DON'T BE LOCKED OUT!

Wisdom 6:12-16; Ps. 63: 2-8; 1 Thess. 4:13-18; Matt. 25:1-13

One snowy day, four friends were together chatting over a game of *Domino's*. Suddenly, the subject of the discussion shifted from relationships to dying and death. The question was: What would you do if all of a sudden it were revealed that you were going to die this very night? One of them said, "I would kneel down to pray, and I would look for any available priest to hear my confessions." Another said, "I would take all my money out of the bank; some I would donate to the Church, and the rest I would take to Atlantic City." A third said, "I would call my lawyer and make sure my will was in good order." The fourth person seemed not to really pay attention to the discussion and the various answers given, which prompted the other three to request her opinion. Eventually, she looked up and said, 'I guess, I would continue to play my Domino's game!' She was prepared and ready at any time. That is what Jesus tells us to do in today's gospel – Be prepared!

Death is an inevitable end; it will surely come when it will come. But we do not know nor anticipate when and how it will come. Therefore, the ultimate question is: "How prepared are you for your death?" Since death is inevitable, it is pertinent that you and I prepare adequately for it. As Christians, we do not have to fear death; it has a positive end if only we are prepared for it. St. Paul says: "We do not want you to be unaware...about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope." Inasmuch as we see death as a necessary end, we should know that there is life after death. We are a people of hope – we believe that the dead will rise again on the last day and "will stand judgment before the Lord." Today's gospel reading calls on us to stay awake and be prepared because we do not "know neither the day nor the hour" that our sun will set and death will come.

Today's parable teaches us that procrastination can often be our worse enemy. Late preparation for a journey can sometimes lead to the missing of our flight, or if we are using an automobile it can lead to speeding which may result in traffic fines, injuries or even death. Worse still, putting off seeing a doctor can have disastrous consequences. Sometimes a doctor has to tell a patient: "Your sickness is too far advanced to do anything to save your life. You have waited too long. If you had just come in a month or two ago we could have done something to save your life." Our nonchalant attitude can sometimes lead to our death because of our inattentiveness. If a student wants to succeed and excel in his / her examinations, they must work hard and prepare adequately. The parable also teaches us that there are certain things in life that cannot be borrowed – we cannot borrow a relationship with God. You and I cannot borrow the oil of faith. We need to possess our own individual oil at all times. We cannot gain entry into eternal life via the spiritual capital amassed by others - our parents, spouses, friends, et cetera. Like the five wise virgins, you and I must always be prepared.

Looking down our spiritual road, like the five wise virgins in today's gospel, we should always be prepared to embrace *wisdom* when she comes to us. We should not be caught running out of time trying to make our lives acceptable to God. Just as people put off their preparation for a journey, seeing a doctor, not being spiritually prepared for our final day here on earth can have a tragic consequence – it can literally send us to hell. You don't want that to happen to you! Thus, let your *soul be thirsting for the Lord your God*, while you watch and wait! Avoid being locked out!

WE HAVE GONE "GREEN" - Finally

Dear Parishioners, this past August I updated you on the progress we were making in our desire to "go green" in our church lightings. I also reminded you that each bulb in our church consumed 250 watts, and that there were a total of 70 bulbs in the church. Thus, whenever the lights were turned on, 250 x 70 or 17,500 watts of energy were used.

It is my pleasure to report to you that we have now "gone green." All former halogen lighting fixtures have been replaced with more environmentally friendly fixtures, compact florescence and LED bulbs. Each of the bulbs that were consuming 250 watts is now replaced with ones that consume only 15 watts. It is our hope that in the long term we will be able reduce our electricity bill by about 35%.

The second phase of the work is to install Exit Signs in the church and also to upgrade the lightings in the McManus Parish Center.

I want to use this opportunity to thank Karen and her husband, John McKenna, who on behalf of the parish, have been liaising with the various companies and also supervised the work as it progressed. I am grateful to all of you, my parishioners for your sacrifices, patience and support.

VERERANS' DAY

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918 saw the beginning of an armistice that brought a pause to the hostilities of World War I. They hoped it would be "the war to end all wars." That was not to be the case. In 1938, on the eve of World War II, Congress passed a bill dedicating each November 11th "to the cause of world peace" under the title of Armistice Day. In 1954, the name was changed to Veterans' Day to honor all servicemen and women.

Remembering Veterans' Day, we pray for enduring peace and for a cessation of hostilities around the world. We pray for all who have been maimed or displaced due to wars or violence. We pray for the happy repose of the souls of those who lost their lives because of wars and violence. We pray for lasting peace in all human hearts.

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
