I have completed for the Post a proposed new member initiation program for implementation (I hope) by Post 132 in the immediate future.



Our fundraiser for window repairs is going well but we still have a ways to go. For those of you that have already donated, THANK YOU. For those that have not donated yet, hopefully you will in the near future. We have raised \$34,000 towards our estimated cost of \$125K. Out of approximately 700 members at our Post, to date 9% have contributed.

We're still experiencing a learning curve by our bartenders on our new POS. We'e also training new bartenders on the system. Please be patient. We're implementing two changes to reduce wait time. On Friday nights we'll have 2 bartenders working. On Tuesday nights (taco Tuesday) we'll have a cash-only line at the kitchen for ordering food. This will take traffic away from the bar.

We're slowly replacing our vinyl table cloth covers in the clubroom. One issue we had: When warm dinnerware was placed on the vinyl table cloth, any flyers underneath stuck to the vinyl, resulting in a dirty appearance of the covers. We ask that you follow these flyer guidelines:

- All flyers must be approved by an Executive board member before being displayed.
- Flyers must be placed in a clear "sleeve," available in the Finance Officer's Office, before inserting flyer under the vinyl tablecloth. That will keep flyers from sticking to the table cover.

Also, check the beam over the dance floor. We have re-hung pictures. In addition, we have patched and painted the wall in the entrance to the clubroom. If folks could refrain from running over the curbs, the paint job will last longer. Just saying.

DAVID ANDERSON, CHAPLAIN





As long as armies have existed, military chaplains have served alongside soldiers, providing for their spiritual needs, working to improve morale, and aiding the wounded. The Bible tells of the early Israelites bringing their priests into battle with them. Pagan priests accompanied the Roman legions during their conquests; as Christianity became the predominant religion of the Roman Empire, Christian chaplains administered to Roman soldiers. In fact, the word chaplain is derived from cappa, the Latin word for cloak.

The U.S. Army Chaplain Corps is one of the oldest and smallest branches of the Army. The Chaplain Corps dates back to 29 July 1775, when the Continental Congress authorized one chaplain for each regiment of the Continental Army, with pay equaling that of a captain. In addition to chaplains serving in Continental regiments, many militia regiments counted chaplains among their ranks.

Since the War for Independence, chaplains have served in every American war. Over that period, the U.S. Army Chaplain Corps has evolved, with the addition of Roman Catholic chaplains in the Mexican War, and Jewish and African American chaplains during the Civil War. The position of chaplain assistant was created to support the work of chaplains. In January 1979, the Army commissioned its first female chaplain. Today, some 1,300 active duty Army chaplains and 1,200 in the reserve components, representing five major faiths groups (Catholic, Protestant, Jewish, Muslim, and Buddhist) and over 120 denominations, administer to soldiers and their families.

While their duties are primarily focused on spiritual and moral issues, many chaplains have also demonstrated tremendous bravery. Stories abound of chaplains administering the last rites to fallen soldiers, oblivious to the fire around them, or dashing out into the open to rescue the wounded without regard to their own lives. Five chaplains earned the Medal of Honor for their bravery, the most recent award made posthumously to Chaplain (MAJ) Charles J. Watters in November 1969. Dozens of others have made the ultimate sacrifice.

As we remember the anniversary of The Chaplain Corps on July 29, let us truly give thanks!

STORIES FROM THE 1917 WALL

The American Legion Riders squadron dates back to 1993, but at Post 132 we've had Riders in our midst since the get-go. Take Floyd Earl Carriker, a World War I Army soldier and Harley-Davidson rider.

Floyd was born on April 29, 1897 to a local fruit buyer and his wife. In May 1918, Floyd, 21, was inducted into the Army. It was the 4th year of World War I. He served as a Corporal in the 306th Infantry Regiment.

The Regiment traveled to France where in the fall of 1918 soldiers participated in the Oise-Aisne and Meuse-Argonne offensives. These offensives were part of a series of Allied attacks known as the Hundred Day Offensive, which is credited to bringing the war to an end.

After the war, Floyd was stationed at Camp Holabird, in Baltimore, and Camp Kearny in San Diego, located where Marine Corps Air Station Miramar now sits. He was discharged March 20, 1919.

By 1920, Floyd had joined the newly organized Orange County Motorcycle Club. In January 1921, Floyd was one of 13 riders who participated in the First Annual Motorcycle Economy Test Run. The rules were simple: Go as far as you can on a 5.4-mile course using only one quart of gas.

The riders were on their first lap when they encountered sand on the intersection of 17th Street and Prospect Ave. Going into the sand rapidly, riders had difficulty keeping their machines upright. When Floyd attempted to navigate the turn, he found himself in the adjacent orange grove.

Fortunately, he was not thrown. Masterly handling of his Harley prevented a serious accident. Floyd continued the race, placing 4th in his class. On one quart of gas, he completed 8 laps, or 44.2 miles (The winner completed 18 laps, or 97.2 miles, on his Indian Scout). We're not sure what prompted the decision, but in 1922, Floyd listed his Harley for sale.

Floyd was active in the American Legion. When the Post started an employment bureau for ex-servicemen in 1921,

Floyd was designated as manager to help connect employers with Legion members.

In 1923, Floyd married Rosalie Asa, and in 1930 they had a son. From the 1930s to the 1950s, Floyd worked as a car salesman. In fact, his 1941 World War II draft card indicated he worked at Morris

motorcycle. Only run 3000 miles, a real buy. Floyd Carriker, 289 No. Center St., phone 488, Orange, Calif.

Harley-Davidson

Floyd passed in August 1969 at the age of 72 and is interred at Fairhaven cemetery. We thank you for your service, Corporal Carriker.
