WHERE DOES YOUR MONEY GO?????

The Initial Offering envelope goes to the general fund to help pay for contribution envelopes.

Regular offering envelopes go to the church general fund or missions. All loose plate contributions on regular Sundays also go to general fund. Easter also goes into the general fund. You can indicate on your regular offering envelope if you wish to contribute to: Salaries and current expenses or missions.

Salaries & Current Expenses

Salaries and current expenses are the "Home" expenses. They include salaries for pastor, secretary and custodian, church and parsonage maintenance and upkeep, utilities, insurance, worship supplies etc.

Missions

Mission expenses are the dollars we send to Iowa District West, Camp Okoboji and Lutheran Family Services.

If you do not indicate your choice, your contribution will go to the GeneralFund.

Special Offering Envelopes go to Missions – they include: Reformation, Advent, Christmas, Ash Wednesday, Lent Services, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Pentecost, and Thanksgiving. The Children's Christmas Program contributions goes to the Sunday School Department and the Candlelight Service contributions goes to the youth. All loose plate offerings go to Missions on the above holidays.

Special Offering such as Building Fund, Lutheran Witness etc. go to the fund marked on the envelope.

You <u>must</u> use <u>your current year's numbered envelope if you want your</u> contribution recorded for your statements. If you have any questions,

please call the office for clarification.

Who Is Jesus?

Some couples expecting a baby are eager to know the sex of the child beforehand for obvious reasons – like appropriate nursery décor, blue or pink clothing, even choosing names. Others like to wait till the baby is born to find out if they are parents of a baby boy or a baby girl.

Joseph and Mary had no such dilemma. An angel appeared to each with the same message: "She will bear a son, and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins. All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet: 'Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call His name Immanuel' (which means God with us)" (Matthew 1:21-23).

Thirty plus years later, this Jesus rode into Jerusalem as people shouted, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is He Who comes in the name of the Lord!" but some asked, "Who is this?" After all Jesus had done throughout His three-year ministry, people still didn't know who He was! Even those who answered the question gave an insufficient reply: "This is the prophet Jesus, from Nazareth in Galilee" (Matthew 21:9-11).

The same terrible reality is ours today: Not everyone knows who Jesus is. Some, like those in Jesus' triumphal path that day, say He was a great prophet or teacher. Others say He was a fake, an imposter. How would you answer the question, "Who is Jesus?" We, like Peter, have the only true answer: "[He is] the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16). Not only did Peter have the answer, he directs us, "In your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect..." (1 Peter 3:15 NIV).

As stewards of the Gospel, we must be prepared. We must be studying God's Word and be in prayer that we might be empowered by the Word and equipped by His Spirit to give answers to those who ask and to use the wonderful, natural opportunities that the Christmas season affords to speak about the Savior, the reason for our Christmas joy.

May God empower us all to spread the wonderful news that Jesus Who is the Savior of the world has come to redeem us and to give us an abundant life now and life with Him in eternity.

From Pastor's Desk

Resilience is the ability to overcome difficult situations. We have heard repeatedly that Covid was unprecedented. In some ways, that's true. We have not had a global pandemic for a while and many saw for the first time the implications the pandemic had on their lives. But we've had other situations in life that personally challenging: cancer, loss of loved ones, financial troubles, job loss... You fill in the blank. How did we overcome this? As a new pastor I had the privilege to serve a generation that's almost completely gone. They were born or grew up during the great depression. Dust storms, economic tragedy, loss of life were a daily part of their lives. This childhood was followed by World War II where many of their brothers went off to war and never came home or came home and weren't the same. This generation didn't miss church and they knew the importance of the Christian faith, prayer, and life together. Through this suffering God had made them resilient to overcome situations with faith, prayer, and weekly worship of the God who saved them in His Son.

While times have changed, the situations of life haven't. We still suffer, struggle, get sick, and the future is unknown. We need what Jesus gives- the ability to endure and meet the challenges with faith. This week I heard some downright scary statistics. Last weekend in a mid-sized town in a state near us, 5 teenagers attempted suicide. The district reported that 26% of seniors and 23% of sophomores had attempted suicide. They called in local clergy to help. Guys we have the hope the world needs. Jesus has the hope we need! It is the strength of His presence in His Word and Sacraments, and the fellowship that creates in weekly worship and study of the Word to endure. We need the resilience He gives and maintains.

This Advent, God's Word focuses us on the people of the bible who have dealt with adversity, sometimes by their own doing. God's Word teaches and delivers Jesus who has overcome every barrier, even ourselves, to build resilience in Him. He makes us tough. And we need that. And the world needs that. Come be made tough this Advent.




