Well, here I am President of the DCCW! I still don't know how that happened?! This is my first AWARE article in that capacity and what does one write about? I know I am a little off the wall sometimes, but I decided to write about the upcoming presidential election.

I know there are many of you reading this that have strong feelings, one way or another about the candidates. Many of you are excited about the possibility of a woman being elected as president as we should all be. What is important is to be well informed, do

your research and vote with a well-developed conscience. I saw a quote from Pope Francis where he called both major US presidential candidates "against life" and he advised Catholic voters to choose the "lesser evil" when casting their ballots in the November election.

"Both are against life, be it one who kicks out migrants, or be it the one who kills babies," the Pope said in rare political comments at a Friday news conference with BBC news, Washington.

Pope Francis did not refer to either Harris or Trump by name. He went on to say, "Not voting is ugly. It is not good. You must Vote. You must choose the lesser evil. Who is the lesser evil? That lady or that gentleman? I don't know. Everyone, in their conscience, should think and do this."

In accord with the Pope's remarks the bishops of the USCCB Level remind us as we approach elections this year that we are called to witness to the Faithful citizenship as we participate in the public square through political engagement and civil dialogue. To that end they publish *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship and several accompanying articles and videos.*


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MDR AWARE - FALL 2024

2025 Affiliate of the Year Award

The Affiliate of the Year Award Nomination information and form will be sent out to affiliated parish presidents in January of 2025. If you are an affiliated parish and meet the award criteria listed below, please consider nominating your parish for this award. The nomination packet will be posted on the DCCW website. FYI: NCCW will be consulted on February 1st as to the status of the SLC DCCW affiliation report.

AWARD CRITERIA

Nomination should *reflect* the following criteria:

- An affiliate must be a DCCW/NCCW affiliate in good standing, actively involved in affiliate work
- An affiliate who has made a significant contribution on the diocesan, deanery, or local parish level.
- An Affiliate who has served as an outstanding role model of service to others.
- An affiliate who has shown exemplary leadership and made significant contributions to the mission, vision, and programs of DCCW.
- An affiliate who reflects the Gospel values of justice and peace.
- An affiliate who supports the gifts of a multi-cultural church and who enables others to share their gifts in their affiliate work.
- An affiliate who serves as a model of collaboration with others in the diocese and parish.
- Nominations may be updated and re-submitted in subsequent years if the affiliate has not been chosen as the winning Affiliate of the Year for two years.
- Second & third place may reapply.
- If you have been chosen the winner, after two years, your affiliate may re-apply within the new time frame with new accomplishments, such as, increased membership, developed new programs, new community involvement, etc.

Nominations will be accepted February 1, 2025, through March 1, 2025, by E-Mail only to <u>Patricia.nccw@gmail.com</u>. A "blind" review process will be used with each nomination package being assigned a number before I send the packets to the DCCW Past Presidents who will select the 2025 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place recipients. The top 3 finalists will be contacted prior to the DCCW convention, and the winner will be announced at the convention.

DCCW LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION

Many issues continue to be of concern for citizens. Political polarization is distressing.

The core concept we need to remember as Catholics is how we decide to vote for political candidates. We need to be concerned about the lack of respect for each other and the lack of civil discourse. Pope Francis, in The Times on Sept. 13, 2024, described the U.S. presidential election as a choice between the two "evils" insisting both candidates are "against life". This is in reference to Donald Trump's antiimmigration stance and Kamala Harris's abortion policy. Pope Francis also weighed in on the 2016 election, saying, "migration was a right described in scripture and anyone who did not follow the biblical call to welcome the stranger was committing a grave sin". The Pope was very vocal about his term of 'killing a human being" when it came to abortion. The current Trump policy plan is to have mass deportations by using the military, however the U.S. military is likely to resist this plan according to a legal analyst Joseph Nunn saying it would undercut other priorities and damage morale.

The recent presidential debate talk about immigrants eating cats and dogs has caused an uproar not only in the small town of Springfield, Ohio, but around the nation.

Vice President Kamala Harris has brought attention to the increased number of both infant and postpartum mortality rates since the overturn of Roe v. Wade by Supreme Court Justices. The confusion of various states abortion status has been an issue for doctors and nurses in the hospital setting in Labor & Delivery, Emergency Rooms and clinic exam rooms as they are trying to save the lives of mothers and infants. There are many who feel that religion should not interfere with politics and that the government should not dictate or monitor personal decisions a woman may have about her healthcare decisions with her doctor.

As a Catholic it is important to vote your own conscience and respect other's opinion if it does not agree with your own. It is extremely important to vote to have your voice heard and trust the election process as election workers are doing their best during a presidential election year.

Please do your research before voting for candidates and Amendments on the ballot. In order make an informed decision, and for the Catholic perspective, you can download <u>Forming Consciences for Faith-ful Citizenship - PDF | USCCB</u> from this link.

The recent Women's State Legislative Council of Utah meeting on Capitol Hill, Sept. 25, 2024, had several guest speakers, covering topics such as: new upcoming legislative Squatter bills next year; domestic violence; building trust and mutual respect among Tribal leaders; the new law which went into effect this summer about public schools having a safety plan with a volunteer or guard who carries a gun with limited liability and a Good Samaritan protection as in self-defense cases; less funding for available child care and how expensive it is. There is also a concern regarding the low wages these child caretakers are earning and how background checks are not currently required for all childcare centers.

Let us not forget to pray about various states' decisions regarding the death penalty. May this presidential election have a peaceful transfer of power without any violence at our nation's capital.

Let us continue to pray for our elected officials in Utah as well as across America to make just and moral decisions for their constituents. May we continue to pray for peace around the world and for those most

St Maria Goretti was assaulted and raped at the age of 12; she forgives her attacker rather than carry hatred of him as she died. St Jose Sanchez Del Rio was persecuted for refusing to deny his faith and ultimately was tortured and executed at the age of 13 by the Mexican government" said Michel Edwards, director of the diocesan Office of Youth and Young Adult Minisry.
