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Putting our Talents to Use

Each year, as the days begin to grow longer, and the calendar starts to draw towards a close, we as a congregation take time to begin thinking about financial plans for the new year through

the creation of a church budget. We also take time to think about what it means to be good stewards of the gifts, talents, and financial resources God has granted to each of us. Our stewardship emphasis this year will begin on Sunday, October 25, with sharing from the Commissions of the Church Board. Then, on November 15, we will finish up our emphasis as I will share on our theme scripture, Matthew 25:14-30. This is the well-known Parable of the Talents. Our theme, drawn from this scripture, will be "Putting our talents to use."

As we consider how to put the gifts, talents, and financial resources God has given to us to use, this parable from Matthew's Gospel offers us a helpful way forward. How we utilize these resources, and especially how we utilize them in the midst of the congregational community we are building together, is important. In this well-known parable from Jesus, we see the examples of three different people, how they invest the money that is given to them to steward while the master is away. As we think about how to utilize what we have received from God, this parable reminds us that we cannot simply hold onto those skills, talents, and resources God has given to us. No, we are to put them to work, so that they can grow and be used to the glory of God and our neighbor's good.

Looking forward to our continuing journey together, we can begin to see how this might play out in our shared lives together. Even in the midst of great uncertainty, and yes, even fear, we see that we are called to put what we have been given to use. You are invited, then, to consider how you will commit to utilizing your financial resources to support our work together as a congregation, and as well to think about how you will commit to using your skills and talents to contribute to our ongoing mission.



Connection in Service

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus, our Lord. -Romans 8:38-39 (NRSV) This wonderful affirmation brings me comfort as we all experience separation from the communities that mean so much to us. Even when we gather in worship, we are separated, and our contact is limited to connecting with our eyes and brief conversations. Even before COVID-19, there was discussion about what it meant to be the church. A great deal of research showed that congregations who classified themselves as alive and vibrant were not focused on Sunday morning, but instead the rest of the week. The Sunday morning worship, the business of the church, and the community gathered were celebrations of the real work done in the community. This research goes beyond the church to community organizations as well. In these past several months, I have felt disconnected from the other members of my congregation, from family, from civic groups, and from many of you who make up the community of Camp Mack. The spark, the fire, the physical touch seem to be missing. The early church of Acts was a community that ate together, shared their resources, and worked in their cities to find people who yearned for the Gospel and needed help. Jesus spent a great deal of time in prayer, but he made it clear that acts of worship were completed when his followers addressed the needs of the poor and oppressed. Because the activity in buildings is so limited, how can we be the church or community group in these days? I believe it is in finding opportunities for connection in service. Certainly there are projects your community can do in your location. Outside work or safely distanced inside jobs can provide that chance to be together and experience the joy of accomplishment. We also have ways for your group to connect. Some groups rent cabin or lodge spaces for safely spaced gatherings. Other groups have come to hike together or meet outdoors for an hour or more on an afternoon or evening. Several groups have found service projects they can do together in support of camp, but more importantly as opportunities to serve God. We have even had churches and other organizations contribute both the funds and the labor to meet a particular need. What do they all have in common? They leave refreshed and smiling. If we truly seek to experience God's love in Christ, not even this virus can stop us.

Brethren Press, a letter from Pastor Doug

Our congregation has been using materials from Brethren Press, the publishing house for the Church of the Brethren, for many years. Our bulletin covers, Lenten and Advent devotionals, and some Sunday School materials are a small portion of what we utilize from Brethren Press on a regular basis

Due to the ongoing pandemic, Brethren Press has been enduring ongoing financial difficulties. Recently, we received a letter from Wendy McFadden, head of Brethren Press. In it, she shared some of the following information:

The plain truth is that the pandemic has seriously hurt Brethren Press. Most of our resources are created for Brethren congregations meeting in person for worship and Sunday school. But ever since March, when congregations could no longer gather, sales have plummeted. Publishing for a small denomination is a financial challenge every year, but this year we are in dire straits. Back in the spring, we swung into action to help congregations deal with the pandemic. We made a number of resources available free online—to help everyone weather what at the time seemed like a temporary situation. Over the summer we have retooled the Shine children's curriculum to meet this new reality, creating a guide to help teachers use the materials online and a special resource for parents. We also created new products to boost income and made available many books that we would have brought to the Annual Conference bookstore. Despite our efforts, the numbers are sobering. At the end of August, our sales were down by almost \$150,000. That month we had to reduce our staff by two part-time employees. We can't continue this way for long. Without help, we might be looking at the end of Brethren Press.

At our October Board meeting, we approved a donation of \$500 from the 2018 and 2019 Fish Fry funds to help out Brethren Press. We do this as a small way to help out what has been an important resource for our congregation. If you would personally like to donate to Brethren Press, please be in touch with me and I can provide you information on how to do so.

In addition to this, another way that we can help support the ongoing work of Brethren Press is to choose them as a source for Christmas presents for our loved ones this year. Instead of immediately thinking of Amazon or Walmart for our Christmas presents, consider ordering items from Brethren Press. They have many wonderful books, lovely children's Bibles, and other items available. By ordering from Brethren Press, you will be supporting the ongoing work of our denomination's publishing and help to ensure its future.

