

January 20, 2019 Second Sunday in Ordinary Time Jn 2:1-11

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

Flowing water last week, and flowing wine this week! We hear of Jesus' first 'sign' (word for 'miracle' in John's gospel) at Cana where he transformed water into wine. And not just a little wine but an abundance of wine. How much? "six stone water jars there....each holding twenty to thirty gallons..... filled to the brim" (John 2:6-7) Math may not be my specialty but that sounds like 120-180 gallons! And this is served after the wedding has been going on for a while! And, still more, about this wine, it was not the cheap watered down kind, it was wined up as the best vintage. The headwaiter testifies to it in verse 2:10 (and he doesn't even know the miraculous part of the story yet!) Jesus saves the day for the wedding party, but even more, Jesus saves our lives, by giving the eternal drink of Himself to us; His Precious Blood at the Last Supper. So on one level, Jesus performs a great wonder of keeping peace and making a joy filled celebration even more glorious, but on a higher level, Jesus is 'sneaking a peek' and giving a glimpse to us of his 'saving work'. Jesus reveals how His mission is to fulfill (fill-full) the old obligations of the Mosaic Law (purity defined as religious observances of exact rituals for God), and begin a new covenant with God introducing the obligations of Christianity (purity defined as religious practice of loving service to neighbors). Jesus says, "I have come not to abolish but to fulfill the Law and Prophets (Matthew 5:17). We will see Jesus and the Pharisees tangle in skirmishes over meticulous details of religious ceremonies, such as ritual handwashing and prohibited conduct on Sabbaths (See Mark 7:2-4 over hand-wash controversy and Mark 2:23-28 over Sabbath prohibitions). So with this first SIGN, Jesus is establishing from the beginning that He will be about deeper, more abundant and life-giving work in his ministry. Jesus will show that religion and rituals are for the purpose of transforming lives, by establishing living relationship between God and His People (God, Us, and one another!)

John's gospel is so good at hinting at the deeper meanings in Jesus' words and actions. Even the word he uses to describes Jesus' spectacular work is significant. John describes it as a 'Sign', instead of 'wonder' or miracle. A miracle amounts to 'what you see is what you get'. But with a SIGN, the seeing is only the beginning, and there is so much more to get beyond the Sign. John sees through the physical action, to understand the deeper spiritual meaning. For example, Jesus turns water to wine. Such a specific act brings to mind the miracle of Moses we call the First Plague, when he turned the water of the Nile River into blood (which only brought death to the fish and anyone trying to drink it for water-see Exodus 7:18ff). So, Moses' miracle brought death. Yet, Jesus' sign brings life. And that this all happens at a marriage, indicates a new beginning (covenant), blending the old and new. Jesus's sign brings life and life abundantly (John 10:10). He takes the *empty* jars of *old religious rituals* and fills them with new and fruitful meaning. Jesus will declare himself the source of 'living water'. In John 7:37-38, he says, "Let anyone who thirsts come to me and drink. Whoever believes in me, as scripture says: 'Rivers of living water will flow from within him." Earlier in John 4:10, Jesus had told the woman at the well, "If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." So in the context of water changing into anything, people would have thought of Moses' wonder of changing the Nile water into death-dealing blood. But Jesus brings the new and best with His own life-giving blood. Yet, to add even more Old Testament connections to what is behind this New Sign of Jesus, is the ancient prophecy of Ezekiel's vision of God restoring His people by the flowing water of the Temple. Ezekiel 47:1-12 tells of a vision of 'streams of living water flowing from the Temple in all directions, giving life to everything it fills, washes, and feeds. (Compare this flowing water to the river in Genesis 2:10 that wells up to water the garden in all four directions.) So if the restored life of the Garden of Eden is what we are after, or the holiness of a Temple and Religion that is purified, then we find it in Jesus, and His New Covenant. Jesus Himself will tell us about His Mission, "I say to you, there is something greater than the temple is here" (Matthew 12:6).
