Public Health Career Marketing In 9th Grade

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Executive Summary

Would it not be great if all high school students were aware of public health and the careers available in Kentucky public health agencies? Our Kentucky Public Health Leadership Institute Change Master Group thought this would be great and we chose to address the issue of public health career awareness in ninth grade students in two counties of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. We are hopeful that this project will only be a beginning to the push for public health career awareness.

Statistics prove that many public health employees are leaving the workforce and there are few adequately trained replacements; thus there is a shortage in public health workers. The goal of this project is to increase the awareness by development of a multi-media CD to spark interest in public health in students across Kentucky.

A public health informational survey was conducted with ten percent of the ninth grade population in Marshall and Bath counties in Kentucky participating. The results of this survey reflected inappropriate public health career awareness and this prompted the creation of this project's interactive multi-media CD that could be utilized throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Collaboration between public health, Murray State University Technology Department, Marshall and Bath County School Systems and Area Health Education Centers (AHEC) occurred through the development of this CD. This coordination of agencies created a mutual understanding of the necessity for increased public health career opportunity awareness.

The availability of this educational tool should peak interest in the target age group. The long - term goal of this educational endeavor is to guide students into public health careers ensuring the future of the public health workforce. This goal directly relates to the assurance of a competent health care workforce, which is the # 8 essential public health function.

Our innovative approach used the development of mixed media educational tools in providing an effective method of reaching the age group selected, which is related to #10 essential public health function. Our choice of this educational tool was deemed appropriate to this age group due to availability of computers in the majority of school settings and this method peaking their interest.

This educational tool was not only a project sponsored by health departments/Kentucky Public Health Leadership Institute, but included collaboration with other community agencies, which not only addressed public health careers, but included health education topics, which can be used to inform, educate and empower individuals relating to the # 3 essential public health function.

It is the hope of this change master project group that a similar endeavor will be continued to further the development of the educational tool and to measure the impact of this project.

Introduction

This project was done to encourage ninth graders to pursue an education in public health to ensure a vigorous well-educated work force. Our project included the production of a CD to promote public health interest in this age group.

It is hoped that this project will promote public health career awareness to ninth grade students in two counties of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Many public health employees are leaving with few adequately trained replacements. Therefore, it has become apparent there is a shortage in public health workers. We feel that this is due to a lack of knowledge in public health career opportunities, difficulty of recruitment and the aging public health work force,

We conducted a public health career informational survey of ninth graders in Marshall and Bath counties in Kentucky. This survey resulted in information that supported the lack of knowledge in public health career opportunities. A multi-media interactive CD was created to heighten interest in the availability of public health careers to these students.

Project Description

The goal of this project is to develop a multi-media CD to spark interest in this age group and increase the number of students majoring in public health careers, therefore ensuring the future of the public health workforce. The goal of this project builds on a previous change master project that promoted public health awareness.

Objectives & Methods

A public health informational survey was conducted with ten percent of the ninth grade population in Marshall and Bath counties in Kentucky. This project sampling was representative of our ninth grade student body and thought to reflect the knowledge base of this age group. The results of this survey reflected an inappropriate public health career awareness of the students in these counties. It is therefore our assumption that ninth graders are unaware of the availability of public health career opportunities. This information prompted the creation of this project's interactive multi-media CD that could be utilized throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Through development of this CD, collaboration occurred among public health, Murray State University Technology Department, Marshall and Bath County School Systems and Area Health Education Centers (AHEC). This coordination of agencies created a mutual understanding of the necessity for increased public health career opportunity awareness.

Of the ten essential public health services the following two represent the methodology of this project:

Number 8 - Assure a competent public health care workforce.

Number 10 – Research for new insights and innovative solutions to health problems.

We recognized a need for more educated school-age youth in the variety of fields that public health offers. Our hypothesis was confirmed by a survey completed by this age group. The availability of this educational tool should peak interest in the target age group. The long-term goal of this educational endeavor is to guide students into public health careers ensuring the future of the public health workforce. This goal directly relates to the assurance of a competent health care workforce, which is #8 essential public health function.

Our innovative approach used the development of mixed media educational tools in providing an effective method of reaching the age group selected, which is related to #10 essential public health function. Our choice of this educational tool was deemed appropriate to this age group due to availability of computers in the majority of school settings and we felt this method would peak their interest more than pamphlets, brochures, posters, etc. This method can be effective in group/individual settings.

The change master project group explored the possibility of a video, but felt that the ability to interact was paramount.

This educational tool was not only a project sponsored by health departments/Kentucky Public Health Leadership Institute, but included collaboration with other community agencies, (Murray State University, AHEC, School Systems & others), which not only addressed public health careers, but included health education topics, which can be used to inform, educate and empower individuals directly relating to #3 essential public health function.

Number #3 Inform, educate, and empower people about health issues.

Area Health Education Centers (AHEC) sponsored the initial production of the CDs and with the generosity of the students of Murray State; this project reached the point of readiness. Marshall County and Gateway District Health Departments have the capability of producing the CD to distribute to each health department throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The health department employee time and equipment use was an in kind contribution to this change master project.

Results-outcome

The survey results confirmed our hypothesis that 70.5% of 9th grade students were unaware of public health career opportunities. The change master project has been successful in completing the multi-media CD, however due to time constraints, we have not had the opportunity to measure its impact.

Conclusion

The survey used in this change master project appeared to be non-threatening and well received by the students selected. We feel that the data received from the surveys was credible and reliable. Our project development of a multi-media CD seemed to be a good

avenue to reach this age group. The community collaboration proved to be a substantial addition to the project as overall awareness of public health between these agencies improved.

It is the hope of this change master project group that a similar endeavor will be continued.

Leadership Development Opportunities
