#### **Dolls coming to the EV History Center**

On Sunday, July 24, at 2:00 p.m., Dr. Barbara Brown, a psychiatrist, will be discussing and displaying some of her well-known doll collection at the English Valleys History Center.

through the communal era and into the 20th century. Not all that long ago the 2nd Volume of the Amana Church's Catechism was printed at the Middle Amana Print Shop. Indeed the Middle Amana Print Shop was established when Middle Amana was built during Amana's communal era and is going full steam today (this is where the Amana Bulletin is printed). An exhibit about the printing operations in Amana is at the kitchen house for you to see. The Communal Kitchen Historic Site is open Monday – Saturday 10 - 5. The Church in Homestead is open Monday – Saturday 10 - 5 and the museum in Amana is open Monday – Friday 9 - 4, Saturday, 9 - 5 and Sunday 11 - 3.

The High Amana General Store in High Amana is open Monday – Saturday 10 - 5 and Sunday 10 - 3.

There are some very notable events this month at the museum:

Thursday, July 14 it's a "Free Night" at the museum with drinks and snacks available at the Amana Heritage Museum, Amana. A great evening to bring the kids to see the short movie about Amana and view the museum and grounds.

#### MY AMANA SOCIETY EXPERIENCE

This week I'd like to continue the story of the lily pond, and how and why it came to be.

I'll be heavily referencing a May 31, 2011 article from a website called Dave's Garden, written by Amana's own Larry Rettig. Mr. Rettig passed away in January of this year, but I'd still like to thank him for this well-written and thoroughly researched resource. If you'd like to check out the original article, please go to davesgarden.com and search for "A Lake of Lotus Lilies".

In 1843, before lowa was granted statehood, the federal government sent surveyor J. E. Whitcher to map the land in preparation for settlement. Mr. Whitcher described the general area as marshland. The next mention of the land was in 1855, after the Colonists arrived; they described it as a place suited only for cutting hay.

The years between 1855 and 1865 are a mystery, as there is still no mention of the lake. What we do know, however, is that in 1865 the Millrace was dug and it ran rather closely along the southern end of the marsh. The water from the Millrace entered the marshland and provided a reservoir that the Race could draw from when the river was low.

The first official mention of the lake was in an 1874 plat book for lowa county that shows the Millrace flowing directly into the lake. And so, finally, it seems safe to assume that the pond was well established by that date

A mere 20 years later, the lilies are flourishing, yet their appearance (and the lake's as well) remain a puzzle. It's impossible to know for sure but Mr. Rettig posits that they were likely planted by women of the Meskwaki Nation. The Meskwaki lived upriver from the villages, and visited and traded with the settlers. Native women also harvested the tubers and dried them for a winter food source, and gathered and roasted the seeds.

The Amana Colonies are brimming with stories just like this one – stories of settlers from far-away lands and native peoples with special knowledge of healing and nourishing plants and lakes that spring from marshes, lakes chock full of lilies and history and magic. Everyday magic that we can see and visit and smell when the lilies are blooming.
