The people of Israel contended with the Lord in the wilderness (Ex. 17:1–7). They were dissatisfied with His provision. In the same way, the first laborers in the vineyard complained against the landowner for the wage he provided them (Matt. 20:1–16). They charged him with being unfair, but in reality he was being generous. For the Lord does not wish to deal with us on the basis of what we deserve but on the basis of His abounding grace in Christ. The first—those who rely on their own merits—will be last. "For they were overthrown in the wilderness" (1 Cor. 10:5). But the last, those who rely on Christ, will be first. For Christ is the Rock (1 Cor. 9:24–10:5). He is the One who was struck and from whose side blood and water flowed that we may be cleansed of our sin.

Creation and Re-Creation: Christ's Holy Week Work as Witness to Days of Creation Sermon Series for the Season of Lent Rev. Dr. Joel G. Koepp

Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return. These words, taken from the Rite of the Imposition of Ashes on Ash Wednesday, recall for us the curse of the Fall into sin in Genesis 3. God's perfect creation was cursed, as the pinnacle of creation, the one's created and placed into a position of stewardship failed into their duty. Rather than being like children and trusting in their Father to care, nurture, and sustain them, even through simple means, such as one, clear Word of command and promise, they sought to be like God. As the parents, so are the children. From the fall, all mankind is cursed with returning to dust. In those words of cursing, hope was given; a promise from God was made. From the dust, a Savior would be born to restore mankind. From the cross, that very promised Man cries it to be completed, and the payment for sin finished. Three days later, that same man would rise. Dust returning to dust and then waking from the dust to life eternal. God took on flesh, became one of the dust, to restore man to its rightful place and bestows upon you, through faith in His simple words of command and promise, heirs of the Kingdom of God. This Lent, we are going to look at Christ's work of Creation and Re-Creation, specifically as He bears witness to the days of Creation through His work during Holy Week. We will note parallels of Genesis 1-2, with Jesus life from Palm Sunday through Easter. We also have the added joy of welcoming four of our fellow Circuit Pastor's to proclaim to us God's clear words of command and promise, His Law and Gospel. This Lent is marked as even more special, as we will on March 25 celebrate the Annunciation of Our Lord. Nine months before Christmas, it is the day we recall the announcement to Mary of her pregnancy, and the incarnation of our Lord—Jesus in the flesh! It is a day of all days, as we mark God-inthe-flesh for the first time, His first step in redeeming man from his fallen state. Please plan to join us as we walk from Ash Wednesday (February 26) to the Resurrection of Our Lord (April 12) hearing Creation & Re-Creation: Christ's Holy Week Work as Witness to Days of Creation.

To Eat and to Drink

If the Lord's Supper is God's gift, why is it connected to confirmation education?

The Lord's Supper is a gift to Christians, as we teach our children in the Small Catechism: "given for us Christians to eat and to drink." Confirmation is not commanded by God. The Church in her liberty has been using confirmation to make sure that children are instructed in the Christian faith.

We need to know what the gift is that we are receiving (1 Cor. 11:29). This means not only knowing that the bread and wine are Christ's body and blood, but that they are received in repentance and faith for the forgiveness of sins. Luther's Small Catechism teaches this well.


Notice what parts of the catechism are at play in teaching someone to know the gifts he is receiving in the Lord's Supper in repentance and faith. Desiring the forgiveness of sins requires knowledge of repentance (Ten Commandments, Confession). The desire for the forgiveness of sins is faith in Christ and what He has done (the Creed, or who God is and what He has done).

When we repent, thank God for the Lord's Supper and use the Lord's Supper for strength in temptation, we pray as Jesus taught us to (Lord's Prayer). When we have confidence that the Lord's Supper is for God's children, we base this confidence on God's Word to us in Baptism. And obviously we should know what the Lord's Supper is, its benefits and how we receive it properly (Sacrament of the Altar).

Additionally, we need to be able to examine ourselves (1 Cor. 11:28). We examine ourselves in the light of the Ten Commandments (the Law), but also in the light of who God is and what He has done for us in Christ (the Gospel). We are only able to do this if we are taught the Word of God. The Small Catechism does a wonderful job of instructing us.

The Lord's Supper is not a gift to be given to just anyone. It is for those who hunger and thirst for righteousness and desire God's Word (Acts 2:42;1 Peter 2:2). Confirmation is not necessary, but instruction is. Confirmation is a good tradition that helps us instruct people for properly receiving the Lord's Supper.
