Cancer Fuels Runner's Quest for 1,000 Races

Linda "Sunny" Fox runs from cancer. Consider it her starting point, with several thousand miles logged since she was first diagnosed in 2006.

"I told myself, 'I'm gonna run 1,000 races before I kick the bucket," she said. "And if I run that many, I'm gonna help others along the way."

Fox, age 58, has since run in 617 races, with many of them benefitting charitable organizations such as Team Hoyt Virginia Beach, Ainsley's Angels, Lee's Friends, and Down Syndrome Association of Hampton Roads, among others.

She is a 3rd Precinct police chaplain and a retired Naval Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps instructor.

A few years ago, she raised \$5,000 to purchase a race chair, in which she pushes children with physical challenges for certain events. Most recently, she ran

the New Year's Eve Beat the Ball 5K at Portsmouth Naval Hospital, pushing 19 year old Hunter Berns in the race chair, with his siblings nearby.

Her next race chair event is the Love Run in February to benefit Children's Hospital of The King's Daughters. Her support team of eight additional runners will be sponsored by the Joint Expeditionary Base Little Creek Fort Story Bargain Shop. Shop manager Georgiana Balling was glad to contribute.

"Linda does so much for the community, including the military," she said. "She is truly dedicated to serving others; we're happy to help her in any way."

Between training, racing and volunteering as a chaplain, the Wesleyan Chase resident substitute teaches NJROTC classes at Virginia Beach high schools, as


The President's Message

BY-LAWS CHAIRMAN



Cathy Gerolimatos

I'm making a prediction: *The coming months will be extremely busy.* A Transition Team and procedure for

units to submit changes has been established. If you haven't received a copy of the Unit Change Transmittal, let us know. We'll get it right to you. I see it clearly: Units are busy deciding what their new name will be as well as reviewing bylaws. There's excitement in the air. Some units already have new members from our sister services. Can't get more exciting than that! Some of you have already submitted your bylaws for review. Woe is me--there's a lot happening.

Before I go any further, I'd like to make a recommendation that will, more than

likely in the long run, save all of us time. Please understand, I, along with the MWAN Bylaws Transition Team, are here to review your bylaws to ensure it aligns with National Bylaws. In order to accomplish this:

- 1. Decide what you're new name is. Ensure the name you've decided upon meets the name requirement of MWAN Bylaws Article V Section 2E1c. At this point you may submit your name change to MWAN for approval. Remember to keep your Regional Representative and State Director apprised. I'd recommend getting the proposed name change done ASAP. That's just "me" making a recommendation.
- 2. Review your Unit Bylaws. a. Incorporate your new name into your Unit Bylaws. b. Edit or rewrite that which refers exclusively to sea services and fold in that which embraces all our sister services. c. Determine if there is a bylaw "in practice" that the unit does not follow and decide whether to modify that bylaw or to begin putting in practice what is in the bylaw-while maintaining compliance with National Bylaws. d. Correct any Unit Bylaws that is in conflict with MWAN Bylaws, e. Agree on what you would like to submit for review by MWAN Bylaws Transition Team. Do NOT vote to approve just yet. Agree to what changes you would like to see.
- 3. Submit the DRAFT of proposed changes to the Unit Bylaws to the MWAN Bylaws Transition Team.
- 4. Review and discuss MWAN Bylaws Transition Team's recommendations. If there are any questions or concerns, fire off a quick e-mail or make a telephone call. Sometimes, there's an easy answer.
- 5. Once MWAN Bylaws Transition Team approves the proposed changes to the Unit Bylaws schedule a VOTE at the next unit meeting.

I've already received three Bylaws for review. One was approved by the unit membership before sending to me and, unfortunately, some sections are in conflict with MWAN Bylaws. As a result, there will be some back and forth in ironing out these differences and the unit will have to vote again to change their bylaws. Let's keep it as simple as we can. E-mail me! Call me! Send me your DRAFT! I'll do my best to help.

What if you can't find your Unit Bylaws? Make an inquiry to MWAN's 2nd Vice President. There's a possibility, she has a copy.

What if MWAN's 2nd Vice President does NOT have a copy of your Unit Bylaws? I will happily send you a template

to help you build or rebuild your bylaws.

Now, if that isn't complicated enough, and I know we're all anxious to make things happen and we need it to happen right now, please bear with your MWAN Bylaws Transition Team as your Bylaws Chair has some traveling planned to include time out-of-the country. I intend to check e-mail regularly, however, I may not be able to answer your question immediately as I may not have the appropriate reference(s) with me to do so. Have a little patience--I know I NEED patience! I hope to tap into others who may be able to help in my absence.

