
Gospel

He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha', that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'



The Healing Touch of Jesus

Recently I read a short story about an old and dusty violin which was taken for an action. The violin was about to be sold for a mere \$3 when a grey-haired man stepped forward, picked it up, dusted it off, tuned it and began to play. The man played such sweet music that, when he finished, the bidding jumped into the thousands of dollars. What transformed the dusty old violin into a precious instrument? Of course, the touch of the Master's hand.

I find the story fits so well with the Gospel story about a deaf man who was healed by Jesus. Mark's Gospel tells us that the man suffered the loss of his hearing and ability to speak. Such physical difficulties led him to suffer many hardships in life. However, his encounter with Jesus had transformed him completely. What he expected from Jesus when he met Him was nothing more than laying of hands on him. To his surprise, Jesus did more than he expected. He restored his hearing and speech. Describing his healing process, Mark writes, "He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' which means 'Be opened.' The result was amazing, far beyond what he could think of. His ears were opened and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he was able to speak clearly. What transformed the deaf and mute man? The touch of the Master's hand.

Both stories, the old and dusty violin and the gospel story about the deaf and mute man, are very inspiring. They challenge us to be humble and to be Jesus' instrument for healing. Firstly, is the challenge to be humble. As a result of our human weakness, we often find our lives like that of a dusty violin and a deaf man. Not only covered with dust of sins, we also suffer from spiritual deafness, muteness, and blindness. We need to allow Jesus' hand to touch and heal us. His compassionate touch will clean us from our sin and restore our dignity as God's loving children. His healing touch will open our mouth to speak and sing praises to God in prayers, Holy Mass, bible sharing, and so on. His healing touch will open our ears to listen to God who speaks to us through the Bible and through the Church.

Secondly, both stories challenge us to witness Jesus' healing touch to others. We need to help Jesus to heal the deaf and the mute in our society today. We lend our hands to give the touch that heals the sick, lend our tongues to speak to those who suffer spiritual hunger and voice of the voiceless, lend our hearts to touch the lives of those who go through life without anyone to care for them. Throughout

the history of Christianity many have devoted their lives to bring Jesus' healing touch to others such as St. Francis of Assisi, St. Damien of Molokai, St. Vincent de Paul, St. Jeanne Jugan, St. Mary MacKillop, and St. Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa). We too are called to bring the healing touch of Jesus to the downtrodden and brokenhearted.






