## **Letter from President-Elect Joe Ratliffe**

To the Tiger Inn Family,

We have had a very busy couple of months here at TI. From Bicker and Discussions to elections, it has been an action-packed and exciting time to be a member. We had a total of 218 sophomores Bicker the club, and through the Discussions process we arrowed it down to an incredible new group of 43 women and 41 men.

For the first time in the 21st century, Tiger Inn has admitted two US military veterans. Kenneth Oku served in the Iraq war after graduating high school in 2003. After years of service he began his college education at a community college in Silicon Valley, receiving an award in computer science and transferring to Princeton after deciding it was his best option between his acceptances to Princ-

eton, MIT, and Stanford.
Brendan O'Hara (pictured right) served in the US Navy.
Along with an outstanding service record, he also won an Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal for humanitarian efforts and community service projects while de-



ployed and living in Spain from 2014 to 2017. At Princeton, he walked onto the wrestling team as a freshman and helped to establish Princeton's Veteran Organization. Student Veterans of America nominated him for Student Veteran of the Year in 2018

Many of our new members are incredibly athletic. Marcus Jonas stroked the Men's Lightweight Rowing Team's first varsity boat as a freshman, beating the 27-year-old course record on Lake Carnegie in a duel race against Cornell. With coxswain and new member Sydney Edwards steering the boat, they smashed the record with a time of 5:35.0 over 2km. Marcus is also building a satellite with a group of 15 undergraduates, PhD students, and professors as he pursues a concentration in Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering with a certificate in Computer Science.

Upper class achievements include our outgoing vice-president PJ Greenbaum, who was named a Schwarzman Scholar and will be commissioning as an Ensign in the US Navy on June 4th. PJ was selected to join the Navy Nuclear Propulsion Program (surface warfare option). Following graduation, PJ will pursue a master's degree at Tsinghua University in Beijing, China through the Schwarzman scholars program. After his year in China, PJ will head to the surface fleet for his 2.5-year division officer tour on board a destroyer in either Japan or Spain before attending Nuclear Power School in Charleston, South Carolina. PJ will then serve on board aircraft carriers, managing nuclear propulsion plants.

Rachel Linfield'19 (pictured below) was recently awarded the Gates Cambridge Scholarship and will join a cohort of international students pursuing post-graduate degrees at the University of Cambridge. She will pursue a Masters in Philosophy



in Health, Medicine, and Society, with a specific focus on the global history of women's mental health. She plans to attend medical school and specialize in psychiatry upon completion of the Gates Scholarship.

Hugo Myron '20 and Micaela Keller '20 were recently named Scholars in the Nation's Service (SINSI) for 2019 in the Woodrow Wilson School. The SINSI program helps a select group of students identify a job in the federal government and funds a summer internship. Hugo has been selected as the Tom A. and Andrea E. Bernstein '80 scholar, and is slated to work at the Department of Education in the Office of Civil Right. Micaela will also be working in the Department of Education in Elementary and Secondary school initiatives.

## Letter from Hap Cooper, Graduate Board President

Dear Fellow Tiger Inn Alumni —

After 125 years of all-male leadership, Tiger Inn's THIRD woman President is about to turn over the reins, and the club has never been in a better place. All our thanks go to outgoing officers Maggie McCallister, PJ Greenbaum, Charlotte Valentine, Michael Swart, Caleb Owens, and Ellie Sawyer.

As our President-Elect, Joe Ratliffe, mentioned in his letter of introduction, Bicker was tremendously successful. TI hosted 214 bickerees—the most in our history. The bicker process was further altered to make the experience as fair and enjoyable for all as possible.

We also continued to evolve our officer election process to ensure that elections are more transparent, less impulsive and that only the most committed and responsible candidates are considered.

Given that there were no police incidents, hospitalizations or major disciplinary actions, our undergraduate officers were able to stop playing defense and focus their energy and attention on making positive change in the community. Here are a few examples:

- TI led the charge on CPR certification for all of Prospect Street. Now all officers are CPR certified (funded by GICC).
- TI also helped lead the charge on getting the whole Street to sign on to the Street-Wide SHARE policy that details how to respond to incidents of sexual assault or harassment. Now all clubs are on the same page and are focused on creating a zero-tolerance policy.
- The Tiger Inn safety patrol has been so well received that two other clubs have implemented it this past year.
- Undergraduates planned and conducted a Fall Festival for the children in the community.

After a false start or two, our next Capital Campaign is finally carved in stone. We will be firming up our leadership committee and soliciting volunteers/class representatives between now and the beginning of school in the fall. In September, we'll launch an 18-month campaign to raise \$2 million dollars for two specific purposes:

- 1. Membership Financial Aid Fund: the club has long valued it's diversity and has been making strides to become even more representative of the undergraduate population. When the Bicker process identifies a good fit, we want to ensure that he or she will be able to sign-in and stay in until graduation—no matter what the individual's financial circumstances happen to be. Most candidates only need a little help to get them over the hump, and we want to be in a position to make that possible.
- 2. The Tiger Inn Restoration Fund: By the time we wrap up this campaign, our "new" addition and renovations will be a decade old! To keep our undergraduate fees competitive, we need to establish an endowment that will cover the annual maintenance cost that typically exceeds \$50,000 a year.

For now, we'd greatly appreciate you sending in the attached contribution form along with a check. Please don't throw this on the pile; you're way too busy to put one more thing in the queue. Just send a check now and then write "Send a much-welcomed check to Tiger Inn" on your TO-DO list and put a big fat √ in front of it. (It will feel really good:)