I'm making another prediction: We're going to get there.

VA MEDICAL/HEALTH

Epistaxis is the medical term for a nose bleed. Most nose bleeds are not a major medical event. Nose bleeds can

be caused by allergies, dry air, smoke irritation, sinusitis (nose inflammation), colds, objects placed in the nose, being hit in the nose, or just picking the nose.

High blood pressure, especially in the elderly, can cause the nose to bleed profusely, requiring you to go to the emergency room for a resolution. This usually involves packing the nose. It is not very comfortable and needs to be monitored to assure the blood is not continuing to bleed down the back of the throat. The priority of this bleed is to get it stopped and treat the high blood pressure to keep the nose bleeds from returning.

It is important as we get older to be aware of conditions that could let us know early on that a problem is occurring. Recurring nose bleeds for no obvious reason is an issue that should be discussed with your doctor. I hope you all have come through this winter with good health and are looking forward to spring and summer. I am ready for a change of seasons.

Women's History Month Honored



VADM Nora Tysone talks to WWII WAVES Judith Hayward and Isabella Bryant.

Hampton Roads Naval Museum offered attendees a chance to meet some of the Navy's finest female service members during a discussion panel celebrating Women's History Month.

Rear Admiral Ann Phillips, USN (Ret), the first woman assigned as a Destroyer Squadron Commodore, served as moderator for a discussion.

Panelists represented important watershed eras for women in the Sea Service, from World War II forward.

Judith Hathaway was a lieutenant in the United States Navy during World War II. She attended midshipman school at Smith College, supply corps school at Harvard, and was stationed in Washington, D.C., and Fort Lauderdale, FL, during the war. Ms. Hathaway was in the Navy from October 1942 through December 1945.

Isabella Bryant served as a cryptologist from 1943 to 1945, and joined the Navy because she wanted to do something for her country.

Jo-Anne Teel served as a Data Processing Technician and retired in 1993 as a Data Processing Chief.

Vice Admiral Nora Tyson, the first woman to command a U.S. Navy Carrier

Task Force, was on hand to speak about today's Navy.

Each panelist kept the audience mesmerized with their history, sea stories and sense of humor. Judith Hayward told of her earning the title of "Pistol Packing Mama" as she was responsible for collecting payroll, in cash, at the bank on paydays, and transporting money back to her command. Even though she had an armed guard, she was required to carry a weapon and knew how to use it!

Judith said a college friend was talking of joining the Army, but she, herself, held out for the Navy, "...because the uniforms were better looking!"

Isabella Bryant was a Specialist Q second class petty officer, working to decode messages. Before joining the Navy, she would exchange letters with her boyfriend until the letters stopped coming. "I wanted to finish what he tried to do," Isabella said.

When the Navy solicited volunteers to go to Hawaii towards the end of the war, Isabella didn't hesitate to volunteer. She was excited and honored to be selected for the assignment.

When Jo-Ann Teel joined in the '70's, women still weren't allowed to serve aboard ships. Even during boot camp, there was no shipboard training for women like there is today. When she was assigned to a ship, as a chief, it was a shock. Her husband educated her on the proper way to request permission to board the ship. "Had he not done this," Jo-Anne said, "I would have gone aboard and just announced 'Here I am!""

Jo-Anne also told of her first experience at General Quarters. She had not been through any training but knew where her assigned station was. Not knowing what to do when she arrived, she watched the others as they buttoned their shirts all the way up. She followed suit and did the same. Then she noticed they were tucking their pant legs into their stockings. Jo-Anne thought, "Oh-oh!" She was wearing panty hose!

RADM Phillips entered the discussion with her own embarrassing moment when she went aboard a ship for the first time and went up the wrong brow!

VADM Nora Tyson, now Deputy Commander of U.S. Fleet Forces, commanded the USS Bataan during relief efforts in Louisiana following Hurricane Katrina, leading the Navy's contributions to disaster relief efforts on the U.S. Gulf Coast in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. She was the first woman to lead a Carrier Strike Group. She commanded the USS George H.W. Bush Strike Group in its maiden deployment.

When asked what they would say to young women coming into the military today, each one of them said, without hesitation, "Go for it! Do your best and don't turn down an opportunity! You can't go wrong!"



The End of an Era – When A WAVES National Unit Disbands

In answer to your questions about "what is a unit supposed to do with old records, such as minutes, bank statements, newsletters, pictures, etc." when the unit disbands? The Bylaws and Procedures Manual provide guidance for turning in the Charter and what to do with the balance in the unit treasury, but not much else. Units should check with a local or state historical society or a history department to see if they are interested in any of the records and/or pictures. For those historical records that "no one is interested in keeping" it is suggested to check with the MWAN Historian, Sharon Woods to see if she can take them off of your hands or not. Additionally, you can check to see if there is a Women's History Museum on a college campus. Please don't throw away anything without checking to see if someone might want to keep whatever it may be.

