Safety Council Chairman's Resignation Final

In a letter addressed to the mayor and read at Friday's council meeting, Mrs. M. Godbeer tendered her resignation as Chairman of Dorval Safety Council. Mrs. Godbeer had been chairman since the Safety Council's inception almost 5 years ago.

Mrs. Godbeer's letter and Mayor Pratt's answer are as follows:

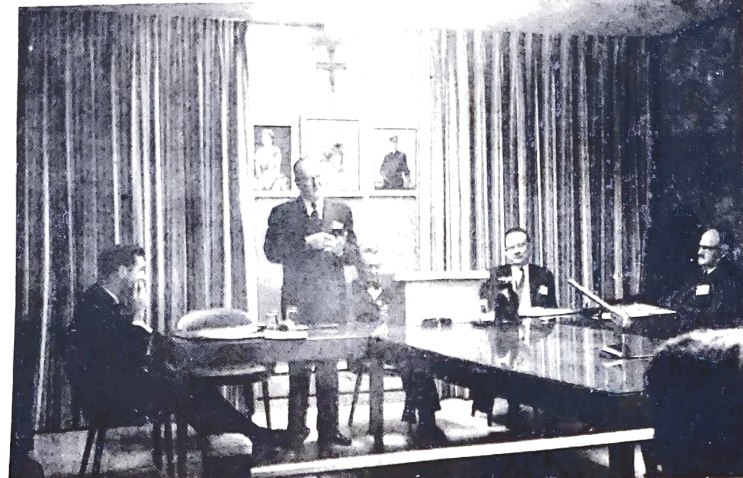

Dear Sir:

About five years ago you requested that I form a Safety Council in the City of Dorval. A number of other citizens were contacted by myself and they then became "The Dorval Safety Council".

For these past five years we have operated more or less successfully in some areas of safety but have constantly found our recommendations disregarded when dealing with the subject of traffic safety. It has been extremely difficult to keep the Safety Council working under such conditions.

On several occasions I have felt that our efforts were in vain and that it would be much easier to forget the whole matter. However, I did realize that we had been quite successful and were receiving

excellent cooperation in the matter of child safety and for that reason continued to act as chairman of this council.

Recent developments have left me with the opinion that the City Council either have no faith in the Safety Council as it is presently formed or are of the opinion that the chairman is not capable of obtaining solutions to the more complex problems of safety. In either instance, as chairman, the lack of response to the work of the Safety Council

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TWO RUNNING ON DECEMBER 14

Nomination of candidates for the by-election scheduled for Thursday, December 14th, in Jacques-Cartier riding was held last Thursday, between noon and 2 p.m. in Lachine City Hall.

Guy Brissette, notary from St. Laurent, who is acting as returning officer, has informed us that four persons applied for nomination papers. They were Mrs. Claire Kirkland-Casgrain, daughter of the

late Dr. C.-A. Kirkland, former member of the Legislative Assembly for the riding, and official liberal candidate; Paul-Emile Lejour who will be an independent liberal candidate; Donat Beauchamp and Frank Wayman.

Mrs. Claire Kirkland-Casgrain was officially elected to represent the Liberal party at a convention held November 20th. Paul-Emile Lejour, unsuccessful candidate at the same convention, officially filed his candidature for the coming elections.

Mr. Brissette declared that the electoral lists would include approximately 113,500 voters, 5,261 more than the number registered for the provincial elections of June 1960.

Representatives of the registered associations of Dorval, heads of City Departments, and members of the press, radio and TV were welcomed to a Public Relations Seminar and Reception at Dorval City Hall last Wednesday evening, Nov. 29, by Mayor John Pratt who defined Public Relations as an area of great importance in municipal matters. The purpose of the seminar was outlined by Alderman Bill Milsom, and Alderman Eugene Raymond extended a welcome in French. Alderman Bruce Goodfellow, third member of the Public Relations Commission, and Alderman A. Samson, and J. MacDonald were present at the function.

A panel of experts from the field of newspapers, radio and TV was introduced by Mr. Almalie Kerr of the City Public Relations Committee. Panel members were: Mr. David Legate, Associate Editor, Montreal Star, Mr. John Freeman, Editor, Lakeshore News, Mr. Gordon Sinclair, President, CFOX Radio, and Mr. Bert Canninas, News Editor, CFCF-TV.

