the annual cycle of being a Rabbi are the sermons delivered on the High Holidays. After an introduction, an appeal for a worthy cause, or both the Rabbi does his

level best to deliver messages personally meaningful to each congregant.

But what if you could write your own

High Holidays sermon, one which spoke to you directly? Now you can! What follows is a frame I have used a number of times throughout my career, a frame into which your personal life experience and the needs of your family and your nation can be placed. Here's how it works.

• ome of the most important moments in

Introduction: the Talmud teaches us the symbolism of the blowing of the shofar. "awake, awake you who sleep from your slumber and return to God." The purpose of the shofar is to reawaken us to our responsibilities and to that which is most important to us. Each of the different sounds of the shofar awaken us in their own way.

Body: for each of the sounds--The long tekiah, the broken shevarim, the staccato teruah and the great tekiah gedolah - choose some aspect of your life to focus on. The long tekiah hints at constancy, the broken shevarim to something broken in our lives that needs

repair, the staccato cries of *teruah* hints at the many concerns we have for our loved ones,

> and the great tekiah gedolah to our hopes for a repair of the world and a secure future for the of Israel.

What and who are the great constants in our life and do we need to take more time to appreciate them? What in

Jewish people in our state

our lives needs repair? What more can we do to understand the needs of our loved ones and to support them in ways large and small? And what prayers can we say to God to provide us with protection at home and in the state of Israel from our many threats and enemies?

Each of us has different answers to these questions, And those answers change from year to year. As each of us approaches the High Holidays, let us each reflect upon our own high holiday sermon so that we bring to mind our hopes and responsibilities and ready ourselves to stand before God ready to pray for everything that matters to us in our lives.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

hat would they do without us? By that I mean the world in general and Rockland county in particular. There has been a constant barrage of anti-semitism seen on the world stage and locally like we have not seen in ages. The best answer to this is not to ignore but to confront the anti-semites and say to them and point out to them that a world without us would be a very dangerous, unhealthy and boring place. You hate us so much, you are obsessed with Jews so much yet without us you have nothing.

Let's start locally. Why doesn't someone say to the County Executive and his followers and those of like mind if you are so afraid of "them" who are coming to the County then next time you step into Nyack Hospital or Good Samaritan Hospital make sure to look carefully at all of the names on the walls of the people who made sure the hospital was built and continues to exist. Those same names share the same heritage as those of who you fear. In fact, maybe when you need that MRI or that CT scan at said facilities or somewhere else in the County or even in the fabled halls of some of NYC's finest medical institutions, you should not take that MRI or CT because guess who created them, those with the same religious background as those you hate so much.

One cannot pick up *The New York Times* on a daily basis without seeing multiple articles about Israel, something involving Jews, it is like an obsession for the paper. One could argue that they do this for their local leadership but the truth is that *The New York Times* is a paper with global influence and global readership. There are one billion people in China, 750 million people in India (granted both have large percentages of illiterate people but also both have substantial numbers of educated/literate people as well) where *The New York Times* is available and certainly you don't see multiple articles per day regarding the Chinese or Indian populations, their politics, their land, their people.

The truth is besides the massive scientific advancements that the Jewish people have brought to the world, not just the technologies but the medicines there is also the unique contributions to the entertainment sector whether it be literature,

art, music and certainly television and the movies. Face it, without the creative minds of Jews around the world we would have nothing to watch of interest. It is rather amazing how many Israeli TV shows have become the basis of various series on HBO, Showtime, the mainstream TV networks and Amazon Prime. It is like Hollywood has to turn to Israel for the next great thing in television.

The next time you are in Ben Gurion Airport or a hotel in Tel Aviv, look around carefully. You will see airlines from around the world and visitors from around the world coming to Israel. Sure it's a great tourist destination but that is not why they are there. They are there to tap into the power of the Jewish mind. For all of the anti-semite politicians who are leading their countries around the world, many citizens of those countries come to Israel to tap into the fact that the Jewish people are leaders and contributors like no others. This is the ultimate answer to those that hate us for without us their world would be a different place.

The world has always been obsessed with Jews. Perhaps locally it is become so apparent because much of the focus is on Hasidim, simply because they look a little different or act a bit more insular than those of us who we see at regular Shabbat services in our Congregation but the bottom line is that they are Jews like us and we are forever linked. With all of the clamoring of hatred around us, please remember that the best answer to all of this is to stand strong together. We are a live answer to all of the evil that surrounds us. We aren't coming to take over anything. Our Congregation is a proud answer to all of the anti-semites in the world. Some of us have seen first-hand the worst evil created by the hand of man which grows out of basic hatred. Yet, we stand together inside a beautiful building with a beautiful group of people and say look at what we and our people have given to Rockland County and the world at large and we aren't going anywhere.

THE CANTOR'S CLOUD by Cantor Menachem Bazian Remembrances...

had to work at a client with offices on Amsterdam Ave in the 90's (I don't remember where exactly). I started out late to try and avoid some traffic. I said goodbye to my lovely wife and started what I expected to be a normal, long and aggravating commute into the Big Apple. My mind was on the business features the client wanted in his software, how to attenuate his over-exuberant desires into something more representing reality, how to solve some of the technical issues that were on our plate, etc. In short, my mind was on autopilot as I got on to Route 3 East and headed towards the Lincoln Tunnel.

