From the Desk of Rabbi Daniel Polish

Dear Friends,

Welcome to December, the month that reminds Jews how truly marginal we are to American society. This is the time of year that our mailboxes are inundated with catalogues that don't seem to recognize that we are here at all, stores deluging us with music that does not talk to our own experience and public spaces decorated for a joy we do not share. We receive the message from the highest levels of government that we should be saying "Merry Christmas", though we might prefer to say "Happy Holidays". And no one in any store wishes us a Happy Chanukah. I write this not in anger, or even sorrow—merely objectively noting that December calls our attention to what it means to be less than 2% of the population. Most of the time we feel fully integrated into American life. For this one month we feel a little bit marginal.

On the other hand Christmas is, among other things, the way that Christians respond to the fact that the days are getting shorter, the weather colder, and people are drawn more to the comfort and warmth of their homes. And they are not the only ones. We respond to that reality too. Which is one of the reasons that at this very same time we come together in our homes and light lights—progressively more each night—and are drawn together by shared memories and joys.

Two holidays with very different stories and very different ideologies. But one part of each of them is a shared human response to the reality that is December. So make the most of it. I am told that here at Shir Chadash one of the things that people enjoy and remember the most is our celebration of what has come to be called "Light Up the Night". I for one wouldn't miss it. As it happens I will be spending the previous week in Rome. And my friends in the Vatican have suggested that I stay a little longer. But I would not give up the opportunity to be here with you. So I will say "Merry Christmas" to them, turn around and say "Happy Chanukah" to you and rejoice in lighting up the night together.

It is a great night. Each of us brings our Chanukiah from home and for this one night we share them all with our community—our extended family. We rejoice in the beauty of the light and the warmth of community. Despite the new federal decree, we say, "Happy Chanukah" to one another, gorge on latkes of so many different kinds (Jelly donuts too), play dreidel games, and we defeat the frostiness of December. I invite you to come be part of that. And if you have friends who need a little Chanukah lift, bring them along with you. I look forward to celebrating with you December 15 at 6:30pm.

Member's Corner

'Sermon' on Shabbat, November 24, 2017

Shabbat Shalom.

Last week the Rabbi asked me to use the time for tonight's sermon to give an update about our Morse Elementary School Project so I'm going to do that this evening.

As most of you know, we have been helping the Morse School on Mansion St. in Poughkeepsie for the past 2 years. A brief history: About 2 years ago, 4 local synagogues joined together to form the Hudson Valley Jewish Social Action Coalition—Beth-El, Vassar Temple, Schomre Israel and Shir Chadash, and then the Harding Club, a local social and philanthropic Jewish Men's club joined as well. The mission has been to form a functioning, cooperative venture with the belief that the Coalition can take on meaningful and larger social action programs because we are stronger together.

Since October 2016, the Jewish Social Action Coalition through each of its partners has been supporting the Morse School Food Pantry. The Morse School is one of the poorest elementary schools in the Poughkeepsie school district. 100% of over 600 kids in grades 1 through 5 receive free or subsided lunches. Staff at the school were aware of very poor families and sometimes also dysfunctional families who were stressed past the breaking point by illness, death, substance abuse, fires, evictions, job loss, crime, and so on. And they were aware of children in these families who went hungry, particularly over weekends and vacations, sometimes only eating as little as 1 can of corn or soup for an entire weekend.

We were very moved by the incredible dedication of the administration and staff of the school who converted a closet into a pantry and were using their own pay checks to buy food to sustain these very vulnerable children. Using donated funds and grant money, we started to order food at greatly reduced prices from the Food Bank of the Hudson Valley. Shir Chadash was instrumental in making this possible by applying for and receiving agency status with the Regional Food Bank. So far in 2017, we have provided nearly 9,000 pounds of food for the needlest Morse School kids and their families. As well as the thousands of pounds of food you donated during the High Holy Days and at other times as well. We also delivered 30 overflowing Thanksgiving Baskets to the Morse School—made possible by your donations, donations from the Poughkeepsie Farm Project and purchases from the Food Bank.

This year we learned that 3 years ago, the Morse School librarian position, as well as others in the district's elementary schools, had been eliminated and that there had been **no library services** for all this time. Several of the Coalition synagogues' members as well as others in the community, spent the summer sorting and shelving library books at the Morse School. Just a week ago, the Library was open to some classes for a few hours —open for the first time in over 3 years—thanks to our volunteers. The plan is to open the library every Monday and Thursday morning, all staffed by volunteers. Kids will be able to take out books and there will be special reading, storytelling and holiday-related programs as well.

Roberta Tracy is volunteering in the library and I was very moved to hear her description of the experience. Please check-in with her during the Oneg and let her tell you what it was like. (Or contact her if you would like to know more about volunteering tracyajrs@aol.com)

But, to continue to do all this and succeed what do we need?

Consider how Shir Chadash could undertake a special project that could help these kids. Consider volunteering to spend a couple of hours on a Monday or Thursday morning at the Morse School Library helping kids find and take out books.

This is a brief overview—we have done a lot—donated lots of school supplies and kids' clothing, as well as so many pounds of food. In thinking about this I did some personal reflection. I know that we have all heard a lot about Tzedakah over the years and that we know that Tzedakah is different from charity, those who are more fortunate giving to those who are poorer. Tzedakah is about Tikkun Olam, working for justice and fairness in the world.

Member's Corner

Most of you know that I'm a social worker, and you may think that I grew up learning all about charity and Tzedakah but you would be wrong about that. For me, it's a journey. In my childhood home, my 1st generation, economically-stressed working class parents were fond of saying that "God helps those who help themselves" and "charity begins at home". I've surveyed some family and friends, and I know that some of you grew up with the family "pushke" and the little blue and white Jewish National Fund boxes and were encouraged to make contributions. My Russian grandparents belonged to a group called the Telechana- Svenskavoya Sick Benevolent Association, formed in the days before Social Security, to help families in need, families like them.

I've been thinking that for many of the immigrant and first generations of Jews (and other groups as well, I'm sure) family survival was paramount, closely followed by the survival of the tribe, from Jews in the community and in Israel to those in need in places like the Soviet Union and Ethiopia.

There has also been a tradition of championing the cause of justice, of downright fairness, for those outside the Jewish community as well. The 1960's Civil Rights Movement in the US is a good example.

But we can ask ourselves, how do we relate today to the lack of justice and fairness just 7.9 miles from where we are right now? Imagine, 14 minutes away live children and families without sufficient food and kids who walked through their school library, just last week, for the first time in over 3 years.

I'll end by noting that on Thanksgiving morning the Poughkeepsie Journal published a story about a Thanksgiving dinner that was held at the Morse School this past Tuesday, for 130 1st grade students and 1 guest for each student. The 1st grade teachers cooked all the food for the 260 guests. The school has been doing this for the past 7 years because the teachers discovered that when they taught their classes about the history of the first Thanksgiving, many of their students had no idea what a feast was and had never attended a dinner like most of us have every year. This year, just this past Tuesday, kids were asked what they were thankful for. Kids responded that they were thankful for food, for furniture, for their mommy, for their daddy. Worth thinking about.
