But we loved to go out every day.*


*Sometimes we watched

Board Profile: Board President John Atwood

Committed to Community Service

At age 83, John Atwood of Easton, Board President of The Dixon House, could run circles around the property and still have energy to do one thing more! A member of The Dixon House Board of Directors since 2007, John initially became involved with the organization through his wife Sandy, who was a member of the Board of Directors for nine years. He would come with Sandy to help with chores at the residence like gardening and eventually donating the fenced-in area at The Dixon House. When Sandy became ill, John was elected to the Board of Directors and has been here ever since.

Linda Elben, Executive Director of The Dixon House, comments, “Mr. Atwood is always here and supportive of our events at The Dixon House and loves communicating with the families of residents here.”

Born and raised in Boston by a blue collar family, he served in the Navy when he turned 18 years old. Later, he studied civil engineering at Tufts University on the GI Bill. He worked with General Electric on the Polaris guidance system before beginning a career

with Black & Decker. He was transferred to Easton’s Black & Decker to open the plant in 1974 and served as the Plant Manager. He retired in 1992 and decided to stay in Easton. He comments, “I liked the informality of living here, as well as the four seasons.”

He is an avid golfer and can be found on the golf course five days a week. But it is his deep commitment and love of the community that really shines through when you talk with him. He has spent his life committed to community service. Among the civic organizations on which he has served are Adkins Arboretum, Talbot County Cancer Board, Talbot County Planning and Zoning, St. Peter and Paul Parish, the Rotary Club, Talbot County Relay for Life, the Talbot County Country Club, Hog Neck Golf Course, Caroline Country Club, and of course, The Dixon House.

When asked about his love of The Dixon House, he states, “I have always wanted to support The Dixon House. It has always had a good foundation.” He adds, “I love walking through the door – it feels like you are walking into a home, not an institution. We cater to those living on limited incomes. What gives me comfort is when I see how our employees give comfort and care to the residents here.”

Dixon House Residents Celebrate Birthdays With Fanfare!

You could hear the band playing from down the street. Balloons lined the porch railings, announcing that a party was about to begin. This was not just any party – it was a party celebrating the birthdays of Dixon House residents Milton Agreen (age 106) and Oneita McCall (age 105). According to Linda Elben, executive director of The Dixon House, “We even had the Mayor, our State Senator, and a representative from the Governor’s Office in attendance to celebrate with us.”

Both Milton and Oneita spent the afternoon toe-tapping on the porch to songs of bygone days played by the Free and Easy Band. Both residents seemed to enjoy the nostalgia of the old tunes. Oneita lived in Cambridge much of her life – working in a restaurant with her husband for many years and volunteering at Soup Day at St. Paul’s Church in Cambridge up until the age of 94. She was able to live independently until she was 96 years old. When asked, her children comment that she

has lived a healthy life – maintaining her weight and taking good care of herself. Her stepdaughter Betty McCall, adds, “I love the care she gets at The Dixon House. It feels like an extension of our family.”

Milton worked for years as an accountant and Post Office worker. He moved to Easton in 2000 from Florida. Although his wife died in 2001 after 60 years of marriage to Milton, he maintained driving his car until age 96. When his children were asked about their father’s longevity, they shared a comment from Milton’s sister, Elsie Agreen, who said that Milton was a teetotaler and would probably live forever. His daughter-in-law, Linda Agreen, comments, “It’s been wonderful for him at The Dixon House. He has peers to be social with and we feel he is being cared for here.”

Both residents received proclamations from the Governor and State of Maryland Senate. Mayor Bob Willey, who was in attendance, comments, “I have been coming to The Dixon House for many years. It’s nice to see the residence providing this much-needed service for the town.”

Roxie Thomas began her career with The Dixon House in June 1997 as a housekeeper, caring for The Dixon House facility. Today, Roxie is a Resident Aide, caring for all the residents’ laundry and providing them with personal care. She is affectionately nicknamed the “Good Morning Girl” as she wakes up and assists residents with their morning routines. Roxie comments, “I do all I can for the residents.”

During her time at The Dixon House, Roxie remembers that there was an infirmary located where the Craft Room is now. When residents were ill, they would stay in the infirmary until they were better. Another memory she has is of meal time at The Dixon House when residents would dress up for all the meals. Residents would change their clothes for each meal with women wearing dresses and skirts to attend.

Most of all, Roxie enjoys getting to know each resident and learning about their lives. She comments, “You can learn a whole lot from them.”

Her co-workers applaud her kindness and caring nature – pointing out that as their co-worker, Roxie helps in any way she can.

She is affectionately nicknamed the “Good Morning Girl” as she wakes up and assists residents with their morning routines.

Roxie loves that The Dixon House feels it’s just like home, adding, “When you walk in the door you feel welcomed here.”

The Free and Easy Band provided front porch entertainment with some oldies, but goodies!




The weather was perfect for the annual Memorial Day Picnic on the front porch.
