# THE POWER OF PRAYER

The first reading gives us the wonderful image of Moses, standing on the top of a hill holding his staff while Aaron and Hur, one on either side, support his arms and hands



until the sun sets so that Moses does not have to lower his staff. On his own, Moses does not have the strength and endurance to sustain the necessary pose. Not only did Moses need to appeal to God for help, he needed the support of others, of his community. We may feel unable to sustain the persistence to continue to fight for justice, especially when we

consider the number of people like the widow in the Gospel who do not appear to be in a position to fight effectively for it themselves, but we do not have to do it alone. The support from our community of faith can help sustain us.

Prayer, whether short or lengthy, whether rote or extemporaneous, is what keeps us connected to God. It is no accident that Jesus spends a lot of time praying to the Father.

Not only did Jesus teach His disciples how to pray, He showed them that He prayed and prayed often. It connected Him to the Father, and if He needed to make that connection often, how much more important is it for us? Persistent prayer will see to it that



justice is done for us and God's chosen ones. Persistent prayer helps us to understand and accept God's will. Persistent prayer ensures that there will still indeed be faith on earth when the Son of Man comes.

In this era of instant gratification, when we expect to get what we want immediately, whether it's ordering something online or getting likes on a tweet, patience is a difficult virtue to exercise. Jesus says that God will "see to it that justice is done for them speedily" (Luke 18:8). But "speedily" in what sense? In the very next sentence, Jesus talks about His second coming. The disciples expected that He would return before they died. But two thousand years later we still wait. So whose sense of "speed" is this? The answer is that God's time is not our time. If we judge by the expectations of our schedule, we will become impatient in a hurry. We must accept that God's time demands our patience, and consequently our persistence.

# **QUESTION OF THE WEEK:**

For what do I feel I am praying in vain? Can I find the will to pray for it persistently? Meanwhile, how can I be part of God's answer to someone else's persistent prayer?

mysteries, the prayer can slow us down, calm our hearts, and enable us to rest in God's presence. It draws out the deepest desires in our souls, desires for God and God alone. The rhythm of the repetitious prayers can have a profound spiritual effect. As <u>John Paul II</u> explained, this loving repetition "embodies the desire for Christ to become the breath, soul and all of one's life" (RVM, 27). In the same way, the repeated



prayers in the rosary help us get more in touch with the deepest desires in our souls for God.

#### THE POWER OF PRAYER

#### 1. Prayer helps you develop a relationship with God

Just like your parents here on earth, your Heavenly Father wants to hear from you and talk to you. When you pray, He listens. Then He answers your prayers in the form of thoughts, spiritual feelings, scripture, or even the actions of other people.

# 2 Prayer helps you gain an understanding of God's loving nature

The scriptures teach, "God is love" (1 John 4:8). You can feel that love as you speak daily with Him through prayer, seeking His guidance in your life.

#### 3. Prayer provides answers

Praying and listening to the answers God gives you can help you better understand your purpose in life. God will help you understand why you are here and what you can do to return to live with Him after this life.

### 4. Prayer helps you find direction in your life

When you privately pray to God, you can work through serious decisions in your life. God always listens and often provides the specific answers and guidance we seek. Even when He chooses not to answer immediately or in the way we might have hoped, prayer itself is a way to find peace.

# 5. Prayer gives you strength to avoid temptation

Jesus counseled His disciples, "Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation" (Matthew 26:41). Through prayer, we can overcome temptations to sin. Pray for God's help to keep you from making wrong choices. This will give you the strength to do what is right.

#### 6. Prayer aligns your will with God's will

The purpose of prayer is not necessarily to tell God how you want Him to do things. Rather, it's to better understand Him and His ways, bringing yourself into alignment with His will. As C.S. Lewis is often attributed as saying, prayer "doesn't change God. It changes *me*."

### 7. Prayer and regular fasting can help you accept God's will

Jesus fasted for 40 days and 40 nights before He began His ministry on the earth. As He did this, He communed with His Father in Heaven in prayer. Likewise, if you pray and fast, you can feel closer to God and better understand the things He wants you to do.

#### 8. Prayer can work miracles

Throughout the scriptures, we see many examples of the Lord working miracles as an answer to prayer. In Old Testament times, the prophet Daniel was thrown into a lions' den because he refused to stop praying. When he prayed to God in the lions' den, angels appeared and closed the mouths of the lions. Through daily prayer, you can also experience personal miracles such as healing, peace, and forgiveness for sins.

#### 9. Prayer invites the Holy Spirit into your life

As you pray daily, you invite the Holy Spirit to be with you and to comfort and direct you. The Holy Spirit can give you answers, help you feel God's love, and bring feelings of peace and joy into your heart.

#### 10. Prayer helps you become more like Jesus

Jesus set the perfect example of prayer. If you try to follow His example through prayer, you will become more like Him and develop a better relationship with Him and Heavenly Father.