Mr. Legate, speaking in general terms, defined the newspaper as a business, a readable medium which attracts readership, boosts circulation and attracts advertising, travelling a full circle of service to the public. "The privilege of control of a community's thinking is linked with a great responsibility, a responsibility more evident now than at any time in history." He suggested also a greater sense of responsibility on the part of those who direct publicity to this medium. Mr. Freeman, speaking on the weekly newspaper, pointed out that it is tailored to fit the special needs of the community it serves. Handling out some practical hints on the preparation of news releases, the Editor of the Lakeshore News said that the requests for advertising are also very popular. In catering to such a wide variety of publicity requests, a weekly, in order to exist must be governed by the rule, "If you charge -- we change." Mr. Freeman observed,

"An information media, with the advantage of being immediate was Gordon Sinclair's praise for radio. He gave some advice to association representatives on preparing news releases for radio, stressing brevity, accuracy and promptness.

The "Impact" of TV was offered as the most influential force in television by Mr. Bert Canninas. He

Mayor Reprimands Council Members

Dorval Mayor John Pratt spent considerable time reprimanding council members at last Friday's meeting for what he termed as illegal procedure. The occasion arose as a result of council action in their recent meeting with merchants and businessmen involved with the median closing on Cote de Liesse Road.

As a result of the meeting, a letter containing various recommendations, including the re-opening of the median strip in front of Hart Motors and the re-placing of 30 mph signs east of the complete business area, was sent to the Quebec Department of Roads.

The mayor pointed out that since the meeting was not a duly called council meeting, action should not have been taken until an official meeting of council had approved the recommendations. He stated, "In my 12 years with Dorval Council, I have never seen such action."

A subsequent resolution approved the recommendations made thereby making the letter to Quebec legal.

and the lack of recognition of this Council must rest on my shoulders.

Under these conditions, I feel that it is in the best interests of all concerned that I tender my resignation as Chairman. This would then permit the appointment of someone in whom the City Council would have more faith.

As you are probably aware, my interest in safety has taken me into other fields where it would seem I could be more successfully employed. I deeply regret the necessity of this move as I have been sincere in my efforts with only the safety of our community in mind.

The recent decision to appeal to the Quebec government concerning the openings in the median strip on Cotede Liesse Road, despite the decision made previously, after considerable study has contributed to my decision. I feel that this action has seriously jeopardized the work that has been done to reduce safety hazards on the provincial roads of our city.

I trust that you will be successful in obtaining a chairman who with new ideas and approach can carry on this very vital work with greater success.

I have your letter of November 24th, in which you tender your resignation as Chairman of the Dorval Safety Council.

I am terribly sorry that you have found it necessary to take this drastic step, particularly as I realize the tremendous effort and intelligence that you have brought to the solution of so many of our safety problems over the last five years. I shall present your letter to the City Council on December 1st, and I am sure they will agree with me in requesting that you reconsider your decision to resign.

Dorval has benefited for many years from the voluntary services of its many citizens advisory committees, and I am convinced that such civic committees operate most efficiently when their executive members remain in office for long periods. In this way they obtain experience and a background knowledge of civic af-

B of M Head Speaks To Shareholders

MONTREAL, Dec. 4 -- Holding prices down and increasing productivity should be Canada's objectives in the face of intensifying world competition and changing market alignments, according to G. Arnold Hart, president of the Bank of Montreal.

Mr. Hart, told the bank's 144th annual meeting today that this country should follow the European example in developing greater co-operation among labor, management and government towards these paramount aims.

Shareholders also heard R.D. Mulholland, vice-president and general manager, report business to October 31 at a record level, with growth in assets of \$464 million, which represented "the largest increase ever experienced in a year by any Canadian bank." This expansion brought the B of M's total resources to a figure just below the \$4-billion mark.

3,000,000 CUSTOMERS

Mr. Mulholland also noted that

the B of M is now banker to more than 3,000,000 Canadians from coast to coast, with the number of deposit accounts increasing 134,000 in the year.

Mr. Hart said that while business has shown signs of increased activity in the past year, the pace of recovery from recession "still falls short of the rate of growth we would wish to see."

He added that Canada today lives under conditions of "managed money", so that it should be recognized that Canada's fiscal and monetary policies must be closely interrelated. In the future, he hoped that "level-headed common-sense" would prevail in management of the money supply, with flexibility as the key.

Even so, Mr. Hart believed, "there is no monetary formula that will, in itself, create wealth," nor can there be a substitute for the "technical

skill and energetic salesmanship required in an increasingly tough competitive trading environment."

Advocating a positive approach to new problems for Canada caused by the European Common Market, the B of M president said the stimulus to economic expansion likely to follow Britain's entry and the consequent greater demand for Canadian raw materials, might well in the long run offset other disadvantages.

fares that is not available to such committees if the personnel is frequently changed.

As you know, I have been very much aware of your difficulties in the past and whenever possible I have tried personally to smooth out these problems with the various factions involved. I also realize that it has often been necessary for Council to amend or limit some of your Council's suggestions for reasons of legal, political, or other human factors. However, the duty of your Council has been "safety first" and I have admired the way in which your membership stuck to their guns in the face of opposition, justified or otherwise. I imagine that a safety council will always have an up-hill fight with city management, city legislators, and other city

authorities, and anyone who follows you in office will probably have the same problems.

