burg and pass right on through the 34607 zip code. That's fine with most of us who live in the area. The Hernando Beach residents continue our daily or weekly trips to the grocery store, to buy gas for our vehicles, or venture out for other reasons – and can do so without being stuck in long traffic lines (with the exception of when road work is going on). Whichever direction we drive - through Weeki Wachee to Hwy 50 or via the more common route of Shoal Line and Osowaw to reach U.S. 19, I am always in awe of the beauty; Shoal Line is such a beautiful road due to its natural and lack of commercialism on each side of our community.



A few weekends ago, my husband and I volunteered to donate a couple of hours in a trash-pickup effort along the southern end of Shoal Line that was organized by residents who live in the south section. This was my first time to participate in such an effort and found it to be quite an interesting adventure.

Picking up other people's trash is certainly not something that I would choose to do on a regular basis, but on this crisp weekend morning, it seemed like a neighborly thing to do. There were about eight participants and I think we ended up with about that many garbage bags of trash. It was a good feeling to contribute to making the road look nicer.

And then, there's Osowaw – a continuation of naturalness

and beauty. However, as I make my way to U.S. 19, I continue to notice trash on both sides of that stretch of road. I have even seen full garbage bags that have been dumped or have fallen out of the back of a truck, probably as the driver made his way to the nearby Hernando County Waste Management Facility. I don't even know who is responsible to keep that area cleaned up, but it sure wouldn't hurt for some Hernando Beach volunteers to give a couple of hours toward a clean-up drive.

As we start our New Year of 2021, let's beautify the roads leading to Hernando Beach! I propose a schedule be presented to the HBPOA Board, comprising a once-a month clean-up drive in which volunteers are encouraged to give two hours. If there are 20 volunteers each month, a potential of 240 people will donate 480 hours over the course of the year. Those wanting to participate, but unable to walk and bend over, can participate by providing a poke stick (broom handle with a long nail hammered into one end), heavy black garbage bags, and some bottled water for the convenience of those who show up to walk a stretch of road to collect trash. Each trash collector can provide his/her own gloves. Maybe we could even round up some brightly colored vests or T-shirts for participants to wear.

Still not convinced? I am overweight, allergic to the sun, old enough to be on Medicare, and hate to get my hands dirty. But, I will sign up and give two hours (and maybe even more) in 2021. Why? Because I love Hernando Beach and see this effort as one that will make all of us appreciate where we live even more! Won't you grab a friend and help turn this into a fun activity?





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### COMMITTEE SIGNUP

We are looking for volunteers for 2021 on the following committees. If you would like to volunteer some time to help our association and community, please note on your renewal application which committee(s) you would like to help with so that someone can contact you, or email us at [hbpoa34607@gmail.com](mailto:hbpoa34607@gmail.com), or call 352-606-3720.

**Landscape Committee** - We need a chairman to help with budgeting repair expenses, maintenance, insurance claims, and projection of future improvements. This person will report to the Board and oversee landscape projects. Volunteers will help maintain the entranceway gardens at the Dolphin statue on Commercial Way and Osowaw Boulevard, and the Triangle Butterfly Park at Shoal Line Blvd. The chair will make recommendations to the Board and coordinate fund raising projects within the community to benefit the landscape costs. The HBPOA pays water and electricity at both locations which is nearly \$2,400 before any landscape improvements or maintenance costs.

**Governmental Affairs Committee (GAC)** - Volunteers for this committee will be vetted by the Board and the chair chosen by the Board. The purpose of this committee is to keep abreast of County, State or Federal activities which may affect the membership interests or the Hernando Beach Community and to advise the President, the Board and the membership on actions that they recommend be taken to influence these governmental entities to best represent the interests of Hernando Beach property owners and community.

**Bylaws Committee (Ad Hoc)** - We need volunteers who have background in parliamentary law, bylaws, and Florida state statutes. Names of volunteers will be put before the membership at a regularly scheduled meeting for membership vote and approval. We need three people at a minimum. The ad-hoc bylaws committee will draft new bylaws and submit to the Board to put before the membership at two regularly scheduled meetings for a vote by membership. Once the committee is chosen, members have the opportunity to submit suggested changes to the bylaws committee.

