Unwrapping the Gift of Immanuel

With Pastor Eric If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. ¹⁶But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses...¹⁹Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. ²⁰For where two or three are gathered in my name, <u>I am there among them</u>." Matthew 18:15-20

Jesus declared that <u>where two or three are</u> <u>gathered together in his name. He would be right</u> <u>there among them</u>. He made this declaration in the context of a difficult situation. The question came up about what a disciple should do when someone in the community sins against them. Well, Jesus responds first and foremost by getting the two parties together to work it out. And if that does not work, then bring an impartial witness to verify and help with the listening process. He wants us to keep at it and leave "no stone un-turned!" Take a friend, take a "timeout"... whatever you need to help reconcile with your brother, sister, parent, child, friend.

I have experienced many a stressful holiday when the best and worst of family dynamics has shown forth...sometimes for the entire world to see and hear. I find it challenging to provide an environment where people can truly share their feelings, ideas and anxieties without wariness and fear of judgement. After all...we love our neighbors and friends and we hesitate to share our innermost thoughts and opinions because we do not want to hurt them, or hurt ourselves.

Over these months of fall, our leadership has tried to promote "mutual conversation and consolation" about faith and life. We hope that families have had opportunities for sacred conversations in an atmosphere of forgiveness, truth and love. We have begun forums in community fashion which touch upon issues of a personal and corporate nature. When the difficult decisions need to happen, we want to be ready to listen and appreciate what we hear in an atmosphere of respect and safety.

I would like to share with you again some aspects of what a safe environment for conversation looks like, in both the home and at church:

What is needed for an environment of safe conversation?

- Fundamental respect for other people as redeemed children of God despite differing convictions
- 2. Explicit rejection of verbal condemnation or dismissal because of differing convictions

How do we disagree well within a safe environment?

- 1. <u>Being fair</u>. Can you state the position of the person whom you disagree with accurately enough that the other person recognizes your statement as their own?
- Being realistic about my position. Can you acknowledge where your position is most vulnerable and where a contrasting position makes valid points?
- Being honestly humble. Can I think through my position, express it with true conviction, AND acknowledge that as a fallen and flawed human being I may be wrong.

I have the most difficult time with "honest humility." Is it more important that I be "right" or that I be in "relationship"? God demonstrates that relationship trumps being right which is why Jesus came to live among us – as one of us! Let our Christmas gift to one another be a safe environment to share truth in love and listen with compassion both at home and church.

Let us pray. Gracious God, open our hearts and our minds to your grace and open our ears to listen and our mouths to speak truth in love and our arms to shake hands and give hugs, so that we might embody the forgiveness and love which you give to us in Jesus the Christ. Amen.



The Power of Faith by Chris and Terry Norton:

In October 2010, Chris Norton was a football player at Luther College in Decorah, IA. In a freak injury, Chris, only 18 at the time, became paralyzed and was only given a 3% chance of moving anything below his neck.

Chris and his father, in alternating chapters, describe life over the few years, from the perspectives of the person with the injury, and the principal caregiver.

Although Chris uses a wheelchair most of the time, he has accomplished much more than anyone predicted. He and his wife are now motivational speakers, describing how faith, support from family and community, a positive attitude and incredibly hard work made a difference.

Interesting for our congregation is the fact that Brad Lewis knew Chris when he (Chris) was a Bondurant High School football player. The book is in the "Biography" section of the library.



Jeriann shared the following statistics with us – In the last year, over 3,240 families were served by the pantry. We gave out school supplies for 185 children. With donated money periodically received, Jeriann was able to pay rent for 7 families, utilities for 5 families, provided gas and misc. other help to 24 families. The Clothes Pantry is a very necessary and valued resource for our community.

This December, we'll reflect on Luke 2:9-14 with meditations from Karen Craigo, Violet Little, Denise Rector and Prairie Rose Seminole based on "Joy to the World".

We hear the story every year: Joseph and Mary set out for Bethlehem. Unable to find shelter, Mary gives birth and lays the baby Jesus in a manger. Angels proclaim the event to the shepherds in the fields, who "make haste" to meet Mary's

newborn child. Herod sends the magi out to find the baby Jesus. The magi are led by a star to the place where the baby lies, and the sight overwhelms them. They are brought to their knees with joy.

Hurricane Relief The situation:

The world has been experiencing one of the highest concentration of major hurricanes in recent times. There have been at least sixteen named storms, five of which have impacted the U.S. mainland and/or territories, leaving widespread damage across Texas, Florida, Georgia Louisiana, Mississippi, Puerto Rico, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Haiti, Cuba, the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Our response:

HURRICANE HARVEY

In the midst of a strong local response by individuals and congregations, the groundwork has been laid for the extended long-term recovery work of disaster case management, emotional and spiritual care, volunteer coordination and construction management. Lutheran Disaster Response is working with two of the Texas Synods across the impacted areas of Texas. We anticipate working in the Dickinson and Rockport areas in partnership with Upbring (Lutheran Social Services of the South). With the support of Lutheran Disaster Response, a coordinator will be working to help facilitate volunteers and material donations in the region.

HURRICANE IRMA AND MARIA

Lutheran Disaster Response is working with the Florida-Bahamas Synod, the Caribbean Synod, and other International companions and partners to provide relief to the most vulnerable in the U.S. and around the world.

- In Florida, the initial response, in addition to local efforts at clean-up and providing temporary shelter, has focused on crisis counseling to thousands in 20 Florida counties. This work is being done through our affiliate, Lutheran Services of Florida. Early support has been extended to care providers so that they can be assured their families are in a stable living situation, and area able to turn their attention to the care of the most vulnerable in the community.
- In Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, we're coordinating the delivery of critical items including dry food, generators, and solar-powered phones.
- In Haiti, we're supporting woman-headed households and farmers who were affected by the hurricanes.
- In Cuba, we're supporting the distribution of items like cookware, dishes, and blankets to help families get back to normal life.

TROPICAL STORM NATE

Through our companion church, Iglesia Luterana Costarricense (ILCO), we are planning an immediate response by providing food, access to clean water and other services. We will focus our efforts on indigenous communities along the central and southern parts of Costa Rica's Pacific Coast.
