That pandemic would end up killing an estimated fifty million people around the world. In the United States there would be 675,000 deaths from this flu. For the U.S. military, there would be almost as many deaths from the Spanish Flu than from all the battles it would fight. The war would kill 53,402 in battle and it was estimated that 45,000 additional soldiers died from the Spanish Flu. This is the same kind of flu we are fighting; just that it is a mutation of it coming from a different location. The 1918 Spanish flu would go on for two years before it would begin to dissipate.