**Hospitality Committee** - Assist with sign in of members at membership meetings; welcome new and old property

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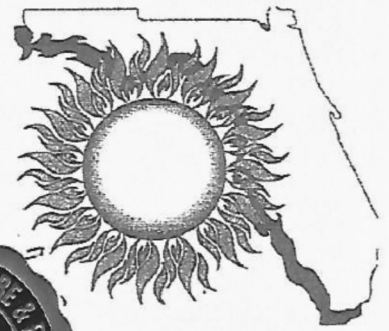
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owners and visitors to HBPOA meetings and introduce them to others; coordinate the annual Christmas/Holiday party or other social events as requested or approved by the Board; assist with 50/50 ticket sales; assist with new memberships, and collect applications and fees at membership meetings.

**Environmental Committee (Ad Hoc)** - This committee will keep abreast of environmental issues in our community that may have a direct impact on our properties and work as needed with the GAC Committee on issues that need to be brought to government officials' attention. Organize 'adopt a road' or 'adopt a canal' clean up efforts to help keep our community free of trash and debris.

**Christmas Holiday Lights Committee (Ad Hoc)** - We need volunteers who are able to assist with Christmas Holiday decorations in our community, including working with Withlacoochee employees for installation and removal of lights along Shoal Line Blvd., Triangle Park, and the Dolphin Statue; assist with repairs to wiring, bulbs, as needed; keep inventory of decorations to include condition of lights for repairs and replacement.

**Events/Fundraisers/Calendar/Photo Contest** - These are not really committees but areas where you can help as needed throughout the year. If you have special talent at coordinating events you may want to assist Hospitality with the holiday dinner. If you have great graphic skills you may want to assist with the HBPOA Calendar. If you have great ideas for fundraising, you may want to help coordinate some ways we can raise money for landscaping, charity,

and other events throughout the year. If you have an eye for great photography, you may want to help coordinate the annual members photo contest or help us find great photos for the annual calendar. These are great ways to volunteer some time on a limited basis to help you meet other members and stay involved in our community. There's no better way to meet your neighbors than to be involved with them.

**ZOOM/IT** - We are in need of a few experienced volunteers with Zoom experience to run our electronic portion of the membership meetings. This would usually be 50 people or fewer, require providing electronic links that would be emailed to membership, providing the ability for Zoomers to participate by speaking when recognized, provide verbal voting opportunities on minor issues, providing links to electronic voting on major issues, and assisting with setup of the microphones, sound equipment, and projectors as needed for the Board, guest speakers, and members,

balloons to give our yard a festive touch. I also thank our immediate neighbors on Gulfstream who helped me add some decorative and pragmatic touches and who joined us in the yard to enjoy the parade!

Harry is the only remaining member of his immediate family, having been the baby of seven boys who grew up together in Los Angeles during the depression. His parents literally came over on a ship from Turkey to the Promised Land called America, coming through Ellis Island with all the other immigrants of the time. His dad did whatever he could to support his family during those unimaginably difficult times while his mom tried her best to feed and clothe and keep those boys under control (an impossible task). Harry has so many wonderful stories to tell of growing up during that time and some of the adventures he and his best friend, Sam, enjoyed, some of which could curl the hairs on the top of one's head! One of my favorites was of the time when Harry, a little ragamuffin, entered a talent contest at the local movie theatre and took first place singing, "Sweet Jenny Lee." The prize was a huge slab of bacon which he could hardly wait to take home to Momma who nearly had a heart attack when he brought bacon into a strict Sephardic Jewish household! He ended up selling it to a local restaurant for fifty cents!

Somehow all the boys were raised and five of the seven went off to serve in WWII, Harry included (Coast Guard radio operator). His brother, Sam, was killed on the island of Corregidor when the Japanese first invaded Fort Mills and

is buried at a huge military cemetery in the Phillipines. All the others managed to survive, thank God! Most of his brothers became successful florists while Harry chose the profession of dental technician, making caps and crowns and dentures.