I glanced to my right and saw a huge column of smoke coming from the downtown area. I immediately turned on my radio and heard that an airplane had struck one of the World Trade Center towers. I immediately pulled over to the side to listen to the story. I remember distinctly that my first thought was that this could be an act of terrorism. I listened for just a few minutes and heard of the second plane hitting the second tower. At that point I was sure of two things: First, that this was undoubtedly an act of terrorism and second, there was no way I was going in to New York City that morning. I turned around and went home. Chana and I watched with riveted attention as events unfolded on CNN. I will never forget the image of the towers crumbling and Chana sobbing as they fell.

Like the rest of the country, I was in shock. But I was also furious. The unthinkable had happened. Never before in the history of the United States had an attack of this magnitude been successfully executed in the continential United States. An act of war had been committed against my homeland and I wanted justice.

When President Bush visited Ground Zero, I saw that live on TV too. Someone in the crowds called out that he couldn't hear the president, to which the president replied "I can hear you! I can hear you, the rest of the world hears you, and the people who knocked these buildings down will hear all of us soon!" The chants of USA! USA! that followed those inspired impromptu words still bring chills to my spine when I watch the visit again on YouTube.

Two days after 9/11, I finally went in to the city.

The client's offices were located in the

basement of a brownstone, right across the street from a police precinct. As a security measure, the New York City police had blocked off the street and I had to find parking several blocks away. When I attempted to walk onto the block, a uniformed police officer stopped me



and asked for my ID. I pulled out my wallet and showed him my driver's license. At the time, I was a chaplain with the Passaic Police Department and the officer saw my shield. He looked at me and asked me, "Why did G-d allow this to happen?" His question, I will admit, caught me off guard but I thought quickly. I responded, "I do not know why G-d allowed this to happen but I can tell you this: Without evil, good has no meaning and rather than think of the 19 murderers who killed 6,000 people (which is what we thought the death toll was at the time), I would prefer to think of your brothers in the Police Department and cousins in the Fire Department who risked and lost their lives running into those buildings to save as many people as they could." The officer merely nodded his head and waved me through.

The *Torah* commands us, "Remember the days of old, Understand the years of ages past; Ask your father, he will inform you, Your elders, they will tell you." (Deut. 32:7). I have often thought of the duality of this command: "Remember" and "Understand." The Torah is teaching us an essential lesson: It is not enough to just remember something that happened, we must strive to learn from it. As George Santayana said, "Those who don't learn history are doomed to repeat it."

As I write this, it is the 18th anniversary of that horrible day. I look at the state of the United States, especially the divisions in our country, and I realize that G-d's commandment to "Remember" and "Understand" are nowhere being heeded. Our politicians (of both parties) are opportunistic and interested in their own benefit and not that of their constituents. They lie with incredible ease and pander without shame.

Just a few days ago, a Congregation Adas Israel of Duluth, MN burned to the ground. It was an old congregation, dating back to about 1900. It was a mostly wood building with an incredibly beautiful and ornate hand carved, wooden ark that was filled with 14 Torah scrolls. I was privileged to serve the congregation as the High Holidays cantor for 7 years prior to joining Shaarey Israel. Today the community is in mourning. In all likelihood, this tragedy marks the end of what was once a large and vibrant Jewish community. They lost almost everything. Over a hundred years of history and memories are gone. Thankfully, they were able to save 10 of their Torah scrolls and a few other things, but they lost countless treasures. I used to go down to the basement sanctuary (the equivalent of our small sanctuary that we use during the week) and browsed untold treasures in rare Jewish books. I saw a Siddur that was issued to members of the United States Army during World War I and another that was issued during World War II. All of these historical treasures are gone.

This morning, I saw two tweets from Representative Ilhan Omar that I thought were very telling. The first tweet said: "My heart is breaking for the Adas Israel Congregation. I am mourning the damage to this historic house of worship." One would look at this tweet and, on its face, would see a sensitive, compassionate member of congress feeling the pain of a Jewish community in her state. Then I saw this tweet in response to a *New York Times* article that Benjamin Netanyahu pledged to annex parts of the "occupied West Bank" if he wins reelection.

Said Representative Omar:

"This is the nail in the coffin to a two-state solution or any peace deal.

"Anyone who does not condemn this or take action to prevent it cannot credibly say they support a two-state solution.

"Speak up!!!"

Seriously? And the rockets from Gaza, the multiple intifadas, the outrageous support of terrorism within the PA, the refusal to acknowledge Israel's right to exist and more are not even greater barriers to peace?

We live in dangerous times. We Jews have survived through many such times, frequently at

horrific cost. We have to take the time to remember our history and make the effort to understand it. As G-d commands, "Ask your father, he will inform you, Your elders, they will tell you." Speak with people who know. Ask people who survived the Holocaust, what it was like in the years prior to the war and what they went through. Read books and articles. Watch survivor testimony (check out the Shoa Foundation [https://sfi.usc.edu/] and the United State Holocaust Memorial Museum https://www.ushmm.org/remember/holocaust-reflections-testimonies]. Try to understand where we come from so we can defend against the evil from returning to threaten us not only as Jews but as Americans as well.

We have to choose our representatives wisely. We have to pay less attention to party and more to the integrity of the individuals we elect. We need people who *believe* in more than just reelection and power. We need people who are willing to honorably bear the burden of their public office, speak with honesty and integrity and act in the best interests of their constituents and the nation. Hatred must be addressed in all its forms. It exists on both sides of the aisle and we must all take a stand.

Today is the anniversary of a great tragedy that affected all Americans. We must always remember that. More importantly, we must learn from it.




