event organizers try to discourage repeat participation so that more kids can enjoy and learn from the day. Three local kids were able day. Three local kids were able to participate this year including Gage Knapp and John Trimmer, both of Mound City, and Braxton Magee of Skidmore, MO. The event committee also tries to reach out to groups of military members. Members invite groups from Offutt Air Force Base in Omaha, NE, and Fort Leavenworth. SS. Many. and Fort Leavenworth, KS. Many participants come from Big Brothers/Big Sisters as well, introduc ers/Big Sisters as well, introduc-ing the sport to those who might not have a chance otherwise. This year, the participant with the far-thest distance traveled was from St. Louis, MO.

After an introduction of the

five "education stations", a lunch donated by Quackers Bar and Grill of Mound City, and last, but most definitely not least, a guided evening duck hunt, the kids split up into groups of five to their ap-propriate places.

The first education station was a duck identification station. was a duck identification station. Mounted ducks helped the young hunters become familiar with dif-ferent species of duck character-istics. The second station was a duck calling/decoy/blind station where kids were able to put their new and noisy duck calls to the new and noisy duck calls to the test and learn about how to lure in and "hide" from a duck. The third and fourth stations both dealt third and fourth stations both dealt with shotgun handling, safety and shooting. Clay targets were seen shattering in all di-rections. According to Russ Shifflent, Re-

gional Supervisor, and one of about a dozen one of about a dozen game wardens help-ing with the event, the shotgun shooting sta-tions were very suc-cessful this year, mak-ing for a good hunt. The weather factored in to the success rate as well: "We had favorable weather - cold enough for us to see some ducks flying in, and warm enough so the kids were com-fortable," Jade Wright

Without the help of volunteers, the Big Muddy Duck Hunt wouldn't even be pos-sible. "The reason why this event is a success is because of volunteers who offer is because of volunteers who ofter up their hunting spot and blind," Russ Shifflett said. Around 2 p.m., safety coaches and hunting guides began showing up at the fireworks building. Many have been volunteering since the Big Muddy's existence. Each kid was paired with one safety coach and one guide to help them in the blind. Many of the kids' parents were able to go on the hunt as well to observe. This year the group harvested 18 ducks in some of the best private duck clubs in this area. best private duck clubs in the area.