Harry spent nearly all his life in the greater Los Angeles area, married his first wife, Annabelle, and with her raised their two children, Denise and Rick. Annie died of breast cancer unfortunately way too young and, of course, is missed to this day by her loved ones.

I was blessed to get to know Harry through our mutual love of square dancing and, shall we say, that one tip led to another and one dance to another so that we ended up dancing our way through now 30 plus years of marriage. We have had a rich, full life, living in California, Arizona, California, and now Florida! We have traveled and cruised and enjoyed so many wonderful adventures together! He is truly my best friend and has blessed my life and the lives of my four children and six grandchildren. As my ten year recently affirmed, "Grandpa, you are the best grandpa ever!"

Thank you, good people of Hernando Beach, for helping to make this very special birthday, Harry's 99<sup>th</sup>, way more special than it might have been, given the restrictions of the Pandemic! Now we are looking forward to having a real live party next year when, God willing, Harry turns a ripe old age of 100!

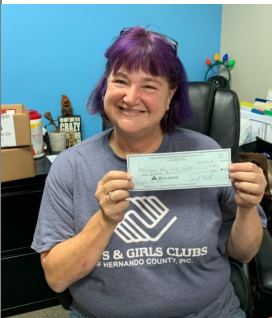

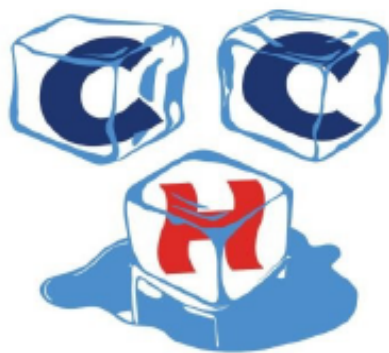
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## HOSPITAL HOLE

### Location:

Hospital Hole (aka Fish Hospital) is in a sharp bend of the Weeki Wachee River 1,000 feet upstream from State Hwy 595 bridge.

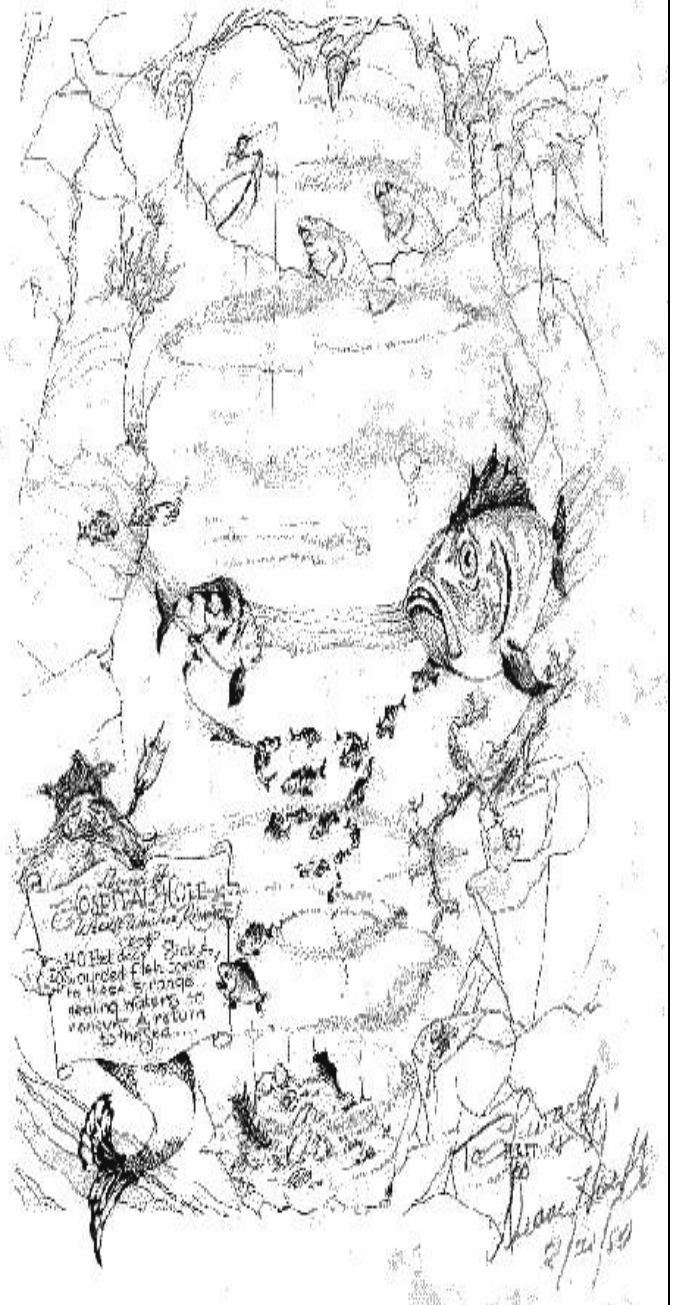
### Description:

