

Sunday Reflection – The Ascension of the Lord

Why did Jesus leave his disciples forty days after his resurrection? Forty is a significant number in the Scriptures. Moses went to the mountain to seek the face of God for forty days in prayer and fasting. The people of Israel were in the wilderness for forty years in preparation for their entry into the promised land. Elijah fasted for forty days as he journeyed in the wilderness to the mountain of God. For forty days after his resurrection Jesus appeared numerous times to his disciples to

assure them that he had risen indeed and to prepare them for the task of carrying on the work which he began during his earthy ministry.

Welcome Deacon Larry!



Our newly assigned
Deacon, Larry Hammel, was
born in New York City in
1935. He grew up on Long
Island and attended both
parochial and public
schools. He went on to
attend the University of
Notre Dame (no, he did
not play football but

enjoyed the home games).

Following graduation with a degree in civil engineering, he went on to MIT obtaining an advanced degree in transportation engineering.

Thereafter he worked for a traffic engineering firm on Long Island.

Larry and Marianne, his wife, were married in 1959 and he was promptly drafted into the Army. His tour of service was spent at the Aberdeen Proving Ground in Maryland. Upon completing his service, Larry worked in transportation planning for the Washington Metropolitan area.

He and Marianne then returned to New York where he continued his career in transportation planning in both the public and private sectors, with a license as a professional engineer. Larry retired from engineering in 1992.

The Hammels have four adult children and eight grandchildren, living from upstate New York, the Washington metropolitan area, to Tennessee and Texas.

Larry was ordained a permanent deacon in 1984 for the Rockville Center Diocese in New York. He served in two parishes on Long Island. After retiring from engineering, he became a hospital chaplain at two Catholic hospitals on Long Island where he became a board certified Chaplain by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.

To be closer to family, Larry and Marianne relocated to northern Virginia where Larry was assigned as a deacon in the Arlington Diocese. Larry currently coordinates prison ministry in Loudoun County for Catholic Charities of Arlington Diocese.