Step Out: Seeking New Paths

2021 Workcamp Options



In light of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Workcamp Office has developed alternative workcamp options for summer 2021 workcamps. Our top priority is the health and safety of workcamp participants and the communities we serve, and we hope to offer workcamp options that reflect this priority while also providing a meaningful workcamp experience. We are grateful for those who participated in our informational survey; your feedback has been valuable as we continue planning for next summer! At this time, we would like to officially announce that we will be offering four different options for 2021 workcamps. This fall, we'd like to begin planning with individuals and groups who are interested in attending a workcamp next summer. If you are interested in participating in 2021 workcamps please be in

touch with us with your Tier preference by December 1, 2020. You can either fill out this preference survey and we will contact you or you can contact us directly by emailing cobworkcamps@brethren.org or calling 847-429-4337. This will allow us to best plan for your group but will not constitute your workcamp registration. 2021 Workcamp registration dates will be announced soon – stay tuned!

The four 2021 workcamp options, and their cost, are as follows:

Tier 1 – \$75: In this tier, participants will serve in their local communities during the day, either individually or with other members of their congregation. In the evening, participants will gather virtually for devotions and activities. Participants will be expected to bring their own lunch while serving. The Workcamp Office will work with individuals and congregations to coordinate service opportunities within their local context. The Workcamp team will also provide leadership during the virtual evening meetings.

Tier 2 – \$235: In this tier, participants will serve in their local area with other members of their congregation during the day. In the evening, they will gather together physically, in a socially-distant manner, for dinner, devotions, and activities. Participants will return home to sleep each night and be expected to bring their own lunch while serving. The Workcamp Office will work with the congregation to plan local service and will provide leadership and participate in-person during the week.

Tier 3 – \$285: In this tier, participants will serve locally with other congregations in their region during the day. In the evening, they will gather together physically, in a socially-distant manner, for dinner, devotions, and activities. Participants will return home to sleep each night and be expected to bring their own lunch while serving. The Workcamp Office will work with each congregation interested in participating to plan local service and will provide leadership and participate in-person during the week.

Tier 4 – \$350: In this tier, participants will participate in a "normal" workcamp. Workcamp participants from around the country will travel to a workcamp location, stay together in local housing accommodations (church or camp), and serve together for the week. The Workcamp Office will plan and lead all service work, meals, devotions, and recreational activities.

***Please note that Tier 4 workcamps are presented as an option pending the distribution of a safe vaccine in Spring 2021. We expect to make a decision about Tier 4 workcamps by February 15th, 2021.

Please note: Tier 1-3 workcamps will start on a Sunday evening and run through Friday evening. Tier 4 workcamps will begin Sunday evening and run through Saturday morning.

This year, all workcamps will be intergenerational and open to individuals who have completed 6th grade and older. As usual, adult advisors are required to attend with groups of youth and are expected to fully participate in all aspects of the workcamp. Advisors will register at the same time as their youth and pay the same registration fee.

The Workcamp Office asks that congregations send at least one adult advisor for every two to four youth participants, keeping gender in mind (i.e. if youth are all male, there should be at least one male advisor). All adults who attend a workcamp will be required to go through a background check administered by the denominational office.

Advisory Board meeting has been cancelled since April. We will be looking to reconvene when the Stay at Home order has been lifted. In the mean time, we have been communicating via email to see how we can best serve.

Global Prayer Update

Nigeria

There has been considerable unrest in Nigeria over the past week. It began Oct. 20 with the police shooting of civilians at an #EndSARS protest near Lagos, in the south of Nigeria. The movement using the hashtag #EndSARS is seeking to abolish a federal police unit called the Special Anti-Robbery Squad (SARS) that is accused of multiple abuses. "Amnesty International said it has recorded 82 cases of SARS abuses over the past three years, including beatings, hangings, mock executions, sexual assault, and waterboarding," reports the Washington Post.

This sparked more protests and looting around the country, and 24-hour curfews have been put in place in 20 states across Nigeria (including Plateau State – where Bethany student Sharon Flaten resides, and Adamawa State – the headquarters of Ekklesiyar Yan'uwa a Nigeria (EYN, the Church of the Brethren In Nigeria).

Reports from Rev. Yuguda Mdurvwa, director of EYN Disaster Relief Ministry, said warehouses across the country which contained COVID-19 relief supplies had been broken into, items taken, and buildings destroyed. While the rural areas have not experienced this looting and destruction, they remain targets of Boko Haram attacks and many locals are afraid to sleep in their villages at night. Flaten reported from Plateau State: "The first curfew was relaxed Friday morning but then people discovered several large warehouses that were full of palliatives that (we think) were meant to be distributed as aid months ago for COVID-19 relief. On Saturday thousands of people went to theses warehouses to take any/all food that they could carry. As a result, the governor reinstated the 24-hour curfew which we are still under now. And while it seems that many people are obeying the curfew, some still are not. As for me, I'm doing okay, I am just so thankful for this house, and this compound, and the people who live here. I was able to find some small food stuffs close to the compound here on Friday and one of my closest friends helped me on Saturday to get some supplies. Today we are waiting to hear what will happen next." Please pray for Nigeria and the members of EYN.

Letter from the District Executive

Yesterday I sat in our family room with a fire in the fireplace watching the leaves blow around the yard and the snowflakes settle on the deck chairs. It was warm and cozy but felt too early for snowflakes! Those of us from a certain generation can remember back to grade school days and those tiny little booklets of poetry that we had to memorize for inschool recitation. One of those strange ones from my past that often comes to mind on crispy fall days is from James Whitcomb Riley's "When the frost is on the punkin." The second verse came to mind proclaiming the beauty of a fall day: "They's something kindo' harty-like about the atmusfere When the heat of summer's over and the coolin' fall is here— Of course we miss the flowers, and the blossums on the trees.