For this reason, if the burden has not become too great, I am personally asking you to reconsider your resignation in the interests of all the citizens of Dorval, whom it is our mutual duty to serve.

As I said, our next Council Meeting will be held on Friday, December 1st, and, unless we hear further from you, your letter of resignation will be taken up as part of the regular agenda of that meeting.

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Paintings On Exhibit At City Hall

The vanishing world of the Lakeshore, where high rising apartment buildings, housing developments, shopping centres, and boulevards are removing the urban charm and the historical landmarks, is being preserved through paintings by local artists. Two Dorval painters who work in oil with brush and palette knife, and who have each attained a good measure of success and recognition, have placed on display at City Hall some paintings of Dorval scenes and buildings, some of which no longer exist. The artists, Lois Eastman Coates, and Dori Thomson present the mood of older Dorval in its various seasons; the fact that they have done research on their subjects and have been somewhat captured by the charm of the places they paint, shows in their work.

Included in the paintings by Mrs. Coates are buildings which no longer stand; one is the old red pump house which stood beside the Bouchard River; the other is of the Descary Farm buildings painted from a sketch made shortly before the McNicoll Crescent project was started. The painting will bring back memories to those who knew the farm, famous for its wonderful corn and the apple orchard. The house was built in 1871 by Andre Descary. "After the Storm" and "Old House in Dorval Village" feature two landmarks in Dorval on Lakeshore Drive, the home built by Mr. George Tardis in 1876, and later sold to Mr. Joseph Descary, and the house built by Mr. Damas Descary in 1866.

Dori Thomson includes in her paintings an autumn scene at La Presentation Church, and "The First Snow -- Dorval Village" which captures on canvas the white house on the corner of Martin Avenue now owned by Mr. Noel Descary who was born in the house which has become the Dorval Hotel. "Les Paraspluis dans la Neige" shows a familiar landmark at the corner of Neptune

and Lakeshore Drive. "The Quesnel Trading Post" has as its subject a fascinating history and great charm. Standing near the Western border of Lachine on the Lakeshore, the house, recently beautified with wrought iron work made by a St. Anne de Bellevue blacksmith, was built in 1720 by Olivier Quesnel. Two children of Nicholas Oramere were captured here by the Iroquois.

Many other buildings in Dorval have been torn down within the last few years. The little church which was one of the first schools for English speaking children in Dorval is gone; a "For Sale" sign hangs on a tree behind the lovely stone fence on Lakeshore Drive near St. Charles Street, making an uncertain future for one of the oldest buildings in Dorval. The atmosphere and picturesque old world look of Dorval is fast disappearing; soon it will be like any other suburban city. The past cannot stay with us forever, but there should be some attempt made now to preserve something of the city's individuality, a representation of its past history. In the display of paintings at the City Hall one gains insight into some of the beauty which should be preserved, at least on canvas.

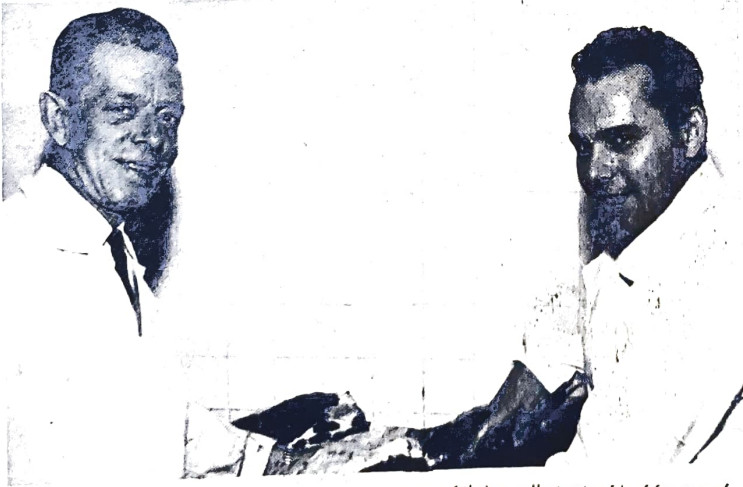

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LACHINE G.H. HOLDS GENERAL BOARD MEETING

Tighter and more efficient control at all levels during the past few months has brought results benefitting both patients and staff at the Lachine General Hospital.

This was made clear from reports submitted to last month's meeting of the board of management, presided over by its president, Grover C. Furr.

These reports emphasised the extent of the increased facilities and services to patients and what more can be expected in the foreseeable future.

Dr. W. G. Dixon, medical director, in his report, advised the board on the appointment to the medical staff of a full time resident and full time additions to both the day and the night staffs which gives the hospital round-the-clock, on-the-spot

medical service.