Any bank statements (after the final audit) and minutes, for example should be

shredded. Any other records with names, addresses, etc. should also be shredded. If you don't have access to a shredder or your unit has too many of those types of records to use a home shredder, check with your local non-profits to see where you can take those records to be securely shredded at no charge. Some banks offer the public free shredding on a monthly basis.

Regular members of a unit that disbands are automatically switched to member-at-large (MAL) status as long as her dues are current. Regular and Life members are made MALs and will remain as such unless she joins another unit at which time she will become that units' member. Please remember to keep your state director (SD), regional representative (RR) and the MWAN 2nd Vice President informed of your units' status. Don't let it be a surprise for the SD or RR to read about your unit's disbanding in a White Caps article.

Home Depot Foundation - Volunteer Project

The mission of the Home Depot Foundation is to improve the homes and lives of U.S. military veterans and their families. As a member of WAVES National I was contacted by a local Home Depot in August 2014 to see if I could find a veteran who may have a home project that he or she needed to have done but, could not afford to do the project or, perhaps didn't have the right tools for the job, or were disabled and unable to do a specific type of work. The veterans that I spoke with did not have any projects that needed to be taken care of in this way. And, since I could not locate a veteran or veteran and family in need, I decided to ask if Home Depot would consider taking care of a project that my husband and I inherited when we purchased his parents' home in 2008. There was a cement wheelchair ramp on the back of the house and it was unsafe. Snickers, our beloved dog, could not get up the ramp when there was ice on it and I tore my Achilles heel one day going in the back door with a basket of laundry.

My husband and I are disabled veterans with a combined total of 47 years of honorable naval service and I decided to ask if the Home Depot Team would help us get rid of the cement ramp and build a 4' x 4' wooden porch with steps in its place. Ben and I have volunteered many hours at each and every duty station to help others and it was nice to know that we did qualify for this project.

After several delays our wish came true on Friday, 13 February 2015. Removal of the ramp took four Home Depot volunteers five hours with a jackhammer to take the ramp completely down, as it was filled with steel rebar and bricks. Now we have a safe back porch that is 4' x 6' with steps and it is absolutely wonderful! Thank you, Louis Young (Army veteran) and co-project volunteers, Aaron Smiley, Rusty Story and Victoria Codispoti for a job truly well done! well as substitute teaches in other city public schools.

She is married to Bill Fox, also a cancer survivor; and they have one grown daughter, Kristen Fox. In 2013, Linda Fox was unexpectedly honored to be featured in Will Bowen's book, "Happy Stories."

She treasures a medal fashioned by a child with Down Syndrome as better than "any hunk of metal on a ribbon." Fox owns sneakers for every type of distance and terrain running, including marathons and mud runs.

"I have more pairs of shoes in the closet than people have underwear," she said, grinning.

She recently finished a marathon in Hawaii but thinks it may be time to hang up her big-mile sneakers.

"The long-distance races take a lot out of me, and it doesn't make sense to beat up the body too much," she said.

One of the side effects of her thyroid removal is reduced function of the salivary glands. Fox works to overcome it by carrying hydration on the long-distance runs, but it takes its toll.

She is willing to accept reality but not sympathy.

"This is the no-whining zone," she said, noting that pushing children like Hunter serves as a reminder. "I have nothing to complain about; I have two legs and a heart that work."

Berenice K. George, past WAVES National President and Navy Veteran, passes at 89

Berenice K. George, past National President of WAVES National, 89, passed away, 7 January.

Berenice lied about her age to join the Navy in 1943, a secret she kept from her father for decades. She had just turned 18 when she tried to join the Navy in Philadelphia, two years shy of the 20-year-old age requirement for women. She begged her father to sign her enlistment papers, never telling him about the age requirement. He agreed if she promised never to volunteer to go overseas.

"I was scared for a long time because that's sorta fraud, but there were many men and women who did that during World War II," she told researchers for the book, "America's Youngest Women Warriors."

After basic training in the Bronx, she was assigned as a storekeeper in the supply department at the Naval Frontier Base, Little Creek, VA. The base was the forwarding center for Amphibious Force personnel and equipment destined for the European Theater.

She was a member of Suncoast WAVES, Unit 15, serving as president and in other capacities, and served as past national president of WAVES National. She was later a member of Three Rivers, Unit 28, in PA, where she resided with her son.
