

Yes, Ministry of Word and sacrament is a full-time job in our world of division, mission, and outrage. It takes great effort some days to love my neighbors and my enemies. But that is ministry. Welcome to ministry Pastor Sena! Who's next for this ministry? Batter up!

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month

October is breast cancer awareness month, and experts say early detection is key to fighting breast cancer.

The American Society of Breast Surgeons recommends getting a mammogram every year starting at age 40 for a normal risk woman. High risk women, however, are recommended to start getting regular mammograms at age 30. Significant family history of cancer and

certain genetic mutations are factors that could allow a woman to be considered high risk.

About 1 in 8 women in the US develop invasive breast cancer. It is the most common cancer in women and the deadliest after lung cancer.

A friend and parishioner has this plea to the women of CLC: "Please be current in your mammogram screenings. It may save your life as it did me!"

Why I am against Christian Nationalism Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton

As Christians we affirm that all people are created in God's image and deserve to be treated with dignity and respect. And so, as Christians we reject harmful ideas. Sadly, we've seen an increased polarization among us,

even in our church. This coincides with an alarming rise in hate speech and violence against religious and ethnic minorities in this country.

There is a movement known as Christian Nationalism that is attempting to define what it means to be, quote, a real American. Christian Nationalists would define a real American as white, Christian and native born. That idea is disturbing and cause for concern.

Christian Nationalists want to legislate that the United States is a Christian nation where Christianity should be privileged and only Christians should hold office. The movement seeks to link religious and political identities, often promoting racist, exclusionary and divisive ideology. This idea is neither Christian nor patriotic.

Patriotism means upholding the values of our country, such as liberty, justice, and equality, while also celebrating our diversity. That is what the United States motto means, e pluribus Unum: out of many, one.

It's ironic that the Puritans fled religious persecution and their descendants shaped the First Amendment of the Constitution which states, Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free expression thereof, There is no doubt that a majority of Americans identify as Christian. But that is different from declaring Christianity as the established religion.

When Lutheran immigrants first came to this country in the 18th and 19th centuries, they weren't considered real Americans. They did not speak English or fit in with the Deist, Calvinist religious majority. They were other and therefore suspect. German Lutheran immigrants weren't considered white. Neither were Irish, Italians or Poles. Catholics and Jews were considered an alien threat.

God knows I love my country. This beautiful, fragile, yet surprisingly resilient experiment in democracy and nationhood is not predicated on shared ethnicity. America is unique among nations. My grandfather, father and uncles all served during World Wars One and Two. I had the honor of placing a wreath on behalf of the ELCA at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. I will not have my patriotism questioned.

Christian Nationalism is a perversion of the gospel and a threat to our democracy. It's precisely because I love my country that I warn against Christian nationalism. What binds us together is not ethnicity but shared participation in our civic life springing out of our cultural heritages and working for the common good. As Lutherans it is our Christian calling to work together towards a more inclusive society.