Mrs. W. Harkness, president of the Women's Auxiliary, said the membership drive was progressing well although full figures could not be given yet.

From Mrs. H. S. Paul, president of the Valois Gardens group they had received a cheque for \$881, raised through various group activities.

Mrs. Harkness also announced that

the executive had agreed to purchase for the hospital two hot and cold food carts, an X-ray viewing box and a small refrigerator for serum.

Mr. Furr thanked the Women's Auxiliary on behalf of the board for members' generosity, and congratulated them on another fine report -- "something we have come to expect regularly from the Women's Auxiliary," he said.

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"Y" CAMPAIGN OVER THE TOP

The Lachine-Dorval delegation to the final campaign wind-up dinner held at the Central Y.M.C.A. in Montreal last week made a clean sweep of the trophies awarded for outstanding performance in the annual maintenance campaign.

Chairman Dave Loudoun reported to the meeting that his division had more than achieved its objective in collecting \$7,331. A target of \$7200 had been set for the local "Y" and the total collected represented 101.8 per cent of this objective.

When the reports from all the divisions were tabulated it was apparent that the Lachine-Dorval division was on top and Dave Loudoun was asked to come forward to be presented with the T. James Claxton memorial shield.

Mr. Colin W. Webster, president of the metropolitan board of directors of the Y.M.C.A. of Montreal made the presentation and in commending Mr. Loudoun for his leadership noted the inscription on the plaque "for meritorious work in the annual campaign."

The plaque which was presented

for the first time this year was named in honor of Mr. Claxton who was instrumental in establishing the first Y.M.C.A. in Montreal, which was also the first on this continent.

In winning this plaque the Lachine-Dorval division automatically won the Y.M.C.A. campaign divisional trophy which is up for competition at each of the report luncheons.

Asked if he had any names for blue ribbon awards Mr. Loudoun said that at this point he wouldn't want to single out individuals, for if he were fair about it he would have to have 180 for all of his workers and he knew that they didn't have that number on hand.

J.M. Crawford, chairman of the board of management of the Lachine-Dorval Y.M.C.A., and Vic Hryhorchuk, Executive Secretary were among the first to congratulate Mr. Loudoun who was obviously impressed with the work of his zone chairman and the efforts of all the "Y" workers who participated in the campaign.

In reviewing the progress of the campaign right from the initial meetings with the finance committee through to the subsequent planning discussions with the zone chairmen and the regular reporting sessions, Mr. Loudoun said that the success of the campaign was due to the excellent co-operation of all who participated.

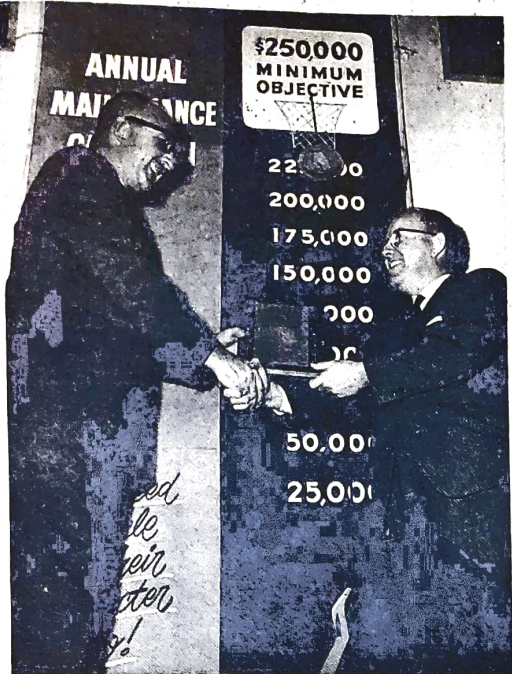

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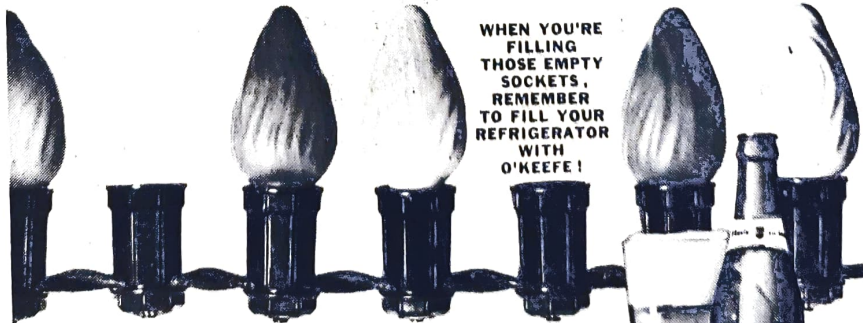
