PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE: "Lent and a Domesticated Jesus"

Can you believe we are already in Lent season? Every year it sneaks up on me, because my head is still in Christmas mode! But here we are, Ash Wednesday is only a few days from now, and many of us are considering what to "give up" and how to best make the approach to the days of crucifixion and resurrection.

We are coming to this season at a time of world conflict and unrest, and I am aware that our circumstances are having a profound affect on our spiritual sense of security. As I write, conflict expanded from the borders of Ukraine inward, and there is great speculation in the media about where this will take the world. Our own political discourse is so ugly, so toxic, that there is a sense of division and distain in the air over differences; the Middle East remains a constant concern. Locally, food insecurity and homelessness are always before me. I don't know about you, but I find myself praying when I watch the news, because the call to be faithful in such a world seems complicated.

Whenever I get the sense that the potential for danger is intensified, I find myself narrowing my theological lens to focus on the teachings of Jesus. Those "red letters" seem ever more important when I am seeking to be faithful in a world where big picture change is beyond me. Such things as caring for strangers, keeping one's own integrity, stubbornly insisting on truth echo through me... I want to be like Jesus.

But often, I cannot help but feel that religion has domesticated – tamed – the very radical elements of his ministry that made him such a challenge to world order. In his lifespan, he taught many difficult things that demanded more than polite consent – "sell all you have and give to the poor (Luke 18:22)," "hate your mother and father (Luke 14:26)," and "I came not to bring peace, but a sword" (Matthew 10:34-36) … these statements off the lips of Jesus are real challenges to our souls,

our lifestyles and our priorities. It is really easy to water some of Christ's words down, to make them fit into our life-styles, but that is NOT what Jesus was about.

So, as Lent comes upon us, I am going to be preaching on some of the harder words of Jesus – those that unsettle us, challenge us, and make demands on us. This is a season for introspection and reflection, a time to renew our spiritual alliances with that of Christ. Join me in attentiveness to those red-letter teachings as we seek to be Christ's witnesses in this world.




HOSPITALITY COMMITTEE - PAPER PRODUCTS DRIVE

SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE Attention High School Seniors, College Students, and Graduate Students

The First Presbyterian Church Scholarship Committee want to make you aware of the availability of a limited number of scholarships for our church community. To be eligible for consideration to receive a scholarship, a student must be an active member of First Presbyterian Church of Bismarck or must have been an active participant in the life of the church for at least three years. Students at any level of study beyond high school are eligible to receive a scholarship award. Students are eligible to receive a scholarship for a maximum of four years: the years do not need to be consecutive. Graduate students may apply for scholarships, providing they are within the four-year maximum. Applications will be available in the Narthex or for download from the church website www.fcpbismarck.com. The application period will be from March 14 to May 13, 2022.

I have been investigating ways to get life alert pendants for our members. North Dakota has a Senior Safety Program at North Dakota Assistive Technology. It's a program designed to assist seniors to remain safe in their home using a emergency alert system. I am mainly focusing on the Freedom Alert pendant. Any North

Dakota resident age 60 or over who is not living in a skilled nursing facility is eligible for this program. The focus of this program is to help those older individuals with greatest economic need and those at risk for institutional placement and those in rural areas. The **North Dakota Assistive Technology** office is located at 4501 Coleman Street suite 107 in the Capital Plaza building in Bismarck. It's located across the street from St Gabriel's Community Facility. I have asked them to come to First Presbyterian Church on **Wednesday March 23rd 2022 at 1 pm** in the church parlor. Annette Goehring will have a presentation on the Senior Safety Program and discuss their Freedom Alert Program and the Specialized Telephone Program for those with vision, hearing or cognitive issues. They will display some of their technology equipment for you to see. Be ready to be amazed at what is out there. Everyone is welcome. We will be serving chips and dip since it is National Chip & Dip Day with Water/Coffee. Please join us!



SESSION HIGHLIGHTS FEBRUARY 22,2022

CLERK'S REPORT

The death of Lois Borke, February 8, 2022 was reported. Membership is 346.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Total Income YTD Actual	\$56 <i>,</i> 780	Budget	\$32,666
Total Expense YTD Actual	\$48,075	Budget	\$50,980
NET Income	\$8 <i>,</i> 705	Budget	-\$18,314

Pledged income at the beginning of a new year is normally higher due to pre-paid pledges. Total income reflects about \$14,000 in pre-paid pledges.

MODERATOR'S REPORT

Pastor Leanne stated the need for updated technology in order to stream worship service. The church will need to invest in equipment to record services.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Hospitality—March donations will be paper towels and Kleenex for the Child Care Center. Two summer services/ picnics are planned: Glencoe will host one in June, and a "back-to church" picnic will be held in August. Myhre Elementary appreciated the sweatpants and underwear donations.

Proclamation-Christian Education—A soup supper will be held March 2 before Ash Wednesday service. Youth/children choir, preparing for May 8 Youth Sunday, still needs a director. **Worship and Music**—There will be a lunch for the Jamestown Choir on February 27 after service.

Property and Equipment—Some adjustments were needed to heating of downstairs rooms. A new snow removal contractor will be chosen next fall.

Resource Management—Session approved making the final payment to Central Mechanical for the Phase I HVAC updates. The engineering firm will do an updated feasibility study for Phase II and III. If the church building or a specific room is to be used when it normally would not be, the administrative assistant needs to be notified to schedule the activity so the temperature controls could be changed. There is a facilities use form to fill out.

Board of Deacons—Recording of services is impacted by low internet service.

Child Care Center Board—Ella Gutzke continues to complete grant applications for the center. Enrollment remains steady; more staff is needed in order to increase numbers.


