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
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


Seventy Apostles Are Sent

January 17: "O Sing a Song of Bethlehem" is from our hymnal no. 170. Each verse is a meditation on a different scene of Jesus' life; Bethlehem, Nazareth, Galilee, and Calvary . . .

January 24: "Gift of Love" is a classic musical setting from 1 Corinthians 13 "Though I may speak with bravest fire, and have the gift to all inspire, and have not love - my words are vain as sounding brass and hopeless gain."

February 21: Ain't That Good News" is a Spiritual telling us "I'm-a gonna lay down this world, gonna shoulder up-a my cross, gonna take it home-a to my Jesus, ain't that good news!"

Because the sinless Savior died, my sinful soul is counted free, for God the Just is satisfied to look on Him and pardon me."

Leadership Team Meeting Minute (Con'd)

EVANGELISM – new Chair woman Elizabeth Sawyerr has not met with her team yet.

FINANCE – the 2021 Budget has yet to be formally approved so Chair Andre was urged to hold a meeting to finalize it. Little will change from 2020 he said. The Pastor's compensation was approved at Charge Conference in October.

Andre also needs to complete an audit that Treasurer Victor had hoped would be done before he turns over his duties to his successor.

Finance Sec. Idowoo reminded us that pledge envelopes are ready for pick-up. A few have been mailed to those house-bound or living away from the area but many more are left. Since few come in person to church, envelopes my be left-over. The cost of mailing them has steadily increased. She said few pledges had been received for 2021 but she is getting donations, while inadequate to meet Budget, that are gratefully accepted. She mailed the 2020 Year-end statements of giving recently.

TREASURER'S REPORT — Victor is retiring from his position, after ten years, at the end of January. It is with concern that he reported he had not met with his successor, Sunil Christopher, yet although Sunil has told him he is familiar with the fiscal management program, Quick Books, Victor has used. They have not discussed the intricacies of the position. This was not happy news for the Council. We expressed our dismay to Pastor and it is hoped the situation can be resolved ASAP.

Victor shared the year-end Profit-and-Loss and Balance Sheets. He has been able to pay our mortgage and utility bills and staff salaries BUT we are months behind in Apportionment payments to the Conference due to inadequate funds.

This obligation, based on a percentage of a church's Budget, provides funding for mission outreach, pastoral support beyond individual salaries (paid by congregations), scholarships and projects. When a congregation is in arrears, it cannot request financial aid from the Conference. While there is a grace period when payments are missed, it is unclear what possible penalties may be incurred. However, while the Conference does not determine nor interfere with a church's financial management, it does note those who fail to meet this obligation. Persistent non-payment by a congregation could cause the Conference to designate it as a "part-time" ministry which would impact its status in the Conference.

Victor also raised concern about the poor performance of our Endowment Fund, modest though it is, after having been reduced when the new entry, Upper Room, and restrooms were created in the 1990's. The Fund has barely grown even as the current stock market is on a significant upward swing. The Endowment Committee has not met and its chairwoman will be asked to do so to reassess the Funds management.

The matter of considering a second PPP loan was tabled. We will be obligated to repay the first loan if we fail to request forgiveness. This action is still pending.

We also need your tithes and offerings. Sincere thanks and appreciation to all who continue to give, but the laborers are few. We not meeting our weekly offerings currently estimated at \$6,568. In order to continue to turn on the lights at the 'beacon on Mount Pisgah Road" we need support from every member. I know and understand times are hard, but every little bit helps. Let's work hard to meet the total budget for Year 2021. It's more about coming together as a community united behind GSUMC's common cause, to make grow and nurture disciples of Jesus Christ to transform lives.

We need every single member to come together to ensure that goals set and visions, and missions are put into action, Jeremiah 29:11 For I Know the plans I have for you, plans to give you hope and a future. We need to continue to work hard to keep the lights on at our beloved church. Faithful Stewardship amid the Pandemic

On Tuesday, February 9, the Committee on Finance drafted the annual budget for the mission and ministry of the year of 2012. Andre Small, Committee Chair motioned the annual budget for approval at a Leadership Team meeting (a.k.a. Church Council) on Tuesday, February 16. After a Q & A session, the budget was approved unanimously. Praise the Lord!

On behalf of the church, the committee give thanks to God for the committee chairs and coordinators who came up with faith-based budget for God's Kingdom through Good Shepherd. The total budget amount is \$341,537 (9,083 less than 350,620 of 2020 budget), which indicates full capacity of our Work of the Lord and His people.

The committee acknowledges about 50 regular giving units, an individual or spouse, while reaching out 250 constituents each week. We appreciate all other givers. We also acknowledge many others who gave their time and talents, along with donations for the various mission projects. The committee understands that \$6,568 weekly giving will reach our goal, and prays that all the constituents can **get through this together**, as we lifted it up as Stewardship Campaign last October. May God bless Good Shepherd, that we may fill up a barn like Joseph (Genesis 41:49).

My almost-3-year old great-great-nephew Miles was just baptized by his grandfather who is a Deacon of the Catholic church. Usually he would have had this done as an infant but since he is older, he may well remember the ritual. How much he understood of its significance is unclear but he was prepared for the water on his head. I know he was told stories about baby Jesus this past Christmas and, before that, the dress-up and trick-ortreating traditions of Halloween (he was a Fire Chief). Like so many of his age, he is a little sponge, learning his world and its language in gulps..

I was reminded of my own baptism when I was 12. I was immersed three times in the manner of the Disciples of Christ Church I attended at the time. Just like Jesus, I thought. I am reminded again at the annual remembrance of His event, when pastors sprinkle us with holy water to assure us we are [still] God's beloved, just like Jesus.

