



Simmel cake cupcakes

about 450g/1lb marzipan
275g/9¾oz caster sugar
150ml/5fl oz sunflower oil
50g/1¾oz honey
1 tsp vanilla extract
75g/2½oz full-fat cream cheese
4 medium free-range eggs
150g/5½oz currants and 75g/2½oz raisins
200g/7oz plain flour
2 tsp baking powder
2 tsp mixed spice
icing sugar, for rolling and edible gold balls, to decorate

Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4 and put 12 paper muffin cases in a muffin tray

Roll the marzipan out to about 3mm/¼in thick, cut two sets of discs, 12 of each: one measuring about 5cm/2in in diameter and the other about 6cm/2½in. Stack these on a plate while you make the cake mixture.

In a bowl beat the sugar, oil, honey, vanilla and cream cheese until smooth, then beat in the eggs until mixed. Stir in the currants and raisins, then sift in the flour, baking powder and mixed spice and stir well.

Spoon about 1-2cm/½-¾in of cake mixture into each muffin case, lay one of the small marzipan disks on it and press it down gently to remove any air pockets, then spoon more of the mixture on top until ¾ full.

Bake for about 25-30 minutes, or until a skewer poked in comes out almost clean.

Take out of the oven and place a disc of marzipan on each, very gently press it down; the heat from the cupcake will soften the marzipan and seal it on. Then press eleven gold balls around the edge of the marzipan on each cake and

WILD ENTERTAINMENT

Dec / January

A Tree Creeper and a pair of Goldcrests were among our usual daily bird regulars, they have been visitors before but seem now to be here to stay.

On nice sunny days our bird bath was a mass of wings showing like transparent lace in the sun, I even watched a Jenny Wren bathing in a flower pot tray full of rain water, I had never seen a Wren in the water before.

Jan 31st R S P B bird count day, very low count on previous years but I think because it was mild that day they were not too bothered about the food station and were doing some hunting themselves

Feb 18th A pair of Siskins arrived along with several Greenfinches and 9 Goldfinches.

During February a flock of 50- 60 Linnets and Chaffinches have been in the field just over our garden hedge feeding on a patch of weeded ground and are frequently in the oak tree of the outback garden.

Three Jenny Wrens have amazed us by roosting every night in a channel of metal in our garage roof, sheltered they may be, and huddled together tightly as they do so I guess they manage to keep warm and dry, but it doesn't look very cosy!

End of February and comes ' the freeze ', hungry birds everywhere, I could certainly not keep up with a bird count at the moment.



I, like many others, have flowers in bloom too early and they are going to catch a cold! I even have tulips in bloom in the open garden.