For some unknown reason, this is one of my favorite dive sites. The hole itself is in the third bend south of Roger's Park on the Weeki Wachee River. The name comes from local legend where it is told that injured fish come to this site to be healed before returning to the sea. Access is restricted from land due to private homes, but one can easily canoe or even walk upriver from the park to the dive site. Roger's Park is open year round with a boat dock and launch ramp, but there is a \$2 park fee ( per vehicle) during daylight hours in the summer. The main hole is about 150 ft in diameter and reaches a depth of 135-140 feet. There are several solution tubes in the overhangs along the south and southwest wall. One of the tubes goes to the surface, but the others, while large enough for a diver to enter, are blocked at the top (around 20 ft). Water from the spring flowed through these tubes long ago before the ceiling of the cavern collapsed (now the main sink). There are a few flowing springs coming from the wall around 70 feet, just above the hydrogen sulfide layer. Between 70 and 80 feet there is a thick cloud like layer of hydrogen sulfide that blocks most light below it. Below the layer, whose depth fluctuates with the tide, visibility is usually very good. There is a small john boat on the bottom around 135 feet. There is not much of interest away from the boat until you get to the walls. Graffiti from divers over the past decade written into the walls adds to the fun of the dive. The shape of the sink itself is like a small boat with no passage or major overhangs observed yet. The ceiling gently slopes upward towards the opening. This site is great for any open water diver, although only those who are cavern certified should attempt to go below the cloud layer, even during daylight hours, as the low light, foul smell, and high silt can be challenging to those without depth experience.

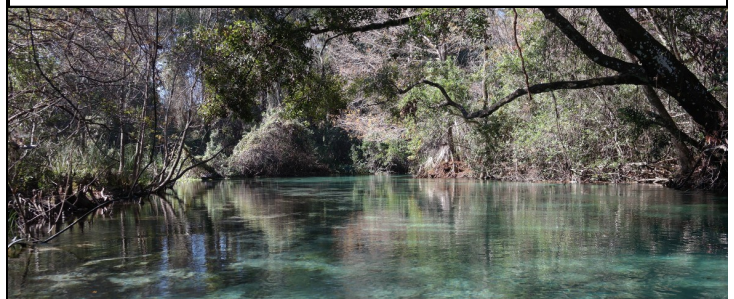
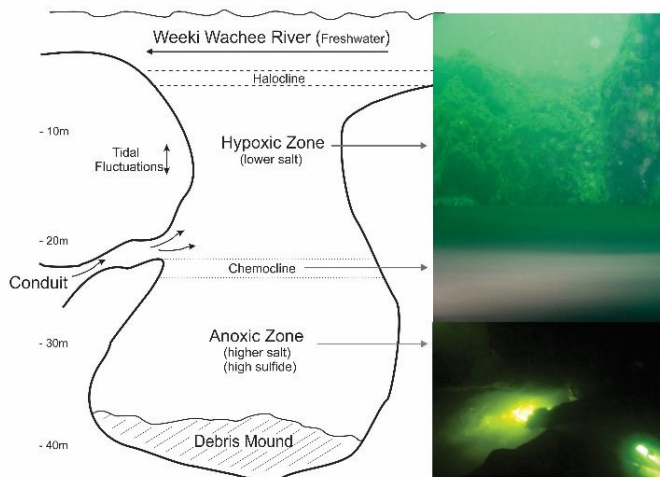