We soon will enter the Lenten season when, on Ash Wednesday, we experience another ritual, the imposition of ashes. In an article on the UMC Communications network the history of this ritual was discussed. In Genesis is the story of man being created of ashes. It makes sense as we learn more about the cosmos. As Carl Sagan told us we are made of "star stuff". We are genetically connected to that great, wondrous vastness which surely touches Heaven. Symbolically, the writer of the article pointed out, ashes remind us of our humanity, our mistakes, and our eventual mortality when we "return" to ashes.

Once poured over the head and body as a sign of repentance by the guilty, by the 10th century ashes were poured over all Christians. Not until the 20th century did the Methodist church adopt the ritual of imposing ashes on the forehead in the shape of a cross. When we receive them we are reminded of who we are and the hope for who we may become.

As you know, the ashes we use are traditionally made of last year's palms recalling those waved at Jesus when he arrived in Jerusalem before his trial and execution.

In times like these of social and political disease compounded by the threat of the virus, keeping ritual is so important. We need the anchor of traditions and the sharing even if we have to do it remotely. We need order to cling to and whatever happens, the seasons of the church year occur in their comfortingly predictable cycle. We need the comfort of the eternal church and its cycle of seasons. We need the hope of better times to come.

This year of Covid. we may have a parking lot drive-through to receive our ashes as Pastor Park has suggested. He will let us know.

The UMW is still on hiatus but Church Women United is active and the organization is offering a series of on-line seminars called "Win Wednesdays" at 1 PM via info.churchwomenunited.@gmail.com. Next dates are 02/03. 02/10, 02/17, and 02/24.







Leadership Team Meeting (Church Council)

TRUSTEES – report given by Carol as Chairman Dunstan Thomas was unable to participate in this gathering. She reported that we have reduced trash pick-up to once a month since we are generating far less disposables during the virus semi-lock-down. A padlock has been placed on the access doors to the large collection receptacle because outsiders throw their own trash in. Wendy Barrios, our Office Manager, opens it before scheduled pick-up.

Unhappily the church had a break-in in late December and the Jackson entry doors, door to the Counter's space off the Adult Library, and that of the Comforter's House rooms were damaged. Nothing taken from the Counters' room but camera equipment and a laptop was taken from Comforter's House space.

The security camera that overlooks the Jackson entry was out of "memory" and failed to see the intruder(s) but has since been updated by Trustee Stuart Coxic. Police investigated but were doubtful we would iden-tify the perpetrator(s). It was assumed their goal was to find cash since they targeted the

Counter's Room (where there is never any cash nor checks held). It would also suggest they had some knowledge that Counters use that space. Fortunately the Office was not breached.

A question was raised regarding adding cameras to the New Hampshire side of the building, matter to be further considered.

We have had an ever-increasing proliferation of non-member vehicles being parked in our lot and especially along Mt. Pisgah Road. They block Pastor's designated space and access to the trash bin in spite of our signage not to park there. Carol and Dunstan have con-sulted our local police and Montgomery Co. traffic overseers and representatives have come to the site. Although we use the Mt. Pisgah graveled spaces, it turns out that the county actually owns them. The church does NOT have easement to restrict parking just for us.

We can apply for easement but it would no doubt involve legal action which could be expensive and lengthy. Meanwhile we cannot arbitrarily have cars towed UNLESS they are left there without no or out-of-date tags or for longer than 7 days. We have had cars with out-of-state tags parked for extended periods of time. Most vehicles are thought to be owned by residents of the apartment complexes near-by.

We may be able to get permission to restrict parking for the critical spaces cited above and for Saturday (for Agape congregation) and Sunday worship periods.

Carol added that all our electrical lights throughout the church have been changed to long-lasting LED bulbs by PEPCO as a cost-saving measure.

The Guardian Fire Protection Co. that services our kitchen fire suppression system and portable fire extinguishers has submitted work requests which are still pending.

Minutes from the previous (Nov. 15, 2020) meeting were approved.

PROGRAM MINISTRIES:

Pastor Park said he meets with staff every Monday. Due to the continued prevalence of the corona virus, we are asked to double mask and follow other safety precautions. (The church has held in-person worship for many weeks with a smattering of attendees plus a small choir. Most are "attending" via ZOOM or Facebook.) He thanked those who volunteer for set-up and clean-up.

He is presenting themed sermons on "Stand Firm" since Christmas and looking forward to the Lenten season with Ash Wednesday Feb. 17.



Due again to the virus, imposition of ashes may not take place in the sanctuary. An alternative scenario is to have a drivethrough at noon time that day. Decision to be announced.

Students and interested adults may sign up for "ROCK 2021" to be held via streaming on Feb. 05 and 06.

Celebration of the life of Maggie Howard, a long-time member, will be held on Feb. 07. Pastor suggested the church purchase a memorial plaque for her (cost = \$200).

Feb.07 is also the deadline for the Lenten season Love Notes.

MISSIONS Chair Janice said we had sent \$300 to the Gerald Ignace Indian clinic in Madison, WI in lieu of sending mittens and hats through the "Mitten Tree" project.

Carol told us Broad Acres School is still shuttered doe to the virus and for Advent family project we gave gift credit, grocery, and clothing cards rather than presents to the two families we supported. Since then, food items from the Tabitha Food Pantry (with Coordinator Paulette Brown's blessing) and more that have since been donated. to a representative from Broad Acres. The latter distribute food from their parking lot on Wednesdays. As Carol said, a lot of outreach is happening "below the radar" in our time of virus precautions.

Christiana, also the Education Coordinator, reported that the Sunday evening remote gatherings from 7 – 9 PM of primary and middle school-age kids with herself and Pastor Park has been very successful. Parents enjoy the sessions as well.
