5 years ago. Mrs Godbeer's letter and Mayor Pratt's answer are as follows:



About five years ago you requested that I form a Safe-ty Council in the City of Dory Council in the City of Dor-val. A number of other cit-izens were contacted by my-self and they then became "The Dorval Safety Council". For these past five years we

have operated more or less successfully in some areas of sefety but heve constantly found our recommendations senery out have constantly found our recommendations disregarded when dealing with the subject of traffic safety. It has been extremely diffi-cult to keep the Safety Coun-cll working under such condit-tons

on several occasions 1 have On several occasions i nave felt that our effors were in vain and that it would be much easier to forget the whole matter. However, I did real-ize that we had been quite successful and were receiving

Mayor Reprimands Council Members

Dorval Mayor John Pratt spent considerable time reprimanding souncil members at last Friday's meeting for what he termed as il-legal proceedure. The occasion arose as a result of councils action in their recent meeting with mer-chants and businessmen involved with the median closing on Cote de Viera Drod Liesse Road.

As a result of the meeting, a Heter containing various recom-mendations, including the re-open-ing of the median strip in front of Hart Motors and the re-placing of 30 mph signs east of the complete business area, was sent to the Que-bec Department of Roads.

The mayor pointed out that since the meeting was not a duly called council meeting, action should not have been taken until an official meeting of council had approved the recommendations. He stated, "In my ten years with Dorval Council, I have never seen such action."

A subsequent resolution approved the recommendations made thereby making the letter to Quebec legal.

He suggested also a greater sense of reponability to this medium. Mr. Freeman, speaking on the weekly newspaper, pointed out that it is tailored to fit the special needs of the community it serves. I trust that you will be suc-cessful in obtaining a chair-man who with new ideas and approach can carry on this very vital work with greater success.



Paintings On Exhibit At City Hall

The vanishing world of the Lake-shore, where high rising apartment buildings, housing developments, shopping centres, and boulevards are removing the urban charm and the historical landmarks, is being pre-served through paintings by local artists. Two Dorval painters who work in oil with brush and palette knife, and who have each attained a good measure of success and rec-ognition, have placed on display at

Imife, and who have each ättained a good measure of uccess and rec-ognition, have placed on display at City Hall some paintings of Dorval scenes and buildings, some of which no longer exist. The artist, Lois Eastman Coates, and Dori Thomson presenthe mood of older Dorval in its various seasons; the fact that they have done research on their subjects and have been somewhat captured by the charm of the places they paint, shows in their work. Included in the paintings by Mrs. Coates are buildings which no longer stand; one is the old red pump house which stood beride the Bouchard River; the other is of the Descary Farm buildings painted from a sketch made shortly before the Mc-Nicoll Crescent project was started. The painting will bring back mem-ories to those who knew the farm, famous for its wonderful corn and the apple orchard. The house was built in 1871 by Andre Descary. "After the Storm" an "Old House in Dorval Village" feature two land-marks in Dorval on Lakeshore Drive, the home built by Mr. George Tardis in Lorvar v Hage - leadure two fadde-marks in Dorval on Lakeshore Drive, the home built by Mr. George Tardis in 1876, and later sold to Mr. Jo-seph Descary, and the house built by Mr. Damas Descary in 1866. and Lakeshore Drive. "The Quesnel Trading Post" has as its subject a fascinating history and great charm. Standing near the Western border of Lachine on the Lakeshore, the house, recently beautified with wrought iron work made by a St. Anne de Belle-vue blacksmith, was built in 1720 by Olivier Quesnel. Two children of Nicholas Ozanne were captured here by the Iroquois.

The little church which wasone of the first schools for Eno-lish speaking children in Dorval is gone; a "For Sale" sign hangs on a tree behind the lovely stone fence-on Lakeshore Drive near St. Charles Street, making an uncertain future for one of the oldest buildings in Dorval. The atmosphere and picturfor one of the oldest buildings in Dorval. The atmosphere and pictur-esque old world look of Dorval is fast disappearing; soon it will be like any other suburban city. The past cannot stay with us forever, but there should be some attempt made now to preserve something of the city's individuality, a represent-ation of its past history. In the dis-play of paintings at the City Hall one gains insight into some of the beauty which should be preserved, at least on canvas. on canvas.

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
